# AN ATHLETIC CODE

#### for

# Superintendents and Principals

The Superintendent and Principal are the final authorities responsible for the athletic activities of the school. In realization of this responsibility these guiding principles should prevail:

#### For the Superintendent

- I will use all means possible to bring to my community a full realization of the value of athletics as an educational tool in training citizens.
- (5) I will have a definite understanding with principals and athletic directors concerning the school athletic policy and expect and give mutual support in carrying out that policy.
- (3) I will judge the success of those in charge of the athletic program by the conduct and attitudes of contestants and spectators rather than by the number of games won and lost.

#### For the Principal

- (1) I will have a complete understanding of the athletic policy of this school system and of the individual responsibility of all concerned.
- (2) I will be honest in my certification of contestants and base that certification on complete information concerning the student's athletic and scholastic history. Questionable cases will be refered to the State Director before the privilege of competition is given.
- (3) I will give my loyal support to the coach in all his efforts to carry out the state and local athletic policies.
- (4) I will make every effort to instruct the student body in their responsibilities in making the athletic program a valuable one and point out desirable types of conduct at "home" and "away" games.
- (5) I will endeavor to foresee possible differences and misunderstandings with other schools and, as far as possible, settle them or provide means of settlement before they maisrialize.
- (6) I will insist that any misunderstandings that may arise be settled privately between official representatives of the schools concerned.
- (?) I will require the passing of a medical examination and parental consent before a student is allowed to compete.
- (8) I will have a definite understanding with the Athletic Director or Business Manager about officials, schedules, finances, care of flelds and gymnasium, handling of spectators, etc., and will give him every assistance in carrying out his duties.
- (9) I will consider it unprofessional to enter into any protest or argument after a game has been lost that I would not have raised had the game been won.
- (10) I will attend as many of the athletic contests in which my school participates as school work will allow.
- (11) I will commend opposing schools for autstanding examples of fine citizenship.

# HISTORY OF THE SOUTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

At a meeting of the Superintendents and Principals held at Brookings, December 29, 1905, the South Dakota High School Athletic Association was formed and rules and regulations were adopted. Supt. G. E. Muller of Hurley; Supt. R. L. Kirk of Aberdeen and Supt. A. A. McDonald of Sloux Falls, were elected members of the Board of Control to serve one, two and three years respectively. The annual membership fee was \$1.00; age limit of contestants twenty years; and three studies the scholarship requirement. The first state athletic contest sponsored by this Association was the State Track and Field Meet held at Sloux Palls, in May, 1906.

Annual Meeting, Sloux Falls, December 28, 1966. Supt. R. C. Shallenbarger of Yankton was elected a member of the Board of Control to serve three years. Amendments to the rules were adopted including raising the age limit to twenty-one years; increasing the number of studies from three to four; and prohibiting eighth grade students to compete on high school track tenms but allowed on other teams at the discretion of the Board of Control.

Annual Meeting, Watertown, January 1, 1908. Mr. Kirk was elected a member of the Board of Control for a three year term. Arrangements were made to allow Black Hills schools to affiliate with the South Dakota High School Athletic Association. On January 16, 1908, Mr. McDomild turned over the work of Secretary to Mr. Kirk of Aberdeen, and assumed the position of Chairman of the Board of Control, which he has held continuously since that time.

Annual Meeting, Aberdeen, December 31, 1908. Mr. Mc-Donald was reelected a member of the Board of Control. A rule requiring an annual report was adopted though records do not indicate the rule was complied with. The Secretary's report gave the following schools as members at that time: Aberdeen, Alexandria, Berssford, Brookings, Canton, Centerville, Conde, Deadwood, Flandresu, Groton, Huron, Lead, Madison, Mitchell, Parker, Pierre, Platte, Sioux Palls, Tyndall, Vermillion, Wakonda, Watertewn, and Yankton. All of these schools are members of the Association at this time.

At a meeting of the Board of Control at Vermillion, May 22, 1909, Mr. Kirk resigned as member of the Board and Sept. J. R. Byers of Vermillion was appointed to fill the vacancy. About September 1, 1909, Supt. Shallenbarger of Yankton resigned as a member of the Board and Principal O. O. Young of Huron was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Annual Meeting, Lead, November 2, 1909. The appointments of Supt. J. R. Byers and Principal O. O. Young were confirmed. The two-mile event at the track meets was discontinued. Annual Meeting, Huron, November 6, 1910, Supt. J. H. Byers was reelected to succeed himself. A track Meet entry fee of \$2.00 was adopted. It was decided to discontinue the declamatory work in connection with the athletics and to place it in the hands of a special committee to have charge of the organization of this work and the 1911 Declamatory Contest. The State Declamatory Contests had previously been held in-connection with the State Meet. Supt. O. Schlaifer, Vermillion, Chairman, Supt. J. H. Johnson, Aberdeen, and Principal H. Neinhuis of Lead, composed the committee in charge of the declamatory organization.

Annual Meeting, Pierre, November 28, 1911. Mr. McDonald was reclicated a member of the Board of Control. Communication from Huron College asking for a besketball tournament under Association auspices at Huron during March, 1912, and guaranteeing all expenses for eight contestants was accepted. The sending of the winners of the State Meet to the Inter-State Meet at Minneapolia was recommended.

Annual Meeting, Mitchell, November 26, 1912. Supt. T. A. Harmon of Yankton was elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed Mr. Byers.

Annual Meeting, Stoux Palls, November 25, 1913. Principal J. F. Pinkerton of Huron was elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed O. O. Young who had accepted a position in the State Department of Public Instruction. The Secretary reported that the winners of the 1913 State Meet had been sent to the Stagg Meet and the Board was authorized to continue this practice.

Annual Meeting, Deadwood, October 22, 1914. Mr. McDonald was reelected a member of the Board of Control. The Secretary reported that the Association had been unable to defray the expenses of the team to the Stagg Meet, and that the expenses of those who attended were met by their respective schools.

Annual Meeting, Aberdees, November 23, 1915. Principal R. E. Rawlins of Pierre was elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed Mr. Harmon. Many changes were made in the rules and regulations. These included a new annual report rule and a penalty for failure to file such report; eligibility certificate required; participation limited to students in ninth, tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades, except schools having a total enrollment of not more than seventy-five could use seventh and eighth grade pupils except in track and field contests. The Secretary reported that the Association had defrayed the expenses of the 1915 State Track Meet winners to the Stagg Meet.

Annual Meeting, Watertown, November 28, 1916. Supt. R. B. Irons of Rapid City elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed Mr. Pinkerton. The Association took over the control of the Huron College Invitational Tournament at the request of Huron College and an entrance fee of \$1.00 was required. Ex-

penses of contestants to the Stagg Meet were limited to those who tied or broke records at State High School Track and Field Meets. This was later changed to only those who broke records.

Annual Meeting, Sioux Falls, November 36, 1917. Supt. Mc-Donald was reelected a member of the Board of Control. The Board was instructed to district the state for basketball tournaments and only district winners be allowed to compete at the state tournament. The membership of about fifty-five schools was divided into seven districts.

There was no Annual Meeting in 1918 as the South Dakota Educational Association convention was postponed one year on account of the influenza epidemic, and the enforced closing of the schools in many communities. Chairman A. A. McDonaid appointed R. E. Rawlins of Pierre, to remain as Secretary-Treasurer until the next annual meeting. The 1919 Stagg Meet was held too early for the South Dakota contestants, so three entrants were sent to the Interstate Meet at Minneapolls, on May 24, 1919. The membership was divided into 8 districts for the 1919 baskethall tournaments,

Annual Meeting, Mitchell, November 25, 1919. Mr. Rawlins was reelected and Supt. F. A. Henderson was elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed Supt. Irons. A rule was adopted allowing eighth grade students who were under sixteen years of age and enrolled in schools whose total enrollment was less than seventy-five to participate in football without such participation counting as a year of high school athletics.

Board of Control Meeting, Huron, March 19, 1920. Voted to eliminate the Hammer Throw from meet events and the order of events for state meets was adopted. In September, 1920, Supt. C. S. Hall of Belle Fourche was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Board of Control caused by Supt. Henderson leaving the state,

Annual Meeting, Huron, November 21, 1921. Mr. Rawlins was reelected a member of the Board of Control. Medical examination requirement adopted. Javelin Throw added to list of track meet events. Provision authorizing the Board to appoint a committee to decide the football championship adopted. Board of Control authorized to increase number of districts up to sixteen. Ten districts were made for the 1922 tournaments.

Annual Meeting, Pierre, November 27, 1922. Supt. C. S. Hall reelected a member of the Board of Control. Board was authorized to take steps for this Association to join the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations. At a meeting of the Board of Control, November 28, 1922, Mr. Hall was appointed Secretary-Treasurer to take the place of Mr. Rawlins who resigned from the position but retained his place as a member of the Board. The Board decided to make sixteen districts for the 1923 tournaments and meets.

Annual Meeting, Watertown, November 27, 1923. Mr. Mc-Donald was reelected a member of the Board of Control. Amendments included the fifteen hour scholarship requirement; "migratory" student rule; annual dues based on enrollment and no other fees; half mile relay count for points at track meets; and other minor changes.

The expenses of Yankton High School, 1924 South Dakota High School Basketball Champions, were defrayed to the National Tournament at Chicago. This practice was followed until 1929.

Annual Meeting, November 25, 1924, Sioux Falls. Mr. Rawlins was reelected a member of the Board of Control. Several amendments to the basketball and track meet regulations were adopted.

Annual Meeting, Mitchell, November 24, 1925. Principal Rob't, W. Skinner of Rapid City elected to succeed Mr. Hall who had been appointed State High School Inspector. Amendment adopted to include baseball participation by eighth grade students under sixteen years in a high school whose total enrollment was less than sevenity-five, as not counting as year of high school participation.

During the spring of 1926, at the instructions of the members of the Association, Principal L. M. Fort, Mitchell, Supt. O. B. Phillips, Tyndall, Supt. P. D. Selby, Ipawich and Supt. E. P. Voss, Clark were appointed to serve with the Beard of Control as a committee to submit a suggested revision of the rules of the Association at the next annual meeting.

Annual Meeting, Sioux Falls, November 23, 1926. Supt. Mc-Donald reelected a member of the Board of Control. The suggested revised Constitution, with some amendments, was adopted to go into effect September 1, 1927.

The Board of Control adopted the district-region plan for the 1927 tournaments and meets. The membership was divided into 8 regions; and each region, except one, was divided into four districts. The 4 district winners competed at the regional contests; and the eight regional winners at the state contest. 252 schools were members of the Association during 1926.

Annual Meeting held at Aberdeen, November 22, 1927. It was voted to eliminate district meets and to count five places at the regional and state track and field meets. Uniform standardized trophics were adopted for the district, regional and state basketball tournaments and for the regional and state meets. Mr. Bawlins was reelected a member of the Board of Control. The first State High School Tennis and Golf Tournaments were held at Brookings in May, 1928.

Annual Meeting held at Mitchell, November 27, 1928. A number of provisions in regard to the participation of seventh and eight grade students were adopted so us to provide for Junior high school athletics. Rob't. W. Skinner was reelected as a member of the Board of Control.

It was voted to have each district be represented by two schools in the regional basketball tournaments, namely the district winners to be designated as "Class A" and the runners-up "Class B". The winners of the eight regional tournaments would compete at the state tournament, as in previous years. This plan was used only the one year and was not the plan recommended by the State Advisory Committee composed of Supt. E. F. Voss of Clark; Supt. H. A. R. Indall of Garretson; Principal C. H. Rogge of DeSmet; Supt. R. A. Knapp of Presho; Supt. O. B. Phillips of Tyndall; and Principal O. D. Dunbar of Huron.

Annual Meeting held at Rapid City, November 26, 1929. It was voted to require each member school to keep a permanent athletic record book, the binder and yearly filler to be furnished at cost by the Association. Supt. A. A. McDonald was reelected as a member of the Board of Control. Supt. F. E. Conner of Belle Fourche was elected to the Board of Control to serve the balance of the unexpired term of Rob't. W. Skinner who had left the state.

For the 1929 basketball tournaments, two regional tournaments were held in each region, one for the district champions or "Class A" teams, and one for the district runners-up or "Class B" teams. Separate "A" and "B" state tournaments were held for the winners of the "A" and "B" regional tournaments respectively, the "A" State Tournament winner being the state champion.

Since the National Federation of State High School Athletic Association, of which Federation the State High School Athletic Association is a member, had decided to approve no further National Interscholastic Basketball Tournaments, it was decided to discontinue the practice of sending the Bouth Dukota high school champions to the National Tournaments or to send representatives to the Stagg Meets.

Annual Meeting held at Sioux Falls, November 25, 1930. Mr. Rawlins was reelected as a member of the Board of Control. Numerous minor changes were made in the rules and regulations. It was decided to return to the original plan of district, regional and state basketball tournaments as used prior to 1929 and to have no divisions in any of these tournaments.

The 1930 State Advisory Committee was composed of a representative from each of the eight regions and was made up of the following school officials; Supt. E. F. Voss, Clark; Pria. E. H. Korstad of Mobridge; Supt. J. E. Martin of Brookings; Supt. S. Van Voorhis of Redfield; Supt. E. L. Bersagel of Wakonda; Supt. R. H. Bunt of Kimball; Supt. John Bullock of Armour; and Supt. H. R. Woodward of Hot Springs.

Annual Meeting held at Mitchell, November 23, 1931. The draw for place for the 1932 State Basketball Tournament was made at the Annual Meeting. Several changes were made in the rules including the provisions for voting for members of the Board of Control by secret ballets and the prohibiting of athletic relations with non-member South Dakota public high schools. Mr. McDonald was presented with an electric clock in appreciation of his twenty-five years' service on the Board of Control. Mr. Conner was reelected as a member of the Board of Control.

The members of the 1931, State Advisory Committee were Supt. E. F. Vess of Clark; Supt. D. W. Davis of Timber Lake; Supt. J. E. Martin of Brookings; Prin. O. D. Dunbar of Huron; Supt. E. L. Bermgel of Wakonda; Supt. R. H. Bunt of Kimball; Supt. C. A. Beaver of Yankton; and Supt. H. R. Woodward of Hot Springs.

Annual Meeting held at Rapid City, November 22, 1952. Several clarifying amendments were adopted in regard to the rule providing for athletic residence transfer certificates; the Mile Relay was added to the list of event for the 1933 meets; and it was voted to continue the football throw as a field event. (This event had been adopted for the 1932 meets in place of the javelin throw which was discontinued.) A new order of events for regional and state meets was adopted. The Board of Control was instructed to manage and conduct the state basketball tournament or make such arrangements for the tournament as the Board deemed advisable. However, on account of the uncertain financial conditions no change was made in the management of the tournament but arrangements were made for the Association to receive a larger share of the net proceeds should they have exceeded \$1400.00. Mr. A. A. McDonald was reelected as a member of the Board of Control. The Flandreau Indian High School was made eligible for membership.

The members of the 1932 State Advisory Committee were Supt. E. F. Voss of Clark; Supt. C. L. Eskelson of McIntosh; Supt. J. E. Martin of Brookings; Supt. S. Van Voorhis of Redfield; Supt. E. L. Bersagel of Wakonda; Supt. R. H. Bunt of Kimball; Supt. J. W. Poynter of Winner; and Supt. H. R. Woodward of Hot Springs.

Annual Meeting held at Sioux Falls, November 28, 1933. The Pine Ridge Indian School was made eligible for membership. The rules were amended to allow a four-year trained osteopath to make the physical examination as well as a doctor of medicine; and to change the rule in regard to leaving school during a semester to definitely provide for only two reasons which would allow a student to be eligible upon his return. Changes in the Track and Field Meet regulations which were approved were those allowing each school to enter not more than three men in each event in a regional meet; that only four places shall count for points in the regional and state meets with places counting five, three, two, and one, respectively; and that teams be placed in the state relay heats according to the times made in these events in

the regional meets. Supt. R. E. Rawlins of Pierre was reelected as a member of the Board of Control for a period of three years.

The members of the 1933 State Advisory Committee were Supt. E. F. Vess of Clark; Supt. E. A. Poole of McLaughlin; Supt. J. E. Martin of Brookings; Supt. H. A. R. Indall of Highmore; Supt. C. C. Jacobson of Canton; Supt. R. H. Bunt of Kimball; Supt. Q. L. Wright of Gregory; and Supt. H. R. Woodward of Hot Springs.

# AN ATHLETIC CODE

for

# Athletic Directors and Coaches

The Athletic Director, or Business Manager, and Couch are the official representatives of the school in interscholastic athletic activities. In this important capacity these standards should be practiced:

#### BY THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

### The Athletic Policy of the school should

- (1) He definitely understood with director's responsibility clearly defined
- (2) Include only those schedules which are educationally and physically sound for the athlete
- (3) Cooperate with community in making a character building athletic program
- (4) Refuse admission to athletic contests to persons who have shown a chronic lack of sportsmanship.

#### The Securing of Officials should include

- (1) Mutual confidence and agreement by both teams
- (2) Complete support of officials in cases of adverse rulings
- (3) Definite contractual agreements naming fee, expenses, and time and place of game.

#### Game Preparation involves

- (1) Provision of programs giving rule changes, names of players and officials, and emphasizing good sportsmanship
- (2) Proper handling of crowds so there is no encroachment on playing space
- (3) Maintaining side lines for exclusive use of players, coaches, and officials.

#### BY THE COACH

### The School may expect

- (1) Work of the coach to be an integral part of the system with
- (2) Mastery of the principles of pedagogy and consequent improvement in teaching as well as coaching
- (3) Loyalty to superiors in making athletics fit into the general school program
- (4) Insistence upon high scholarship and enforcement of all rules of eligibility.

### The Athletes may expect

- (1) A genuine and up-to-date knowledge of that which the coach proposes to teach
  - (2) Fair, unprejudiced relationship with the boys
- (3) Careful attention to the physical condition of players at the time of each contest
- (4) Competent and trustworthy officials whose decisions will always be supported.

#### Sportsmanship includes

- (1) Teaching athletes to win by use of legitimate means only
- (2) Counteracting unfounded rumors of questionable practices by opponents.

#### The Influence of the Coach necessitates

- (1) His being the sort of man he wants boys under him to become
- (2) Discouragement of gambling, profanity, and obscene language at all times.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

January 1st, 1934.

# SOUTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

# ARTICLE I

### NAME

This Association shall be known as the South Dakota High School Athletic Association.

# ARTICLE II OBJECT

The purpose of this organization of South Dakota Public High Schools is to promote high school athletics, to stimulate fair play and by means of rules and regulations equalize athletic opportunity by standardizing qualifications of contestants, conching, treatment of visiting teams, and generally to promote the athletic welfare of member high schools.

# ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of this state and to the University High School of the University of South Dakota, the Eastern High School of the Eastern State Teachers' College, the Flandreau Inmdian High School and the Oglala Indian Bearding School.

Section 2. Any eligible high school of this state becomes a member of this Association by its principal subscribing to the rules and regulations of this Association and the payment of the initial membership fee of \$3.00, which shall entitle the school to compete in tournaments, contests, and track meets of the Association.

Note 1. Schools seeking membership after January 1, 1927, shall submit evidence (e.g., a resolution) showing an approval of the Rules and Regulations of the South Dakota High School Athletic Association and of the application for membership by the local Board of Education.

Note 2. For amount of annual dues in subsequent years see Art. VII. Section 2.

Note 3. In these rules and regulations the word principal shall be interpreted to mean principal of the high school or superintendent of schools.

Section 3. A school may be expelled from this Association by a two-thirds vote of the schools represented at a regular annual meeting, and when so expelled it shall not be re-instated except by a two-thirds vote at a regular annual meeting.

# ARTICLE IV

Section 1. A Board of Control composed of three principals shall be chosen by the Association as follows: at the first meeting, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. At each regular annual meeting thereafter the Association shall elect one principal to serve for three years.

Section 2. The officers of the Board of Control shall consist of chairman, vice-chairman and a secretary-treasurer. These officers shall be elected from the Board of Control by the members of that Board at its first meeting after the regular annual meeting.

Section 2. The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive a salary of \$75.00 a month for twelve months a year, which salary shall include cierical hire.

Section 4. The Secretary-Treasurer shall give such bond as may be fixed by the Board of Control, the premium for which shall be paid from the funds of the Association.

Section 5. Any officer in this Association who severs his connection with the eligible high schools of the state shall thereby lose what office he may hold in this Association.

Section 6. The officers of this Association are hereby authorized to exercise all powers and duties expressed or implied in this constitution.

# ARTICLE V MEETINGS

Section 1. The time and place of the regular annual meeting shall be that of the South Dakota Educational Association.

Section 2. In the transaction of the business of the Annual Meeting, each member school shall have one vote. Voting for members of the Board of Control shall be by secret ballots.

Section 3. Member schools shall be represented at the meetings by the principal of the school or his duly authorized faculty representative.

Section 4. Representatives from ten (10) schools shall constitute a quorum at any regular annual meeting of this Association.

# ARTICLE VI ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. The Board of Control shall have general charge of the affairs of the Association. Two members of the Board of Control shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 2. The Board of Control shall have the power to fill any vacancies which may occur, by the appointment of officers to serve until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall have general supervision over all athletic contests between members of the Association and shall make arrangements for and have charge of all state and district tournaments and meets. At least two members of the Board of Control shall be represented at all state championship contests.

Section 4. The Board of Control may divide the state into districts or divisions and appoint committees to have charge of district or division tournaments and meets.

Section 5. The Board of Control may standardize awards for state, district or division contests.

Section 6. The Board of Control shall interpret the rules of this Association.

Section 7. The Board of Control shall gather data concerning the eligibility of confestants, receive complaints and make rulings on protests.

Note L. Specific cases in which names of schools and students are submitted—not hypothetical cases—will be considered by the board.

Section 8. The Board of Control shall have power to suspend and discipline members and to declare ineligible, athletes representing members.

Section 9. The Board of Control shall determine the penalty for violation of the rules of the Association where not otherwise provided.

Section 10. The Board of Control shall have power to investigate of its own volition.

Section 11. After each Annual Meeting it shall be the duty of the Board of Control to make changes necessary to harmonize the rules and regulations with new amendments and to correct grammatical errors as long as the intent of the rule is not changed.

# ARTICLE VII

Section 1. The Board of Centrol shall determine all necessary expenditures of money.

Section 2. The calendar year shall be the Association membership year. The annual dues of each member shall be on a basis of not more than five cents per pupil enrolled in said school the previous year, the minimum fee to be three dollars; maximum fee, twenty-five dollars, payable January first in advance. Members failing to pay dues shall forfeit membership and re-instatement shall be made only by signing of the membership pledge and the payment of these dues.

Note 1. The enrollment figures shall be based on the high school enrollment figures listed in the previous year's High School Directory compiled by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall present a full report of official business and a complete financial statement to the Association at the Annual Meeting and the accounts of the Board shall have been audited by a certified accountant.

# ARTICLE VIII LOCAL CONTROL

Section 1. The principal of the school or his authorized faculty representative shall be the official representative of the school. In all matters pertaining to the athletic relations of his school he shall be responsible to the State Association.

Section 2. No contest shall be arranged with any team without the sanction of the principal.

Note 1. The Board of Control wishes to urge the advisability of the principal's seling as manager. In case another is authorized to act, all letters, centracts, receipts and documents of every kind passing between schools should be endorsed by the principal and no money should be paid out or obligations incurred without his knowledge and consent. A strict observance of these suggestions will save trouble and misunderstandings.

Note 2. All games shall be contracted for on the Official Association Contract Blanks. These blanks are furnished by the Association to all members upon application to the Secretary.

Section 3. Coaches who are not regularly certified teachers employed by the Board of Education for full time or who receive remuneration for high school coaching from any source other than the Association member employing them are prohibited.

Note 1. The intent of this rule is to keep the entire management of school athletics in the hands of school authorities. It does not preclude the acceptance of help from interested alumni or patrons of the school so long as such persons do not receive any remuneration for this help and so long as the head coach is a recognized member of the school faculty.

Section 4. The principal or duly authorized faculty representative shall accompany the teams to all the games and contests.

Section 5. Whenever the principal or the board of education makes local rules supplementary to but not inconsistent with the rules of this Association, the principal has the authority to exclude a contestant for violation of the local rules. The power of the principal to exclude in such cases is absolute and will not be reviewed by the Board of Control.

Section 6. Pre-season training in football under the direction of a coach prior to September first unless a school is actually in session is prohibited.

Note 1. This has reference to training during the summer menths and does not prohibit any form of athletics during the regular school year. Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent or principal of each school belonging to the South Dakota High School Athletic Association to submit annually to the Secretary of the Board of Control on or before the last day of school upon an official blank, provided for that purpose, the name, date of birth, number of years of participation, and previous schools of participation of every student who has engaged in interscholastic athletics during that school year. Penalty for failing to file such report shall be forfeiture of membership in the Association, Reinstatement to be made only upon filing such a report and the payment of an additional fee of three dollars (\$3.00).

Section 8. No Association school shall be allowed to have athletic relations with any school which has failed to file its annual report until such report is filed.

Section 9. Each school must keep in the permanent record book provided at cost by the Board of Control a complete record of the participation of each student together with such data as may be required by the Board of Control. Failure to keep this record will result in the forfeiture of membership.

A school which has failed to pay for the permanent record book by January first following receipt of same shall lose its membership. For succeeding years the payment for the yearly filler shall be made at the same time as the annual dues and non-payment of same shall result in loss of membership.

#### ARTICLE IX

# PROVISIONS GOVERNING CONTESTS

Section 1. Not more than ten days and not less than five days prior to the contest each principal of the competing schools shall submit, upon an official blank, provided for that purpose, one to the other, a list of the players qualified to represent his school and shall certify to such qualifications over his signature as follows: (1) Place and date of certificate; (2) Name of principal addressed; (3) The following students are eligible to represent this High School in the game to be played at.....on (date) Names of contestants; (5) Date of birth of each contestant; (6) Date of enrollment; (7) Number of full and regular studies carried successfully last semester by each contestant; (8) Number of full and regular studies carried successfully, this semester to date, by each contestant; (9) Number of years in high school athletics previous to this year, of each contestant; (10) Date of medical examination; (11) Name of school if previous experience in another school. No student not eligible five days before the contest can later become eligible for that contest.

Interpretation. The Board of Control has interpreted the words "days" used in this section to refer to "calendar" days rather than school "days".

Note 1. Eligibility lists shall be submitted upon the Official Association Eligibility Blanks. These blanks are furnished by this Association to all members upon application to the Secretary.

Section 2. Each school represented in an athletic contest shall have present throughout the contest a duly accredited faculty representative who shall be responsible to the principal of his school for the conduct of his team and the persons from his school.

Section 3. No contest shall be held with any school not a member of this Association without the permission of the Board of Control. Permission shall not be granted to a member school to have athletic relations with any non-member South Dakota public high school.

Section 4. Members of this Association in all contests, whether with members of the Association or not, must comply with these rules. These rules shall not be waived by agreement or otherwise.

Section 5. No sweater, jersey, trophy or other award exceeding one dolfar in value shall be given by any member of this Association for athletic participation. Any school violating this rule shall be subject to discipline. Any student who accepts a sweater, jersey or other award exceeding one dolfar in value shall be incligible for any further interscholastic contests under the jurisdiction of this Association. This section shall not be construed to prohibit contestants from receiving medals or awards for placing in Association sanctioned athletic contests, meets or tournaments where more than two teams compets provided such medals or awards are the ones regularly offered by the organization sponsoring the contest, meet or tournament.

Note 1. The penalties provided for in this section shall apply when the athlets accepts the award, exceeding one dollar in value, from any club or organization, proceeds of a dance given for the purpose of raising money for sweaters, or through the aid of any school officer and through school help of any kind. The penalties shall not apply when the award is purchased and presented by the athlete parents; or purchased by the athlete with money earned or secured through his own efforts.

Section 6. A school competing in or connected with any athletic contest, meet or tournament not sanctioned by the Board of Control shull be liable to discipline. All sanctioned contests, tournaments and meets shall be listed in the Association column in the South Dakota Educational Journal.

Note 1. Upon request the Secretary will furnish information and approval blanks to schools or organizations wishing to sponsor sanctioned athletic contests, meets or tournaments.

Note 2. In conformity with the instructions given at the 1926 Annual Meeting, the Board of Control approves no girls' basketball tournaments. Note 3. All inter-state tournaments and meets must be approved by the secretary of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations; and all entries to such tournaments and meets must have the sanction of the secretary of the state high school athletic association. This is required by the rules of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

Section 7. All football gridirons shall be inclosed by a wire fence with ample room between the side lines of the playing field and the fence and only players, officials and coaches shall be permitted inside the enclosure.

Section 8. The home team in any contest shall be held responsible for the treatment of visitors including officials, while in the city; visiting schools will be held responsible for the conduct of visitors. Any infraction of the spirit of this rule may subject a school to discipline by the Board of Control.

Section 9. No contest shall be played with a school under expulsion or suspension. Violation of this rule shall be sufficient grounds for suspension.

Section 10. Expenses shall be allowed for sixteen men including the principal or his representative for a football team and a proportionate number for baseball, basketball and track teams; or schools may mutually agree on a specified money contract.

Section 11. There shall be no attempt to determine the state high school football championship and no team shall schedule games in order to determine such state championship.

## ARTICLE X

# ELIGIBILITY OF PLAYERS

To represent a school in this Association in any afhletic contest a student must be eligible under the following rules;

Section 1. He shall not have reached his twenty-first birthday. Each candidate for a team shall sign a statement giving the day, month, and year of his birth. This statement shall be taken as a legitimate basis for the principal's certificate of eligibility until evidence to the contrary is found.

Note 1. A student becomes ineligible for any further interscholastic athletic participation upon his twenty-first birthday.

Section 2. No person shall take part for more than four years on athletic teams representing a school or schools offering work of secondary rank. Participation in any part of a game or athletic contest on the team representing the school shall be counted as a "year" of athletics for that school year except as provided for in Article X, Section 3, Note 1.

(Reling. It has been held that participation on teams representing non-Association schools offering work of secondary rank shall count as "years" of athletic participation for any student who later enrolls in an Association school.) Section 3. All contestants shall be bona-fide members of the school in good standing and are limited to ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades; no student classified below the regular ninth grade is eligible to take part in any interscholastic high school contest except as provided for in this section.

Seventh and eighth grade students may take part in high school athletic contests provided they are under sixteen years of age, have made passing grades in at least three-fourths of the hours work required by the regular course during the previous semester and are doing likewise for the current semester and fulfill all other requirements of this Association. Seventh grade students shall have completed the work of the first six grades of the elementary school by the close of the previous semester.

Note 1. Participation by seventh and eighth grade students shall not count as years of athletic participation. This note shall be interpreted to include students now in school who participated in interscholastic athletics while in the seventh and eighth grades and were under sixteen years of age at the time of such participation.

Nets L. A seventh or eighth grade student becomes insligible for any interscholastic athletic competition upon his sixteenth birthday and remains ineligible until he has successfully completed at least three-fourths of the regular studies of the eighth grade and is enrolled in at least three full and regular minth grade subjects.

Note 2. School systems having separate junter and senior high school organizations which sponeor junior high school interscholastic athletic competition shall not allow any student enrolled in the junfor high school to represent the senior high school in athletic competition.

Section 4. All contestants shall have successfully completed at least fifteen hours of high school work per week (as approved for graduation in accredited schools by the State High School Inspector) the preceding semester and shall have done passing work in at least fifteen hours of high school work from the beginning of the current semester up to the time the certificate of eligibility is given.

Note 1. The requirements for studies of the preceding semester shall apply to studies in a former school in case of a student coming from another high school.

Nate 2. Previous semester shall be the last preceding semester in which the student was in attendance at any secondary school.

Note 2. The record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester may not be made up in a subsequent semester or during summer school for qualification purposes that semester; "incomplete" or "conditioned" at the end of a semester counts as a failure.

The "Summer Project" in Smith-Hughes Agriculture will be considered an exception to this rule. Since the requirements do not aflow for its completion before the close of the summer months, this subject will be considered as "complete" for athletic purposes if all other requirements are met by the close of the regular school year and the project has been kept up-to-date at the time eligibility is required.

Note 4. For the purpose of determining athletic eligibility, the first semester shall be considered to end at midnight, Saturday of the last week of the semester.

(Ruling, A student who has been ineligible during the first semester and who becomes eligible for second semester competition cannot be included on an eligibility list before midnight of Saturday of the last week of the semester, and since the eligibility list must under Article IX, Section 1 be submitted at least five days before a contest, such a student cannot compete earlier than midnight of the following Thursday.)

Note 5. Fifteen hours shall be three subjects of at least five fortyminute recitations per week, the preparation of which has taken as much ar more time. In all subjects requiring ne outside preparation it shall mean five recitations per week at least eighty minutes in length.

Section 5. No student shall be eligible to compete in any Association contest who is a graduate of a regular four-year high school or who is a graduate of a secondary school which has the same regularements for graduation as a regular four-year high school or who has had fifteen units on any regular graduation date and has been in attendance eight semesters, or who has fulfilled graduation requirements at the end of the first semester in a high school which has regular mid-year promotions.

Note I. A student graduating on the last day of the first semester would be eligible to compete even though the diploma was presented to him earlier in the day or week. His actual school attendance of record does not end until midnight of the last day of the semester. If any second semester ends before any sanctioned meet is held, graduating seniors are eligible to compete as though the school were in session.

Section 6. No student who has ever participated in athletics in any institution of learning higher than secondary rank shall be eligible to play under the rules of this Association.

Section 7. No student shall be eligible to play in any association contest who has not been enrolled as a regular student not later than the beginning of the sixteenth school day of the current semester.

(Railing. The Board of Control has no authority to waive this rule regardless of the reason for the late enrollment.)

Section 8. No student sall be eligible for the remainder of the semester, if his school connection shall have lapsed for a period of more than ten consecutive days (disabling illuess of self or immediate family excepted.) Section 9. A student shall be an amateur, one who has never used and is not now using his knowledge of athletics or his athletic skill for gain.

Note L. A paid player or one who uses his athletic skill for gain is interpreted as one who receives money in excess of the amount necessary to cover actual hotel bills and actual fares or transportation. The acceptance of money for conshing, uthletic instruction or for efficiating will har from South Dakota High School Athletic competition.

(Rulling. The Board of Control has ruled that until the Board is instructed otherwise by the Association it will hold that a paid player is one who receives in excess of reimbursement of the actual amount spent for his personal lodgings and meals and a single round trip railroad or licensed hus fare unless transportation is actually secured for a less amount. Acceptance of money for any other item, including equipment, or any allowance for the expenses of a coach or "second" shall be considered as receiving money in excess of personal expenses.)

Section 10. A student shall always have contested under his own name.

Section 11. In case a student is obliged to leave school within a semester because of serious personal illness or death in the immediate family, he shall not be debarred from sligibility on his return during the same or later semester if he was fulfilling the requirements of scholarship at the time he left school provided in the case of a student leaving school because of illness, an affidavit by the attending physician shall be filed with the Board of Coutrol, certifying that such illness was of such severity as to prevent the student from attending school for the balance of the semester.

(Interpretation. Any student leaving school during a semester for any cause other than specifically provided for in this section is not eligible upon his return to school during the same or later semester. Absence from school it not considered as leaving school, and a student who has been absent would not be eligible upon his return to school until he has made up the work missed and secured passing grades in three full and regular subjects from the beginning of the semuster, provided his period of absence was not more than len consecutive school days, unless due to disabiling illness of self or immediate family.)

Section 12. Any student who shall change secondary school systems except upon change of residence of parent or legal guardian shall be ineltgible to compete in athletics in the school of the place to which he has removed for a period of thirty-six weeks or one school year unless a certificate as provided for in Note 1 is filed with the secretary of the Board of Control.

Note I. A certificate signed by the principal of the school left for the current year, on a blank furnished by the Board of Control, must be filed with the Secretary and shall certify that the school left feels that the change of school systems is not being made for athletic reasons, that no outside influence was used to cause the student to leave the first school; and that the first school is willing that the student represent the second school in athletic competition.

The Board of Control shall have the power to nullify an athletic residence transfer certificate if it is found that influence was used to cause the student to change schools or that the change was for athletic reasons.

(The Board of Control was instructed to rule that an out-of-state student who is not eligible for athletics under the rules of his own state high school athletic association, is not eligible for athletics in South Dakota high schools unless his parents have actually moved to this state.)

Note 2. A student who has completed the full course of a one, two or three year high school and a certificate to that effect from the principal of the school which he has left has been filed with the Secretary of the Board of Control shall have an athletic residence in the school of his choice.

Note 2. This section shall not be interpreted to bar any student from having an athletic residence in the school district in which his parents reside.

Note 4. This section shall not be interpreted to include students who change from a non-accredited to an accredited high school.

Note 5. In case the parents of a student move within or into a non-high school district the pupil shall become eligible in the school of his choice immediately if at the beginning of a semester or after establishing his residence by one month's attendance if within a semester.

Note 4. For the purpose of this rule guardianships will met be recognised when either parent is living and legally competent.

Section 13. After a pupil has become a member of a squad he shall not take part in a contest on an independent team in the same sport until his squad has closed its season for that sport. This shall include all time between the opening of school in the fail and the closing of school in the spring including holidays and vacations. A pupil may play on an independent team during the summer vacation or when not a member of the high school squad. This section shall be interpreted retro-actively.

Note 1. Being a member of a team shall be construed as taking part in a regularly scheduled game where admission is charged and spectators admitted.

Note 2. This section shall not effect students who are members of the state championship team of the South Dakota American Legion Baseball League who may compete in American Legion elimination contests after the opening of school in the fall.

(Rullag. The Board of Control has ruled that the "acason" in any sport shall include the entire school year. Therefore any student

who after becoming a member of the baseball squad for the fall schedule plays on an independent team is ineligible for the balance of that school year. The same would be true of any sport which has both fall and spring schedules, such as baseball, teunis, golf, etc.)

Section 14. No student shall be allowed on the field of play during an interscholastic contest in the athletic uniform of his school if he is not eligible.

Section 15. Every student participating in interscholastic contests whether held in or out of the state must be able to qualify for such participation under the rules and regulations of the South Dakota High School Athletic Association without regard to any other requirements. In interstate athletic contests the rules of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations shall have precedence over those of this Association in case of conflicts.

Section 16. Enrollment in a school for a period of fifteen days or competition in one or more interscholastic contests shall be considered enrollment for a semester under these rules.

Section 17. Any student going from one secondary school to another must have filed with the principal of the second school a certificate, upon an official blank provided for that purpose, from the principal of the school left, showing his eligibility under the athletic rules before being allowed to compete in any contest.

Section 18. Each school year all candidates for membership on any high school athletic team shall have their parents' consent to compete and shall be certified by a duly-licensed doctor of medicine or a duly licensed four-year trained osteopath, upon official blanks provided for these purposes, previous to competition on any high school athletic team. A column shall be provided on the official eligibility blank for the date of such examination, which date shall be required when eligibility lists are submitted by the school officials.

# ARTICLE XI

Section 1. Any violation of the rules of this Association shall render the school offending liable to suspension by the Board of Control.

Section 2. Charges against any school for violating the rules of this Association, violation of the spirit of fair play and good sportsmanship or violation of its athletic contract shall be filed in writing with the Secretary. The Secretary shall, within five days of receipt of charges, submit copies of the charges to each of the members of the Board of Control and the offending school, Written answer to the charges shall be made to the Secretary by the school against which charges have been preferred within ten days

of the date of the Secretary's notification. Such answer shall be transmitted to each member of the Board of Control who shall send to the Secretary his decision as soon as all evidence is filed. A majority of such decisions shall decide the case and the Secretary shall then announce the action of the Board of Control to both schools concerned. Provided however, that if the Board of Control thinks best a hearing may be held after giving notice of time and place to both schools concerned. No suspension shall be for a longer time than one year.

Section 3. In case of complaints against schools for violation of the rules the Board of Control may suspend for one year any school whose case is represented by lawyers or delegations of any sort other than bona fide school officials.

Section 4. It shall be considered dishonorable and contrary to good sportsmanship to withhold evidence against any player or any school longer than five days without presenting same to the principal or superintendent of the school concerned or the Secretary of the Board of Control.

Section 5. No school shall fail to meet a regularly scheduled game without receiving at least one week in advance permission from the Board of Centrol to cancel the contract; such permission being mailed simultaneously by the Board of Centrol to both schools concerned. Any school failing to meet a game without receiving this permission from the Board of Centrol shall be barred from school competition in inter-school series, games and contests for one year and the game cancelled shall be considered forfeited by the school cancelling the contract. Provided, however, that the two schools may mutually cancel a game.

Nete 1. The Beard of Control shall give no consideration to protested contests where the official association contract blanks were not used, or if the plaintiff has failed to comply with the regulations of the association governing interscholastic contests.

Section 6. Any student in any school belonging to this association may be barred from participating in athletic contests for violation of any of the rules of this association.

Section 7. The Board of Control shall have power to reinstate any student who has been suspended from participation in athletic contests on account of infraction of any of the rules and regulations of the association, if in the opinion of the Board, the infraction was committed through ignorance. Such reinstatement may take place after one year's suspension.

# AUTHORITY

Section 1. The rules outlined in the official handbook of the Intercollegiate Association of Ameteur Athletics of America shall govern the track and field athletics of this association, except that the order and number of events shall be determined by the Board of Control.

Section 2. In basketball the Official Basketball Rules adopted by the Joint Basketball Committee shall govern. In football, baseball and any other contests, which may be supervised by this association the official rules shall govern. In all girls' basketball games, Spalding's Girl's Basketball Rules shall be strictly adhered to.

Section 3. In all matters not herein determined the Bourd of Control shall have absolute authority until the next regular annual meeting.

Section 4. The rules of this Association shall apply to all forms of athletics and interscholastic athletic contests maintained by the schools of the Association.

Section 5. All amendments go into effect January 1 following the annual meeting at which the change was made.

Section 6. An authorized South Dakota High School Athletic Association column shall be published in the issues of the South Dakota Educational Association Journal.

Section 7. These rules and regulations may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of all schools represented, provided such amendment shall have been submitted to the Secretary of the Board of Control in sufficient time that copies of such proposed amendment may be sent to all members of the Association at least thirty days previous to the regular meeting.

## RESOLUTION ADOPTED NOVEMBER 23, 1926

At the 1926 annual meeting of this Association it was moved seconded and passed that the Association recommend that the Board of Control do not sanction any basketball tournaments for girls.

# NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATIONS

The South Dakota High School Athletic Association is a member of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and has duly subscribed to the rules and regulations of that body. The function of that organization is to regulate all interstate high school athletic contexts of all kinds. This Association is by vote of its members committed to the enforcement of these rules and regulations. The annual meeting of the National Federation is held at the time of the annual meeting of the Department of Superintendence in February. The present officers are:

#### for

## Students and Others

"Sportsmanship is that quality of honor that desires always to be courtsous, fair, and respectful, and it is interpreted in the conduct of players, spectators, coaches, and achool authorities." Fielding H. Yost

# High School Students

Should set a good example in the matter of sportsmanship and should quickly condemn unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of either other students or adults. To this end they should—

- (1) Remember that a student spectator represents his school the same as does the athlete.
- (2) Recognize that the good name of the school is more valuable than any game won by unfair play.
- (3) Respond with enthusiasm to the calls of the cheer leader for yells in support of the team especially when it is losing.
- (4) Learn the rules of the various athletic games so that either as spectators or critics they will be intelligent.
  - (5) Accept decisions of officials without question.
- (6) Express disapproval of rough play or poor sportsmanship on the part of players representing the school.
- (7) Express disapproval of any abusive remarks from the side-
- (8) Recognize and applaud an exhibition of fine play or good sportsmanship on the part of the visiting team.
  - (b) Be considerate of the injured on the visiting team.
- (10) Insist on the courteous treatment of the visiting team as it passes through the streets or visits the local school building, and satend the members every possible courtesy.
- (11) Acquaint the adults of the community and the grade pupils with the ideals of sportsmanship that are acceptable to the high school.
- (12) Impress upon the community its responsibility for the exercise of self-control and fair play at all athletic contests.
- (13) Advocate that any spectator who continually evidences poor sportsmanship be requested not to attend future contests.
- (14) Insist on fair, courteous, and truthful accounts of athletic contests in local papers.
- (15) Be familiar with the state rules of eligibility and support their strict enforcement.
- (14) Encourage the full discussion of fair pluy, sportsmanship, and school spirit through class work and auditorium programs in order to discover ways by which students and schools can develop and demonstrate good sportsmanship.

# QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

(Compiled from decisions of the Board of Control)

## MEMBERSHIP

1. Question. What schools are eligible for membership in the

South Dakota High School Athletic Association?

Answer. Any South Dakota public high school, the University High School of the University of South Dakota, the Eastern High School of the Eastern State Teachers' College, the Flandreau Indian High School and the Oglala Indian Boarding School are eligible for membership in the SDHSAA.

 Q. May parochial high schools, Indian schools or any type of private school become a member of the SDHSAA?

A. No, except as provided for under Question 1.

3. Q. How may an eligible school become a member?

- A. Any eligible school may become a member by showing an approval of the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA by the signing of the membership pledge by the local Board of Education and the high school principal, and by paying the initial fee of three dollars (\$3.00):
- 4. Q. What does a school receive for its SDHSAA membership fee?
- A. It is entitled to have athletic relations with other Association schools, to compete in Association tournaments and meets, to compete in other approved tournaments and meets, to become a member of an athletic conference with other Association schools, to be furnished with official blanks, rule books and bulletins, and to secure information and decisions in regard to athletic questions.

## ADMINISTRATION

- 5. Q. Who has general charge of the affairs of the SDHSAA?
- A. A Board of Control composed of three members elected by the members of the Association at annual meetings.
- 6. Q. Does the Board of Control have power to make, amend or waive a rule of this Association?
- A. No. The Board of Control has power only to "interpret" the rules of this Association. Rules are made, amended or deleted at the annual meetings of this Association. The Board of Control does have the power to suspend and discipline member schools for violations of the Rules and to rule on the eligibility of athletes representing member schools. In all matters not covered by the rules, the Board has absolute authority until the next annual meeting.

#### FUNDS

7. Q. When are annual dues payable?

A. On or before January first of each year, as the calendar year, not the school year, is the Association membership year.

- 8. Q. Are annual dues based on the enrollment for the current school year?
- A. No. Annual dues are based on the enrollment figures listed in the High School Directory for the previous year. That is the 1934 dues are based on the figures listed in the 1932-1933 High School Directory.
- 9. Q. Are the annual dues based on exactly five cents per pupil?
- A. The annual dues are not more than five cents per pupil, with a minimum of three dollars and a maximum of twenty-five dollars. The dues are based on a schedule adopted by the Board of Control and approved by the Association at its 1927 Annual Meeting.

- 10. Q. What are the dues of the SDHSAA for membership in the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations?
- A. The National Federation's dues are fifty cents for each thousand pupils enrolled in all SDHSAA schools. The 1934 dues paid were \$8.25. There were 33,202 students enrolled in all of the member schools, but the past two years there has been a rebate of fifty per cent in the dues.
  - 11. Q. How are the funds of the SDHSAA invested?
- A. In registered U. S. Government bonds, U. S. Land Bank bonds, and the funds for running expenses are in the two Pierre banks.
  - 12. Q. Who audits the financial records of the SDHSAA?
- A. An annual audit is made by a certified public accountant. The complete report of the auditor is printed in the November Bulletin which is distributed to the members.

#### LOCAL CONTROL

- 12. Q. Who is the responsible party in a SDHSAA school?
- A. The principal of the school is responsible to the State Association for all matters pertaining to the athletic relations of his school. He may delegate this authority to a faculty representative but the principal will be held responsible to the SDHSAA.
  - 14. Q. To whom may the word "principal" refer?
  - A. To the high school principal or the superintendent of schools.

- 15. Q. Who are the proper officials to sign game contracts?
- A. The high school principal and the faculty manager.
- 16. Q. May student managers contract for athletic contests?
- A. No. No contest shall be contracted for except by the principal or his authorized faculty representative.
  - 17. Q. How may official contract blanks be secured?
  - A. By writing the Secretary's office.
- 18. Q. Shall official contract blanks be used for all inter-school contests or only for first team contests?
- A. Official contract blanks shall be used for all inter-school athletic contests.
- 19. Q. May games be scheduled without written contracts and the games called "practice games"?
- A. No. Official contracts must be used for all inter-school contests.
- 20. Q. Shall official contracts be used for contests with nonmember teams?
- A. Yes. Official contracts shall be used by Association schools for all inter-school contests. For out-of-state contests, official interstate contract blanks may be secured from the Secretary's Office.
- 21. Q. If contracts specify that a first team shall participate, can a second team be used?
  - A. No. unless the contract is changed by mutual agreement.
- 22. Q. If game contracts do not clearly specify first or second team, what team is understood as competing?
- A. The first team. It is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the team.
- 23. Q. If game contracts do not definitely specify whother un afternoon or an evening game of football is to be played, what time is understood?
- A. An afternoon game is understood. It is recommended that contracts definitely specify if an evening game is to be played.
- 24. Q. May a party not connected with the school act as assistant coach?
- A. Yes, under certain conditions provided that the head coach is a regularly certified teacher employed for full time by his Board of Education; provided that the principal or his authorized faculty representative be the official representative of the school and be responsible in all matters pertaining to the athletic relations of the school; provided that the principal is responsible for the arrangements and contracts for all contests; and provided that the principal or his authorized faculty representative accompany the team to all contests and be present throughout these contests. An assistant coach not connected with the school could receive no remuneration of any sort, either directly or indirectly, for his work.

- 25. Q. What is considered as remuneration for such an assistant coach?
- A. The acceptance either directly or indirectly of any money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., from any source for such coaching services would be considered as receiving remuneration.
  - 26. Q. Who may coach a high school team?
- A. Any regularly certified teacher in an Association school's system, either high school or grades, who is regularly employed for full time as such by the Board of Education of that school district and who receives no remuneration for his educational or coaching work, either directly or indirectly, from any source other than the school district employing him, may qualify as the high school coach.
  - 27. Q. May men coach girls in athletic games?
- A. This is a matter for local jurisdiction since the SDHSAA does not have any rule covering this matter. It is recommended that women coaches be employed for girls.
- 28. Q. Is a principal's authority to exclude a contestant for the violation of a local rule, final?
  - A. Yes, unless the local rule violates an Association rule.
- 29. Q. Are the local requirements of SDHSAA schools for the awarding of letters for athletic competition final? ?
- A. Yes. The Association has no rule covering this point, except the award must not exceed one dollar in value.
- 30. Q. Does the SDHSAA have a rule regarding the use of tobacco?
- A. No. This matter properly belongs to the local school officials.
- 31. Q. May the rules of a local school be changed or special examinations be given in order to make students eligible?
- A. The SDHSAA expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Athletes should be under the same school rules as non-athletes.
  - 32. Q. May a married student be considered eligible?
- A. As far as the SDHSAA is concerned a married student is on the same basis as any other student. A school might make a local rule on this matter.
- 13. Q. May a school have football practice under the direction of a coach prior to September first?
- A. No, not unless the school is actually in session at that time.
  - 34, Q. When shall annual reports be filed?
- A. Annual reports shall be filed with the Secretary's office on or before the last day of the school year of the local school.
  - 35. Q. Where may annual report blanks be secured?

- A. A supply of official annual report blanks is included in the annual permanent record book fillers sent to each member school in September. Any member school not receiving this filler should notify the Secretary's office.
- 16. Q. Is the Secretary's office responsible for supplying annual report blanks or for notifying school officials of the date of filing the annual report?
- A. "No. The responsibility of securing official annual report blanks and filing such report is that of the local principal. Failure to file the annual report on account of not receiving blanks is not a valid excuse for waiving the reinstatement fee of three dollars.
- 37. Q. Is the reinstatement fee waived if the annual report is not filed at the time required and all of the executive officials of the schools are changed during the following year?
- A. No. There is no provision for the waiving of the reinstatement fee under this or any other condition, when the annual report has not been filed at the time required.
- 38. Q. Are Association schools barred from having athletic relations with a school delinquent in its annual report, only for the following year or until the report is filed?
  - A. Until the report is filed.

#### PROVISIONS GOVERNING CONTESTS

- 39. Q. How may eligibility blanks be secured?
- A. By writing the Secretary's office.
- 40. Q. When shall eligibility lists be sent?
- A. Not more than ten calendar days and not later than five calendar days prior to a contest.
  - 41. Q. To whom shall eligibility lists be sent?
- A. To the Principal of each school or the manager of each independent team with which an Association school has athletic relations.
- 42. Q. May a student not eligible at the time of filing the eligibility list five days before the contest later become eligible for that contest?
- A. No. Only students eligible at the time of filing the eligibility list five days prior to the contest and included on that list can compete in that contest.
- 43. Q. May a student whose case is pending with the Board of Control at the time of filing eligibility list be included on that list?
- A. Yes. Such a student may be included with the notation that his case is pending before the Board of Control. If the decision of eligibility is secured prior to the contest, the student may compete; otherwise he is ineligible for that contest.

- 44. Q. Does a student who is scholastically eligible for a contest at the time of sending the eligibility list, but who becomes scholastically ineligible after that time, but prior to the contest, remain scholastically eligible for that contest?
- A. Yes, Such a student's eligibility from a scholastic standpoint is based on his record at the time of filing the eligibility list five days before the contest and not on his scholastic record at the time of the contest. This answer is based on the assumption that the eligibility list is not sent earlier than 10 days and not later than 5 days prior to the contest. If sent earlier than 10 days, a student might become scholastically ineligible for the contest.
- 45. Q. Is it necessary to secure permission from the Board of Control to have athletic relations with independent teams?
- A. According to the literal wording of the rule, it is only necessary to secure permission for contests with non-Association schools but according to the spirit of the rule and the usual custom of the member schools, permission should be secured for any athletic contest with a non-Association team.
- 46, Q. May member schools schedule contests with out-of-state schools or teams?
- A. Upon application permission will be granted by the Board of Control for single contests with out-of-state schools in good standing in their own state athlatic associations or with schools not eigible for such membership. Permission will not be granted for contests with out-of-state schools under suspensation or expulsion from their state associations.
- 47. Q. May permission be secured to have athletic relations with non-Association South Dakota public high schools?
- A. No, such permission cannot be granted. A South Dakota public high school must become a member of this Association in order to have any athletic relations with Association schools.
- 48. Q. May member schools secure permission to play against South Dakota non-public high schools, Indian Schools, colleges and independent teams?
- A. Yes. Permission may be secured to play against such teams in single games, but not in tournaments or meets. In all athletic relations with non-Association teams the member schools must ablde by all Association rules and regulations. Non-Association teams are not required to comply with SDHSAA rules.
- 49. Q. May an Association school have athletic relations with an independent team composed partly of or entirely of students enrolled in a suspended High School?
- A. No. To allow Association schools to have athletic relations with such a team would be contrary to the intent of the Association rules.

#### PROVISIONS GOVERNING CONTESTS

- 50. Q. In case one school has an insufficient number of eligible contestants, may ineligible contestants be used if agreeable to the opposing team?
- A. No. All contestants must be eligible. The Association rules make no exception.
- 51. Q. In case a school has an insufficient number of eligible contestants, may eligible contestants from the opposing school, make up the defficiency?
- A. No. A contestant must be a bona fide student in the school which he represents in an athletic contest.
- 52. Q. May ineligible students be used against non-Association teams?
- A. No. All contestants representing an Association school in athletic competition must fulfill all Association requirements, regardless of whether or not the opposing team represents an Association school.
- 53. Q. May ineligible students be used on other than first teams?
- A. No. All contestants representing an Association school in athletic competition must fulfill all Association requirements, regardless of whether or not it is first team competition.
- 54. Q. May two or more high schools combine to form one athletic team?
- A. No. Students must be bona fide members of the schools which they represent in athletic competition, therefore a combination team cannot be allowed whether in contests with an Association school or not.
- 55. Q. May a High School schedule and play games during the week?
- A. The SDHSAA has no ruling in regard to this matter. The North Central Association of Secondary Schools recommends that its member schools have no interscholastic athletic contests scheduled on a night preceding a school day.
- 56. Q. What prizes or awards may be given by a member school to its athletic contestants?
- A. Only such prizes or awards as may be of not more than one dollar in value.
- 57. Q. May an Association school give sweaters or other awards of more than one dollar in value, for athletic participation to graduating athletes?
- A. No. The Rules provide that such action shall subject a school to discipline.
- 58. Q. May an Association school give awards of more than one dollar in value, for intra-school athletic competition?

- A. No. Both the school giving such awards and the students receiving them would be guilty of a violation of the Association rule.
- 59. Q. May a school allow students to use their cars for transportation for athletic teams, receiving only gas and oil, and the money saved over usual transportation charges be used to buy sweaters or other awards for individual athlete's ownership?
- A. No. Such action would result in the school being subject to discipline and the students would be ineligible.
- 60. Q. Is it permissible for a school or its athletes or any organization or individual or individuals to sponsor special shows or other entertainments for the purpose of raising funds to purchase sweaters for high school athletes?
- A. No. Such a procedure is a violation of Article X, Section 5. 61. Q. May Association schools give awards of more than one dollar in value to athletes, the awards being based on scholarship, sportsmanship, conduct, etc?
- A. No. Since these awards would be limited to athletes, they are in violation of the Association rule. General awards based on scholarship, sportsmanship, conduct, etc., may be given where there is no consideration of athletic competition or ability.
- 62. Q. May students, either athlotes or non-athletes, secure magazine subscriptions or raise funds in other ways for the purchase of sweaters for athletes?
- A. No. Such methods are contrary to the intent of the rule.
  63. Q. May a student accept an award of more than one dollar in value for athletic competition on an independent team?
- A. No. Awards of more than one dollar in value, for athletic competition can only be accepted at tournaments or meets sponsored by or sanctioned by this Association.
- 64. Q. May athletes receive amounts of less than one dollar from several sources whether or not connected with the school and use the total sum to purchase a medal or other award of more than one dollar in value?
- A. No, for two reasons. First the acceptance of any amount of money violates an athlete's amateur standing. Second, the purchase of any award of more than one dollar in value from funds secured in such a manner renders the athlete ineligible, as it is contrary to the intent of the rule. If such funds were given by the school either directly or indirectly the school would be liable to discipline.
- 65. Q. May a school pay one dollar towards the cost of an award and the athlete or his parents pay the balance?
- A. No, for then the athlete would receive an award of more than one dollar in value. The idea is that awards for athletic competition shall be such as shall have no monetary value.
  - 66, Q. What awards may be accepted by an athlete?

- A. Only such award as may be of not more than one dollar in value unless given by the management of a tournament, meet or other athletic event sponsored or approved by the Board of Control or the National Federation of State High School Athletic Association.
- 67. Q. Is there any legitimate way in which an athlete can secure an honor or school sweater?
- A. Only when bought by his parents from their usual source of income or through the usual means of securing his other clothing.
- 68,Q. Does the SDHSAA allow girls' inter-school athletic con-
- A. Such contests are not prohibited by this Association but the matter is left entirely to the local schools. The North Central Association of Secondary Schools does recommend that its member schools do not participate in any form of girls' interscholastic basketball games or tournaments.
- 69. Q. Are girls' basketball teams allowed to compete in tournaments?
- A. No. The Board of Control has been instructed to approve no girls' basketball tournaments.
- 70, Q. May a giris' basketball exhibition game be held in connection with a boys' basketball tournament?
- A. No. One of the requirements of approval for a boys' basket ball tournament is that a girls' game shall not be held in connection with it.
- 71. Q. Does the Board of Control approve girls' tennis tournaments or track meets?
- A. No. The Board of Control approves no girls' tournaments or meets where more than two schools are competing.

#### ELIGIBILITY OF PLAYERS

- 72. Q. When is a high school student ineligible on account of age?
- A. A high school student becomes ineligible for any athletic competition on his twenty-first birthday and therefore cannot compete on or after that date,
- 73, Q. When is a seventh or eighth grade student ineligible for high school athletics on account of age?
- A. A seventh or eighth grade student becomes ineligible for any high school athletic competition on his sixteenth birthday and therefore cannot compete in high school athletics on or after that date, until he becomes a high school student.
  - 74. Q. What is considered as a high school student?

- A. A regularly enrolled student who carries as much as fifteen hours of regular high school work.
- 75. Q. Is a student who is included on the eligibility list for a game but becomes twenty-one years of age one or before the day of the game, eligible for that game?
- A. No. He becomes ineligible for any athletic competition on his twenty-first birthday.
- 76. Q. What shall be taken as the basis for a student's date of birth?
- A. His signed statement (given in good faith) giving the day, month and year of his birth shall be taken as the basis until evidence or suspicion to the contrary is found.
  - 77. Q. Where can blanks for such statements be secured?
  - A. By writing to the Secretary's Office.
  - 75. Q. In case of doubt, what is considered proof of age?
  - A. Following evidence in order named.
    - (1) Birth certificate
    - (2) Affidavit of attending physician
    - (3) Baptismal certificate
    - (4) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport, or life insurance policy of at least a few years' standing.
    - (5) Public school records, school, state or national census records.
    - (6) Affidavit of parent or guardian,
- 79. Q. What action should be taken in case an over-age or any other ineligible student is unknowingly allowed to compete?
- A. The school should inform the Board of Control immediately upon the discovery of the infraction and all evidence and school records bearing on the case should be submitted to the Secretary.
- 50. Q. Is a student who enters the ninth grade at the beginning of the second semester, takes part in inter-school athletics that semester and during the three following school years, eligible during the first semester of the next year, this being his eighth semester?
- A. No. Such a student has had four "years" of high school athletics at the close of his seventh semester in high school and is ineligible after that time.
- \$1. Q. Does participation on the State Training School teams count as "years" of high school athletics for a student who may later attend an Association school?
- A. Yes. Since the State Training School offers work of secondary rank, participation on its athletic teams would therefore count.
- 82. Q. Does participation on the teams representing private, high schools, Indian schools or any non-Association secondary

school count for a student who may later attend an Association school?

- A. Yes, if the school offers work of secondary rank. The participation counts on the same basis as participation at an Association school.
- 83. Q. Is an ineligible player who is intentionally or unintentionally allowed to compete during all or part of an athletic contest, credited with a "year" of athletics?
- A. Yes. Any student who plays during all or any part of an athletic contest on a team representing a school offering work of secondary rank is credited with a "year" of athletic participation for that school year regardless of the fact that the student may not play in another game that school year.
- 84. Q. May a student who is taking part of his work at a private high school and part at a public high school represent the public high school in athletic competition?
- A. No, unless the subjects being carried at the public high school will fulfill all of the eligibility requirements for the current semester. None of the work being carried at the private high school can be used for eligibility purposes under any conditions, and the student could not represent both schools in athletics.
- 85. Q. May a private high school student who takes physical training at a public high school represent the public high school in inter-school athletic competition?
- A. No. A student must be a bona fide student of the school which he represent in athletic competition and must successfully carry at least fifteen hours of full and regular work at the school.
- 86. Q. Is a student under suspension from a school at the time of a contest eligible for that contest?
- A. No. A student under suspension at the time of a contest is not eligible for that contest, even though he may have been included on the eligibility list for that contest, as he is not a member of the school in good standing, as required in Article X. Section 3. The same is true of any student not in good standing for any other reason.
- 87. Q. May seventh and eighth grade students compete in high school athletics in any Association school?
- A. Yes. Seventh and eighth grade students who can fulfill all Association requirements may take part in any high school athletics while under sixteen years of age.
- 88. Q. Does participation by a seventh or eighth grade student count as "years" of high school participation?
- A. No. Participation in high school athletics by seventh and eighth grade students under sixteen years of age does not count Participation in high school athletics by seventh and eighth grade

students sixteen years of age or over is not allowable under any condition.

- 89. Q. May a student enrolled in a junior high school play on the teams of the senior high school of the same system?
- A. Yes, provided the junior high school does not sponsor a separate program of junior high school inter-school athletic competition.
  - 90. Q. What students do the SDHSAA rules cover?
- A. Students, both boys and girls, in the 9, 10, 11 and 12 grades of school work, and those in the 7 and 8 grades who may compete on high school teams while under sixteen years of age.
- 91. Q. Does the SDHSAA have any jurisdiction over strictly grade athletic competition?
- A. No, except for the seventh and eighth grade students mentioned in previous question.
- 92. Q. Shall seventh and eighth grade athletes be included on the annual reports?
- A. All seventh and eighth grade students who take part in high school inter-school competition shall be included on the annual report but not credited with a "year" of participation.
- 93. Q. Does participation by a seventh or eighth grade student at a non-Association school count as "years" of athletic competition if he later enrolls at an Association school?
- A. Any high school competition by a seventh or eighth grade student while under sixteen years of age would not count. Competition in high school athletics by a seventh or eighth grade student while sixteen years of age or over would count if he later enrolled at an Association school.
- 94. Q. In a student eligible for a contest if he has successfully carried three full and regular subjects during the week previous to the contest?
- A. Not necessarily. A student shall have made passing grades in each of three full and regular subjects from the beginning of the semester up to the time the certificate of eligibility is given, without any reference to the time the particular student may have been enrolled for that semester.
  - 95. Q. What is considered as a passing grade?
- A. The passing grade of the local school attended by the student. The SDHSAA has no rule covering this question.
- 96. Q. May a student who is ineligible for athletic competition during the first semester but becomes eligible for the second semester take part in a contest immediately at the close of the first semester?
- A. No. A student cannot be included on an eligibility list until he fulfills eligibility requirements. Such a student could therefore not actually complete until at least five days after the close of

the first semester. The first semester shall be considered as ending at midnight, Saturday of the last week of the semester.

97. Q. What constitutes the previous semester?

- A. The previous semester for a student is the last semester in which he was enrolled in any school for at least fifteen school days or the last semester in which he took part in an inter-school athletic contest.
- 98. Q. Is a student who carries three regular high school subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects considered a high school student?
- A. Yes. A student who carries fifteen hours of regular high school work is a high school student.
- 99. Q. Are the same standards of eligibility required for intra-school games as for inter-school games?
- A. No. The requirements for intra-school games are those set by the local school officials. The requirements for interschool games are those of this Association.
- 100. Q. Is a student who becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, ineligible for the entire following semester?
- A. Yes. Defliciencies of one semester cannot be made up in a later semester for athletic eligibility purposes.
- 101. Q. Is a student who is suspended or expelled from high school during a semester and who does not finish the semester, ineligible his next semester?
- A. Yes. Such a student is ineligible during all of his next semester since his record for the provious semester is "incomplete".
- 102. Q. May a student who has a semester's passing grade in a subject repeat that semester's work during a later semester and use it for eligibility purposes?
- A. No. A passing grade for a semester can only be used once for eligibility purposes.
- 103. Q. Shall the record on the report card or the permanent school record be official?
- A. In case of discrepancy the permanent school record would have precendence over the report card unless there was reason to doubt its accuracy.
- 104. Q. May a student who has fifteen units at the close of the first semester take part in athletic competition during the second semester?
- A. Yes, provided his school does not have regular graduation at the close of the first sewester and provided he carries three full and regular subjects during the second semester and fulfills all other Association requirements.

- 195. Q. Is a student who has at least fifteen units towards graduation on a regular graduation date and who has been in attendance at least eight semesters, but who takes no part in the exercises or does not receive a diploma, eligible for further competition?
- A. No. Any student who has any fifteen units towards graduation and who has been in attendance at least eight semesters, or who fulfills graduation requirements of his school on a regular graduation date is considered a graduate even though he takes no part in the graduating exercises or does not receive a diploma. Any other ruling could easily result in a violation of the intent of the rule.
- 106. Q. Is a student who graduates from a four-year high school or its equivalent and later enters another school whose graduation requirements he does not meet, eligible?
  - A. No. Such a student is a post-graduate and ineligible.
- 107. Q. Is a student who does not meet the graduation requirements of his school but who is allowed to participate in the exercises and receive a diploma, eligible for further competition?
- A. No. Such a student would be considered as a graduate and ineligible for athletic competition even if the diploma was blank or was returned. In public opinion such a student graduated and to allow him to later take part in athletic competition would give the impression that a post-graduate is allowed to compete.
- 108. Q. Is a student who enrolled before the morning of the sixteenth school day of a semester but who does not attend classes until after that date, eligible during that semester?
- A. No. It has been ruled that the date of enrollment for a semester shall be the actual date of regular entry in the classes.
- 109. Q. Is a student who violates his amateur standing in one sport, ineligible for all high schools sports?
- A. Yes, A professional in one sport is ineligible for all high school sports.
- 110. Q. Is a student who has played on an independent team which accepted a money prize or shared gate receipts permanently inclinible for high school athletics?
- A. No, provided the student accepts none of the money either directly or indirectly. That is as far as the SDHSAA rules are concerned. It might be a violation of the A. A. U. Rules or some college conferences' rules.
- 111. Q. May a local high school athletic association or similar organization pay high school athletes for helping with the janitor work in the gymnasium, locker rooms or showers?
- A. No. If additional janitor service is needed in a school, it should be paid for by the local Board of Education. Unethical

practices can easily result if local high school athletic associations are allowed to pay athletes for such services. The Board of Control has ruled that such a practice is considered as a violation of the spirit of the amateur rule.

- 112. Q. Must all the semester's work of three full and regular subjects or fifteen hours of regular high school work be completed at the close of that semester in order for a student to be eligible for the following semester?
- A. Yes in all cases except for the two exceptions definitely provided for in Article X, Section 11.
- 113. Q. Is a student who leaves school during a semester and returns that semester in time to complete less than fifteen hours of full and regular work by the close of the semester, eligible for the next semester?
- A. No, because he had not completed the required work by the close of the semester.
- 114. Q. Is a student whose parents change their residence but who remains in the school of their former residence, entitled to an athletic residence in this school?
- A. Yes. Such student would be entitled to an athletic residence if he remained in the school where his parents formerly resided since there would be no change of school systems on his part.
  - 115. Q. When is a student who changes high schools eligible?
- A. He is just as eligible in the new school as he was in the former school, provided his parents actually change their place of residence to the new school district; or if he completes the full course of a one, two or three year high school and a certificate to that effect is filed with the Secretary of the Board of Control: or he changes from a non-accredited to an accredited high school; or if his parents move within or into a non-high school district, he is eligible at the new school if he changes at the beginning of the semester or after one month's residence, if he changes after the beginning of a semester and if his former principal has filed a transfer information certificate with his new principal. In all other cases a student who changes school systems is not eligible for one entire school year or thirty-six school weeks unless his former principal files with the Secretary of the Board of Control an athletic residence transfer certificate.
- 116. Q. For what students may athletic residence transfer certificates be secured?
- A. The athletics residence transfer certificate is to provide for the student who must change school systems without a corresponding change of residence by his parents and for reasons entirely other than athletics; and where there has been

no outside influence used to cause the student to make the change.

- 117. Q. Has the Board of Control authority to nullify an athletic residence transfer certificate?
- A. Yes, if it is found that the change of schools was for athletic purposes or if influence was used to cause the change.
- 118. Q. Has the Board of Control authority to grant or to require a school to grant an athletic residence transfer certificate for a student?
- A. No. Under Article X, Section 12, Note 1 the only person qualified to grant such certificate is the principal (or super-intendent) of a student's previous school.
- 119. Q. How is an athletic residence transfer certificate secured?
- A. After the actual change of school systems has been made, application should be made to the Secretary for an athletic residence transfer certificate for the student, giving the name of student and his former school,
  - 120, Q. Who grants the certificate and with whom is it filed?
- A. The certificate is granted by the principal of the former school for the current year and it is filed with the Secretary of the Board of Control.
- 121. Q. May a student who changes school systems without a corresponding change of residence by his parents have an athletic residence at the second school if a local guardian is appointed?
- A. No. A guardian is not recognized under any circumstances unless neither parent is living or legally competent, and then only if the guardianship has been legally made without any consideration given to athletic competition.
- 122. Q. Is a student who has been attending a high school which has been discontinued entitled to an athletic residence in the school of his choice?
- A. Yes. Such a student is entitled to an athletic residence in the school of his choice if a statement is filed with the Secretary of the Board of Control showing that the former high school has been discontinued. However after such a student has enrolled in another high school he cannot make another change without his eligibility being affected.
- 123. Q. Is a student who has finished the eighth grade and whose parents reside in a non-high achool district, entitled to an athletic residence in the high school of his choice?
- A. Yes, when first enrolling in the high school. See next question.
- 124, Q. Is a student whose parents reside in a non-high school district and who has attended "A" high school and who

changes to "B" high school entitled to an athletic residence at the "B" high school, no change of residence having been made by his parents?

- A. No. A student whose parents reside in a non-high school district is entitled to an athletic residence in the high school of his choice when first enrolling in the ninth grade. But having changed from the "A" high school he is ineligible for one full year in the "B" high school, unless the principal of the "A" high school files with the Secretary of the Board of Control an athletic residence transfer certificate.
- 125. Q. Does the rule governing change of school systems apply to a student changing from the eighth grade to the high school?
- A. No, it applies only to a student changing from one secondary school to another.
- 126. Q. When is a student eligible in school "A" if he withdraws from school "A", enters school "B" and later returns to school "A", his parents never having changed their residence from "A"?
- A. Immediately if he is eligible in all other ways, as the SDHSAA rules provide that a student is always entitled to an athletic residence in the school district in which his parents reside.
- 127. Q. Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on an independent team during the school year?
- A. No. A student becomes ineligible for the balance of the school year in that one sport if he plays on a team other than a high school team while a member of the high school squad in that sport, unless he violates his amateur standing or some general rule of the Association and then he would become ineligible for all sports.
- 128. Q. Is a student who is not a member of a high school fall baseball squad and who competes on an independent baseball team during the fall, eligible for the high school's spring baseball schedule?
  - A. Yes, unless he violates some general Association rule.
- 129. Q. Is a student who is a member of a high school's fall baseball squad and who competes on an independent baseball team, ineligible only for the balance of the fall baseball schedule or for the entire school year?
- A. Such a student is ineligible for baseball during the entire school year.
- 130. Q. Is a student who has been out of High School for a semester or more and who has played on an independent team during that time, eligible when he enters school at the beginning of a semester?

- A. Yes, unless he violated his amateur standing in some way and provided that he is eligible in all other ways.
- 131. Q. May a student play on an independent basketball team and still be eligible for high school track or baseball?
  - A. Yes, provided he violated no general Association rule.
  - 132. Q. May an ineligible student practice with his team?
- A. Yes. An ineligible student may practice with his team in intra-school practice but he cannot be on the field of play in uniform during an inter-school contest.
- 133. Q. May students, who are ineligible for the first team play on teams of lower ranking?
- A. No. Ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.
- 134. Q. Do girl athletic competitors have to fulfill the same requirements as boys?
- A. Yes. Any contestant, either boy or girl must fulfill all Association requirements in order to be eligible to take part in an inter-school athletic contest.
  - 135. Q. Where can transfer information blanks be secured?
  - A. By writing the Secretary's Office.
  - 136. Q. For whom are transfer information certificates filed?
- A. For all students who change from one secondary school to another secondary school, without any consideration of the conditions under which the changes were made.
  - 137. Q. With whom is the transfer information blank filed?
- A. With the principal of the school where the student is at present enrolled,
  - 138. Q. By whom is the transfer information blank filled out?
- A. By the principal of the school previously attended by the student.
- 139. Q. Is a student eligible for any athletic competition who has not successfully passed the medical examination?
- A. No. ALL CANDIDATES for athletic teams shall have the required yearly medical examinations and the physician's certificates shall be on file with the local principal.
  - 140. Q. Where may medical certificate blanks be secured?
  - A. From the Secretary's Office.
- 141. Q. Is a medical examination required for each sport a student competes in?
- A. No. Only one medical examination is required each school year unless a school official has reason to believe a student's physical condition is not satisfactory.

- 142. Q. Where may blanks be secured for the parent's consent to compete and the student's statement?
  - A. From the Secretary's Office.
  - 143, Q. With whom are these statements filed?
  - A. With the principal of the local school.

#### VIOLATIONS

- 144. Q. How may contracts be cancelled?
- A. By mutual consent or by securing permission from the Board of Control at least one week in advance of the contest.
- 145. Q. What is the penalty for failing to fulfill an uncancelled contract?
  - A. Suspension for one year and the forfeiture of the game.
- 146. Q. If a school team dishands, would the school be responsible for contracts made?
- A. Yes, unless the contracts were cancelled by mutual consent. Failing such cancellation, the matter should be presented to the Board of Control for a decision.

#### AUTHORITY

- 147. Q. Over what contests does the Association have author-
- A. Over all inter-school athletic contests, both boys and girls, of the Association high schools.
- 148. Q. What is considered an inter-school athletic contest?
- A. Any athletic contest which an Association high school has against a team not belonging to that high school.
- 149. Q. May girls' inter-school basketball games be played according to boys' rules?
- A. No. This is strictly prohibited by the Association rules. Members have no more right to violate this rule by mutual agreement or otherwise than they have to violate any other Association provision.

#### AN ATHLETIC CODE

#### Officials and Athletes

Competent, impartial officials and clean, hard playing athlstes have made a place for interscholastic athletics in the educational program. Sportsmanship and fair play embody these practices:

#### BY THE OFFICIAL "

#### The Contest Demands

(I) A professional relationship calling for the highest type of service.

(2) Thorough preparation

(4) Reporting for duty at least thirty minutes before time for the game

### THE NATIONAL FEDERATION

A History of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations

The initial meeting for the organization of an interstate association for the control of interstate athletic games was held at the City Club in Chicago on May 14, 1920. The meeting had been called by Mr. L. W. Smith of Joliet, Illinois, who was at that time secretary of the Illinois High School Athletic Association. According to the minutes of the meeting, "The particular reason that brought the officials together was the fact that high school athletics were being handled in an unsatisfactory manner in contests under the auspices of colleges and universities." At this meeting the state associations of Illinois, Indlana, Iowa, Michigau, and Wisconsin were represented. A constitution and by-laws were adopted and Mr. George Edward Marshall, Principal of the Davenport, Iowa, High School was elected president and Mr. L. W. Smith of Joliet, secretarytreasurer. The name adopted was "The Mid West Federation of State High School Athletic Association."

At the second meeting of the organization, only four of the original participating states were represented, Indiana, apparently, having lost interest. Representatives from the other four states, however, resolved to proceed with the organization and its proposed work. A few minor changes in the constitution and bylaws were made and the officers of the association were reelected.

Following this meeting a publicity campaign was conducted by the executive committee and the third meeting which was held in Chicago on March I, 1923 was really the first to assume significant proportions. It was attended by representatives from eleven state association and a very great degree of interest was manifested in the objectives and methods of the organization. At this time the name of the organization was changed from "Mid-west Federation" to "National Federation.". The meeting was addressed by Mr. A. A. Stagg of the University of Chicago and Mr. George Huff of the University of Illinois. A fine spirit of co-operation was manifested throughout.

Mr. Geo, Edw. Marshall and Mr. L. W. Smith were continued in the offices of president and secretary, respectively, and Mr. L. L. Forsythe, Principal of the Ann Harbor High School of Ann Harbor, Michigan, was elected vice-president. These men have continued in their respective offices except that Mr. Smith recently resigned because of removal from the jurisdiction of the Federation. (President Geo. Edw. Marshall has died since this was prepared.)

Without going into details relative to the successive meetings of the organization it may be stated that there has been a consantly increasing interest shown in the Federation's program and a progressive expansion of its power and influence. At the present time it has a membership of thirty-three state associations and, in the language of Major John L. Griffith of Chicago, "represents the largest body of organized athletes in the world."

The constitution provides that the time and place of the annual meetings shall be determined by the executive committee. In general they have been held in connection with the annual meetings of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

In 1925 it was voted to affiliate the organization with the National Amateur Athletic Federation, thereby establishing close co-operation between the high schools and the National Collegiates Athletic Association, the athletic associations of the army and navy, of the Y.M.C.A. and various other amateur athletic organizations. At this meeting, also, a motion was adopted establishing a more adequate financial system for the organization.

In 1924 there was initiated a system of informal regional conferences. Several of these regional conferences have been held in Chicago and as many as fifteen states have been represented at some of them. Two conferences have been held at Lawrence, Kansas, one at Lincoln, Nebr., and one at Macon, Ga.

In 1924 also a joint conference of high school and university and college men was held in Chicago. These conferences were continued annually for several years and resulted in a more complete understanding of the mutual problems of the two types of educational athletics and a more cordial co-operation between colleges and high schools in the supervision and control of athletic activities.

In 1927 the executive committee decided to appoint an executive officer to have general responsibility of looking after the executive work of the organization. Mr. C. W. Whitten of Chicago was selected for this work and has served continuously to date. He is officially the secretary of the organization. His office is located at 11 south La Salle St., Chicago, Illinois.

In considering movements of this type it is important that we keep in mind the fundamental objective that high school educators have in view for their athletic activities namely to make them contributory to the educational aims of the school. From this viewpoint the value of the National Federation can scarcely be overestimated. Preceding its organization many so-called "national" and interstate meets were travesties upon educational procedure. Discredited outlaw teams and players were admitted in defiance of professional ethics and were some times accorded national honors to the great embarrassment of high school authorities.

In large measure the National Federation has stopped all this. At the present time schools within the jurisdiction of the National Federation are prohibited from participating in any interstate meet not sanctioned by the executive committee of the Federation. This insures the limitation of competition to members in good standing of the respective state associations. It also insures the conduct of these interstate meets under conditions that meet the standards of the various state associations. It should be added that the various colleges and universities conducting interstate meets have co-operated with the National Federation in a very cordial manner in the supervision of the meets.

Of course it is only through the tremendous power that comes from the effective co-operation of these thirty-three state associations that such results can be brought about. The voice of thirty-one states can sometimes be heard when the voice of a single state or of an individual would be drowned in the popular socialm of any sort of athletic achievement, outlaw or otherwise.

Originally the Federation busied itself to some extent in writing eligibility rules. Through a process of evolution it now devotes its chargies along these lines to maintaining the authority of its member states within their respective jurisdiction. It undertakes to see that only teams and players recognized by their own state associations shall participate in interstate contests. An interstate contract form has been prepared which is recommended to all principals contracting for any interstate game. In general, these blanks may be secured from the executive officers of the various states.

In recognition of the magnitude and influence of the National Federation the high schools have been accorded representation on the national track and field rules committee and it is confidently expected that similar representation on the national basketball and football rules committees will be granted. The high schools probably have more basketball and football players than all other athletic organizations combined and it seems that they should be entitled to some voice in making the rules of the games. (Note by Secretary. Since this was written the high schools have been accorded representation on the national basketball rules committee as well as all other high school sports' rules committee but have been refused representation on the national football rules committee.)

Still another function assumed by the National Federation is the examination of and passing upon claims for national records by high school athletes. The high school national championship list was for years in a condition of confusion and of more or less disrepute. Now through the activities of a committee on rules and records, an attempt is being made to systematize the grant-

ing of national records and to prepare a really authentic championship list.

In short, the existence and activities of the National Federation are based upon the theory that high school athletics should be directed and controlled by high school men. If other organizations desire to stage high school contests it should be done only under conditions dictated by high school men. If the jurisdiction of the National Federation can be extended to include approximately the entire nation, this very desirable outcome wil be assured.

#### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I-NAME

This organization shall be known as the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

#### ARTICLE II-OBJECT

The object of this Federation shall be to protect and regulate the interstate athletic interests of the high schools belonging to the various associations and to promote pure amateur sport.

#### ARTICLE HI-MEMBERSHIP

The unit of membership in this Pederation shall be the State Athletic Association. The charter members of this Federation are Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois, by the ratification of this Constitution by the respective state associations. A new member may be admitted to this Federation by the following procedure:

- By making application to the Secretary of the Federation through its own officers.
- 2. By receiving a two-thirds vote of the National Council.

 By paying into the Treasury such membership fees or dues as may, from time to time, be fixed by the National Council.

#### ARTICLE IV-NATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1. The legislative body of this Federation shall be the National Council consisting of one member from each state association, elected by the executive committee or board of control from its officers or board of control.

Section 2. The officers of the National Council shall be a President and Vice-President who shall be elected by the Council from among its members and a Secretary-Treasurer who shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers of the National Council as enumerated in Section 2 of this article and, in addition, five members to be elected by the National Council from among its members and so chosen as, in a general way, to represent the different sections of the country. The Executive Committee is hereby authorized to determine all necessary expenditures of money and to exercise all the powers and duties expressed or implied in this Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 4. The officers of the National Council, except the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be elected at any annual meeting at which a vacancy is apparent, and shall serve for three years each, or until their successors have qualified. Provided, however, that any office shall become automatically vacant at the time of the next annual meeting following the date at which the incumbent of the office ceases to be a member of his State Board of Control.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the Executive Committee for such terms as may be determined by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE V-MEETINGS

Section 1. The annual meeting of the National Council shall be held at such place and time as may be determined by the Executive Committee provided that written notice of such annual meeting shall be sent to the officers of each unit member at least 30 days preceding the meeting.

Section 2. Special meetings may occur at any time upon the order of the President or upon the call of a majority of the members of the National Council, the call to be issued by the Secretary. Section 3. Each state association shall be represented by the member of its executive committee, or board of control designated for that purpose. In case he is absent any member of the executive committee or board of control who is present is authorized to represent his state. All members of the executive committees and boards of control of the various state associations are authorized to be present at the meetings of the National Council and to participate in its discussions.

Section 4. In the transaction of the business of the National Council, each state association shall have one vote.

Section 5. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of representatives of a majority of the state associations belonging to the Federation.

#### ARTICLE VI-AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and any By-Laws which may be enacted may be amended at any meeting of the National Council by a two-thirds vote of those present, provided the number present shall not be less than a quorum.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I-ELIGIBILITY OF PLAYERS

To represent a school in any interstate athletic contest, a pupil must be eligible under the following rules:

Section 1. His school must be a member of the state athletic association of the state in which he resides, provided it is eligible to join.

Section 2. He shall be an amsteur, one who has never used and is not now using his knowledge of athletics or his athletic skill for gain and who has always contested under his own name.

#### ARTICLE II-PROVISIONS GOVERNING CONTESTS

Section 1. In all interstate contests the schools concerned shall each follow the rules of the respective state athletic associations to which they belong.

Section 2. Schools in state associations belonging to this Federation may engage in athletic contests with schools where no state high school athletic association exists only whon each contesting pupil conforms to the following minimum eligibility requirements:

He shall not haved reached the age of twenty-one years; he shall not have played on any college or university team; he shall not have graduated from any four-year high school course or its equivalent; he shall be doing passing work and shall have passing credit from the beginning of the current semester in at least fifteen hours of high school work per week and, unless entering high school for the first time shall have credit on the school records for fifteen semester hours of school work for the last preceding semester during which he attended school 20 days or more.

Section 3. Schools belonging to unit members of this Federation may enter only such interstate tournaments and meets as are sanctioned by the Executive Committee of the National Federation.

#### ARTICLE III-RECOMMENDATION

Section 1. That any state high school athletic association belonging to this Pederation enforce eligibility rules at least as restrictive as the minimum rules enumerated in Section 2, Article II., of these By-Laws.

Section 2. That no reward of any kind having a ultilitarian value of more than one dollar (\$1.00) other than medals shall be made to players participating in interschool athletics.

Section 3. That coaches other than those regularly employed by the Board of Education as certified teachers be prohibited.

Section 4. That no pupil be permitted to play on any high school team or contest in any athletic event after he has been in attendance eight semesters, nor to compete for more than 4 seasons in any branch of athletics.

Section 5. That no pupil be permitted to compete whose scholastic standing is below the ninth grade.

Section 6. That no pupil be permitted to compete after having reached the age of twenty-years.

#### RECOMMENDED MINIMUM-ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

At the meeting of the National Council of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations which was held at Cleveland, Ohio, on Monday, February 25, 1228, the following list of eligibility rules was recommended as a list of minimum requirements for eligibility for interscholastic athletics. In publishing this list, your attention is specifically called to two facts:

- This is a recommended list only and is not required for membership in the National Federation.
- These rules are recommended as minimum requirements.
   States having more restrictive rules on any of these points are not advised to modify them.

To represent a school in any interscholastic contest the following requirements must be met:

#### 20-Year Rule

1. A pupil shall not have reached his twentieth birthday.

#### 8-Semester Rule

 He shall become ineligible after attending a four-year high school eight semesters or a senior high school six semesters. Graduates of these schools are ineligible. Attendance of 15 days of any semester shall be regarded as a "semester" under this rule.

#### Scholarship Rule and Consecutive Semester Attendance Rule

 (a). He shall be doing passing work in at least fifteen periods or three full credit subjects of high school work per week.

(b) To be eligible he must have passed at the end of the immediately preceding semester in which the contest occurs in fifteen periods or three full credit subjects. The record at the end of the semester shall be final. Scholastic deficiencies can not be made up in any manner.

#### Amateur Rule

4. He shall not use his athletic skill for personal gain, nor shall he play on teams where one or more players are receiving money for their services. Should be lose his amateur standing he may be reinstated by the State Executive hody after the lapse of one complete year, provided he has not persisted in breaking the amateur rule.

## Independent Team Participation Rule

 After he has become a member of a high school squad, he shall not take part in an independent contest where admission is charged.

#### Transfer Rule

 He shall be ineligible for one semester if he transfers from one school to another without a corresponding change in his parents' residence.

#### Recruiting Rule

 The use of undue influence by anyone in causing a boy to transfer from one school to another for athletic purposes shall render him ineligible.

#### Enrollment Rule

He shall have been enrolled not later than the beginning of the eleventh day of school of the semester.

#### Athletic Award Rule

 If he accepts from any source a sweater, jersey or any other awards exceeding one dollar in value other than those usually given, such as medals, trophics, fobs, letters and other athletic insignis, he shall be insligible.

#### Grade Rule

10. He must have been promoted to the ninth grade.

#### Physician's Certificate and Parental Consent Rule

11. He shall present at least once each year a physician's certificate on a form preacribed by his State Association that he is physically fit for athletic competition. He shall likewise be required to present in writing parental consent for athletic participation.

#### Conches Rule

12. All coaches shall be certified teachers regularly employed by the Board of Education and their entire salary shall be paid by that body. They shall have not less than three regular periods of classes, gymnasium or study-hall duty per day.

The control of the state basketball tournament was taken over by the South Dakota High School Athletic Association in 1916, previous to that year it had been an invitational tournament sponsored by Huron College. It remained an open tournament until 1918 when the membership of the Association was divided into seven districts and seven teams competed in the 1918 state tournament. Eight teams competed in the 1919, 1920, and 1921 tournaments; ten teams in the 1922 tournament; sixteen teams in the 1923, 1924, 1925 and 1926 tournaments. Beginning with 1927 the membership was divided into districts and regions and from that time on there have been eight teams competing at the state tournaments. The teams competing in the 1930 State "B" Tournament are not included in this data, but only teams competing in state tournaments whose winners have been declared the state champions.


