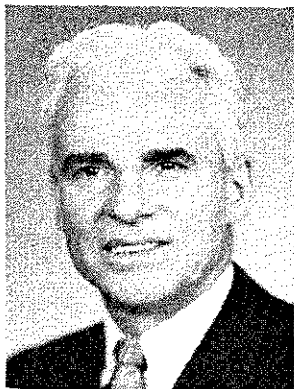

FOREWORD

This Year Book serves a two fold purpose, it is the Annual Report of your Executive Secretary and does provide each member school with a rather complete history and summary of the Association for the school year of 1956-57. All state wide events of the SDHSAA are accurately summarized and are listed in the order in which they happened.

Many of the member schools have a complete history of the Association from the time of its inception on December 29, 1905. This does not mean that a year book was printed each year since 1905. The first Year Book published was in 1927 and it contains summaries of all events from 1906 up to and including the school year of 1926-27. The second such book was published in 1934, the third in 1940, the fourth in 1942 and the fifth in 1946. Since 1946 a Year Book has been published annually.

Starting in 1953, pictures of all teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state wide events are shown. There may have been a few teams or individuals whose pictures have been missed but there have been very few.

We sincerely hope you will enjoy this issue of the Year Book and hope that it will be placed on file in each school so that complete histories are available in all member schools.

SDHSAA HISTORY 1956-1957

1956-1957 was a very pleasant year as far as the SDHSAA was concerned. Events were exciting, close and interesting, however winners and losers took all in stride with sportsmanship unmatched. Participation in athletics seems greater than ever before and there is no doubt that the quality of teams and individuals is improved over previous years. In the past we may have had a few better teams and perhaps a few better individuals but never has there been the evenness of competition which speaks highly of the quality of coaching our teams and individuals are receiving.

Each year, local programs improve, this shows interest in and a strong desire by our administrators, for well balanced athletic programs.

In 1956-1957 there seemed to be a trend in football toward increased participation, by this we mean that the number of boys participating in football has increased. The manner in which increased participation is attained is by increasing the number of teams. The number of eleven man teams has remained about the same, the number of six man football teams, has dropped slightly, but this is more than offset by an increased number of eight man football teams.

The number of basketball teams has remained constant, since every member school plays basketball. However, there has been a noticeable increase in the numbers participating, by an increased number of "B" teams and organization teams and intra-mural basketball.

Cross Country, Tennis and Golf showed some gain in the number of schools and the number of individuals participating in these events.

The big growth in competition, however was in Track, while the number of competitors in the State Meet is about the same, the number of individuals participating in the region meets, far exceeded any other year in the long history of the Association.

The various activities of the SDHSAA are briefly mentioned here with summaries of the events to be found on other pages of this Year Book.

The first events of 1956-1957 were the Tennis and Golf Tournaments both of which were held in Sioux Falls on August 3 and 4, 1956. There was a slight increase in numbers over the events of 1955.

Also in August of 1956, the Annual Coaching School was, again, held in Huron on August 20-23 inclusive. Attendance remained quite constant with a total of 220 attending all or some part of the school. The total number is quite satisfactory, however, there should be more coaches attending this annual event.

A series of Football Rules Meetings was held in 15 different cities of the state and the total number of coaches, officials, fans and players attending exceeded 1200. For the second year, an assistant handled six of these meetings, making it possible to complete most of the meetings before the first big week of football games. Howard Connors of Vermillion, handled six of the meetings with your Executive Secretary handling nine of them. Mr. Connors will also take six meetings in 1957.

Starting on October 15, a series of 20 Basketball Rules Meetings, for officials and coaches were held, total attendance exceeded 1500. Your Executive Secretary conducted all of the meetings. New emphasis has been placed on Certified Officials and over 600 were certified during 1956-1957.

The Regular Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA was held in Sioux Falls on Thursday, November 1, 1956. Ninety-seven member schools had official delegates at the meeting. There were 4 amendments to consider, and discuss, with final balloting, as per Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA, by mail after the Biennial Meeting. All were defeated so the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA will remain unchanged for a two year period starting July 1, 1957.

The amendments, briefly, were (1) to admit Cathedral High School of Sioux Falls as a member of the SDHSAA; (2) to change the Transfer Rule; (3) to have early football practice open on the 1st Monday after August 19th; (4) to change the method of determining "A" schools in Basketball and to make basketball and track classifications the same. As previously stated, all amendments failed.

There were to be three (3) elected to the Board of Control, 1st for an unexpired term ending July 1, 1958, the candidates to be from schools located in towns the population of which were 1000 or under. Supt. D. W. Evans of Kadoka and Supt. Ed Obenauer of Herried were nominated, with Mr. Evans the winner by mail ballot. For the second unexpired term, ending July 1, 1961, Supt. E. B. Coacher of Chamberlain and Supt. Wayne Monfore of Tripp were nominated with Mr. Coacher the eventual winner. For a regular term to expire on July 1, 1962, Supt. C. H. Holgate of Aberdeen was nominated to succeed himself. There were no other nominations.

Interest in basketball remained high, there was a decrease in attendance at District, Region and Section Tournaments, however the demand for tickets to the State "A" and "B" Tournaments, far exceeded previous tournaments. Both tournaments were completely sold out and several thousand dollars was returned to ticket seekers.

For the first time in several years bad weather, rather badly, handicapped the runners in the State Track Meet. With the competitors, based on records made in early meets, ready to break several records, the weather, cold, windy and damp, took care of the records. Considering everything the performances were remarkable—493 boys from 148 schools actually competed in the state meet. One record was broken and that in the Discus Throw.

The second Tennis and Golf Tournament of 1956-1957 was held at the time of the State Meet in Mitchell. The number of competitors was greater than in any other year and the event will be held in conjunction with the State Meet in 1958.

EVENTS OF 1956-1957

The Twenty-fifth Annual Golf and Tennis Tournaments were run off in Sioux Falls on August 3 and 4, 1956 with Wally M. Diehl, Athletic Director of Washington High School being the general supervisor of

both tournaments. Don Grebin and Chuck Bailin handled the Tennis Tournament and Ed Livingston, Pro at the Minnehaha Country Club, had charge of the Golf Tournament. Seventeen boys from seven schools took part in either singles or doubles. Six teams played in the doubles tournament. John Simko and Tom Line of Washington High School, defeated the Mitchell team of Don Isaac and Bill Reemstma in the Doubles Finals.

In the Singles Tournament John Simko of Sioux Falls defeated another player from his own High School, Mike Rost, in the finals of the Singles Tournament.

Thirty-six golfers from 15 high schools, teed off in the 1956 Golf Tourney, played on the Minnehaha Country Club Course in Sioux Falls. Eighteen holes of golf were played on the 3rd and the final eighteen holes on the 4th. When the shooting was over, Fred Hecker of Sioux Falls was the winner with a fine score of 141 for the 36 holes. Wes Plummer, also of Sioux Falls was second with 147 and Mike Gibson, also of Sioux Falls, third with 150 strokes.

In team competition, Sioux Falls was the winner with Hecker and Plummer totaling 288 strokes. The Watertown team of Gribbin and Cooley was second with 323 strokes closely followed by Aberdeen's Olson and Wolsky with 328.

1956 COACHING SCHOOL

Aug. 20, 21, 22, 23

Over 200 Coaches attended all or a part of the 1956 Tuition Free Coaching School and were rewarded for their attendance by the fine instructions they received from the excellent staff who handled football, 6 and 8 man football, basketball, training and track.

John Roning, Head Football Coach at Denver University, did a remarkable job of teaching his type of football. His manner of instructing was good. He knew what he wanted to cover and did a masterful job of teaching football. We were fortunate to be able to secure Mr. Roning, a fine, high type gentleman in addition to his ability to instruct.

H. B. "Bebe" Lee, formerly Head Basketball Coach at Colorado, but now starting his first year as Athletic Director at Kansas State, was to the basketball coaches what Mr. Roning was to football coaches. Mr. Lee started entirely different than any other coach who has instructed in basketball. He started with defense and spent a lot of time on this important phase of the game. We feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity of having Mr. Lee on our staff.

Dan Lennon, Track Coach at the University of South Dakota, for the second year did a remarkable job of teaching and demonstrating track and field events. He had several of his squad with him and they demonstrated under his direction. For the second year we believe the track section of the Clinic was "tops" for the school.

R. "Kickapoo" Logan of Los Andles was also a repeater at the school. Mr. Logan not only ably demonstrated many phases of injury care and prevention of injuries, but he is also a natural born entertainer. His sessions were to full houses.

For Six and Eight Man Football we were fortunate to have been able to secure a man from Nebraska who has had outstanding success in both 6 and 8 Man Football. Eugene Pillen of David City, Nebraska was recommended to us by the Nebraska Secretary and he more than lived up to his recommendations. We are deeply indebted to Mr. Pillen.

As per the custom set several years ago, the coaches of our 1956 State Championship Basketball Teams appeared on the Coaching School program. Wally Diehl of Washington High School, Sioux Falls and Ron Freemole of Howard, coaches of the 1956 "A" and "B" championship teams handled their part of the program very capably and we were very much pleased to have them appear.

Again the SDHSAA is deeply indebted to Huron groups and individuals for making the school a success. Dr. D. E. Kerr, Dr. N. N. Spencer, Wid Trusler and Jim Long of Huron College really took care of all arrangements at the College, while the High School staff in Huron made the event even more enjoyable. Special mention should be made of Supt. James Slocum, Principal G. G. Bell and Athletic Director, Clyde Cotton, and special mention should be given Bill Tredway and Bob Johnson representing the City of Huron.

1956 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

Over 1200 officials, coaches, players and fans attended the 1956 Football Rules Meetings. As stated previously, Howard Connors, of Vermillion handled six of the 15 meetings and the Executive Secretary directed the other nine meetings. The football season in South Dakota is at best short and by the use of the two men, most meetings were completed on or before the opening date for football games. We believe coaches and officials are aided more by reviewing the rules before the game is played.

1956 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

October 19, 1956

Sixty runners from 15 different high schools, took off in the Annual Cross Country Run on the college golf course at Brookings. The number was an increase over 1955.

The event was favored by good weather, there was a rather brisk wind but the day was mild. Don Ashbaugh of Clear Lake was the winner of the event in the good time of 12:19.4. He was followed by Dennis Hosking of Rapid City and Leo Red Horse of Flandreau Indian School.

In the team competition the Flandreau Indian School was first with 17 points but closely pressed by Rapid City with 18 points and Winner a good third with 23 points. A complete summary of this and other events will be found on other pages of the Year Book.

1956 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Starting October 15 your Executive Secretary held 20 Basketball Rules Meetings in 20 different cities of the state. The last meeting was on November 29. All changes in the rules, officiating techniques were explained and discussed and the SDHSAA revised film "Basketball Rules Interpretation" was shown.

Over 1500 coaches, officials, players and fans attended the meetings. There were far more basketball officials attending than ever before.

NATIONAL FEDERATION FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

On January 3 and 4, 1957, your Executive Secretary, a member of the High School Rules Committee, attended a meeting of this group in Chicago. A few changes in the Rules were made which will be explained at the various meetings starting in August.

Starting with the 1957 Football season the Junior Colleges over the country will use the High School Football Rules. They were adopted during 1956 and had representation on the 1957 Football Committee.

At the time of the Football Rules Committee Meeting, there is also a National Meeting for Executive Secretaries and Commissioners and your Executive Secretary led a discussion on "Current Basketball Practices."

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

Again in 1957 the State Basketball Tournaments, exceeded, in attendance, in interest, in action any previous tournaments. It does not seem possible that this could happen, but it did.

The management of the tournaments has improved, which seemed impossible. In both Aberdeen and Huron the management has come up with innovations and new ideas to make it more comfortable for the fans, players, officials and the Board of Control. Like track records, there seems no limits.

Cresbard High School won the "B" Tournament defeating a fine Corona team in the finals. Belle Fourche High School, a team which knew it could win, defeated a very good Washington High School team in the finals of the "A" Tournament. Complete details of the Tournaments will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

NATIONAL BASKETBALL RULES COMMITTEE

For the third year, your Executive Secretary, was appointed by the National Federation's Executive Committee as one of the four representatives from the High Schools on the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada. Therefore he attended the meeting of this group in Kansas City on March 24 and 25, 1957.

Several changes in the Basketball Rules were made, all of which have been previously announced and will be thoroughly discussed at the Rules Meetings this fall.

STATE TRACK MEETS

The 50th Annual Track and Field Meet is history, but one new record was set, but weather and not the quality of the contestants was responsible. Despite bad weather the 50th Annual Meet was a wonderful Meet, competition was keen, the times, distances and heights were excellent and the Meet was one of the best.

Despite trying circumstances, Athletic Director A. A. Quintal, charged with the responsibility for making the event run smoothly, did a beautiful job. His staff was organized well and the Meet moved along on schedule. If you could have seen the track at 8:00 a.m. on Friday Morning, you would have wondered how the Meet could be run. It started on time with the track in remarkably good shape.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls, again won the "A" Meet and Yale High School won the "B" Meet.

1957 GOLF AND TENNIS TOURNAMENTS

The second Golf and Tennis Tournaments to be reported upon in this Year Book, are the 26th Annual which were held in Mitchell on the 17 and 18 of May, at the time of the State Track Meet. The reason for the two tournaments is as follows: The tournaments in August of 1956, in reality were tournaments for the school year 1955-56 and the May tournaments were those belonging to the school year of 1956-57. Both events took place between July 1 of 1956 and June 30 of 1957 therefore must be reported here in.

Since the number competing in the summer events has always been

rather small the Board decided to try the tournaments during the school year. The results were satisfactory as far as numbers were concerned, however, the quality of play in both golf and tennis was, perhaps, below the quality of the 1956 tournament.

Twenty four boys took part in the singles and doubles Tennis Tournaments. They represented ten schools, a definite increase over August, 1956 tournament. John Simko of Sioux Falls was the Singles Tennis Champion for the 4th straight year. He defeated his team mate Tom Line in the finals. Simko and Line then joined forces and won the doubles tournament defeating a Huron team of Parmeter and Fuller in the finals.

Seventeen schools sent 42 golfers to the SDHSAA Golf Tournament and when the event was over, Doug Hofer of Brookings was the low man with 160 strokes for the 36 holes. Pete Gribbin of Watertown was second with 162. In team competition the Watertown team of Gribbin and or D. Rousseau—M. Foley were low with 330 strokes. Mitchell and Aberdeen tied for the second spot in the team competition each scoring 343 strokes. The Mitchell team was composed of Noble and Williamson while Aberdeen was represented by Wolsky and Hottman.

Two golf courses were used. The Mitchell Country Club Course was played on Friday the 17th while the Lakeview Course was used on Saturday.

1956-1957

(1) Officers of the Board of Control for 1956-57 were elected as follows: Supt. E. E. Grunwald, Sturgis, Chairman; Athletic Director A. A. Quintal, Mitchell, Vice Chairman and Supt. C. H. Holgate, Aberdeen, Treasurer. Supt. D. W. Evans of Kadoka and Supt. E. B. Coacher of Chamberlain were elected to vacancies on the Board of Control and started as members January 1, 1958.

(2) Changed the dates for the Golf and Tennis Tournaments to coincide with the State Track Meet.

(3) Set dates for 1957 Cross Country Run on October 18, 1957.

(4) Set dates and sites for the 1958 Tournaments, "B" at Aberdeen March 6, 7, 8, 1958 and the "A" in Huron on March 13, 14, 15, 1958.

(5) Set dates for 1958 State Track Meet and Tennis and Golf Tournaments May 16, 17, 1958 with Huron the site of the Meets and Tournaments.

(6) Called a meeting of the 32 "A" schools in basketball to set up sections for 1957-1958 and 1958-1959 as per Rules and Regulations of SDHSAA.

(7) Set dates and sites for 1957 Coaching School as August 19, 20, 21, 22 at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, Rapid City.

(8) Loaned the SDEA \$50,000.00 with proper security, in the form of a first mortgage on the SDEA property. Will move SDHSAA office into this building when completed.

(9) Raised officials fees to \$2.00 for Football and \$1.50 for Basketball or \$3.00 for both. The reason, former fees did not pay for the books and postage furnished on certification.

(10) Authorized the use of Howard Connors in conducting 6 of the 15 Football Rules Meetings.

(11) Adopted a budget for 1957-58.

(12) Changed the method of ticket distribution to "A" and "B" Tournaments.

(13) Raised admission charges, slightly, to "A" and "B" Tournaments.

(14) Continued study on State Track Meets.

(15) Ruled on several Eligibility cases.

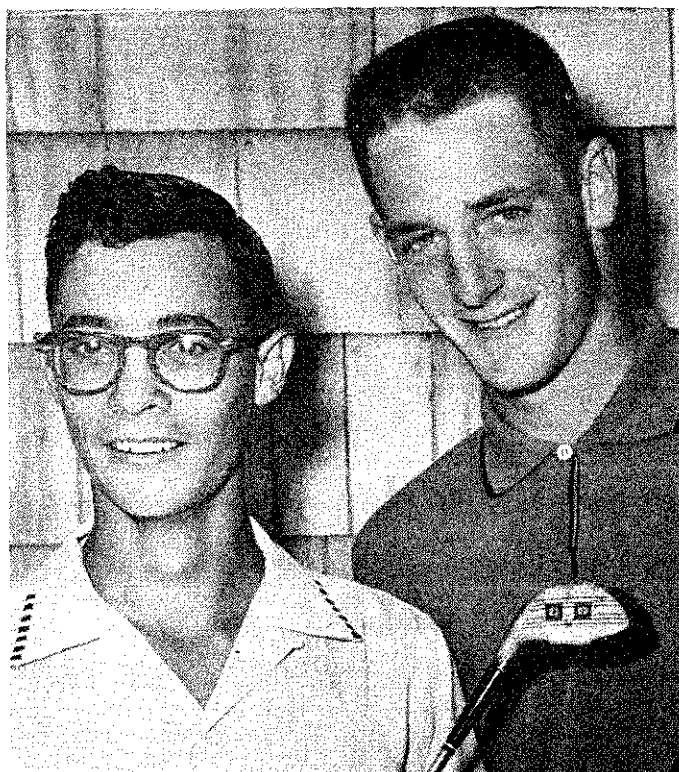

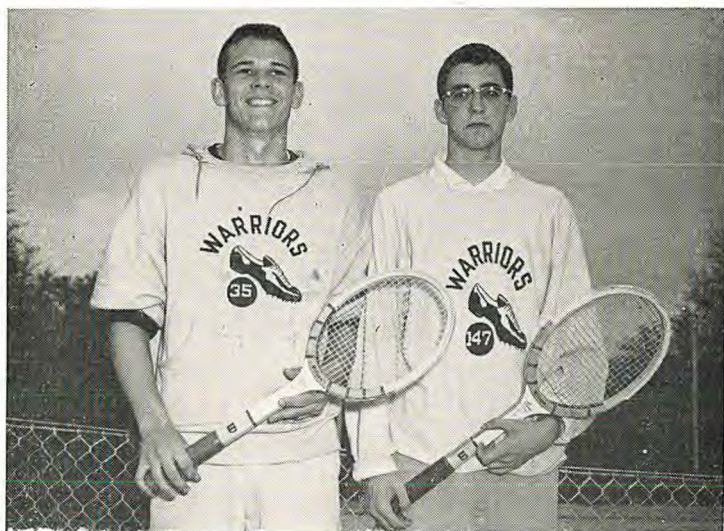

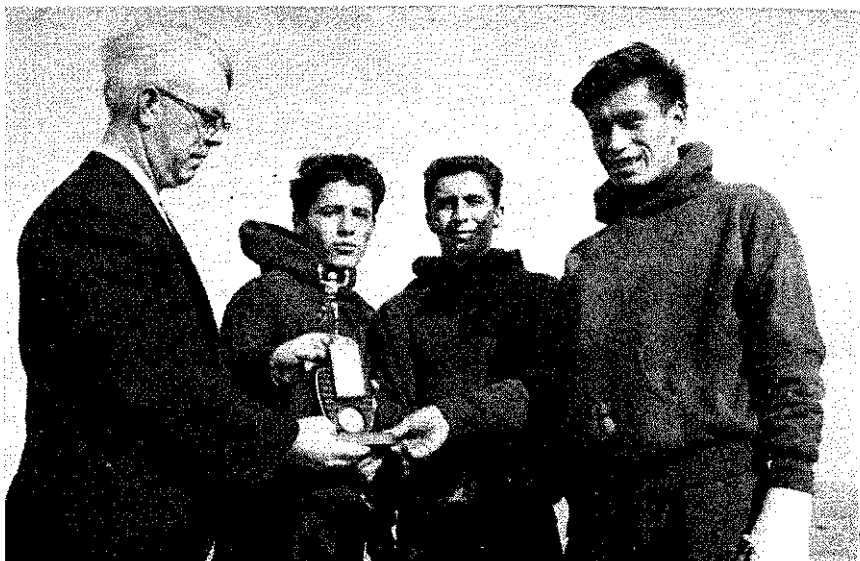

TOURNAMENT RESULTS 1957

On other pages of this "Tournament Bulletin" you will find results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, including financial reports. These reports indicate a very healthy interest in basketball in South Dakota and we firmly believe this interest will continue, and it will if we, the school men, in the state keep the game on the high level of sportsmanship that we have enjoyed. We can lose this if there is ever a let-up. There must be constant pressure on our teams, our coaches, our student bodies, and upon our local fans, so that they are constantly kept aware of the fact that inter-school basketball, including tournaments, is but a part of our secondary school program and that it must be conducted with dignity and with honor. There are definite indications that some of our college basketball is not that way and we as high schools should set the example and not be led by those groups supposedly more advanced than we are.

From all reports on our 32 District, 8 Region and 8 Section Tournaments, these events must have been pleasant affairs, we know the State Tournaments were good events and every event of this kind does produce disappointments and heartaches. It is still true that these problems are constantly being faced in real life and surely some value is the result of these setbacks. The players surely learn to "take it" and spectators must also learn.

Tournament management has improved and because of this our tournaments, at all levels, have improved. The management at Huron and Aberdeen, for the State Tournaments, constantly come up with innovations that are passed on to other tourneys. We feel, annually, that the tournaments just completed are the best ever, but knowing the ingenuity and creativeness of those in charge, we know the future tournaments will be better.

In our two State Tournaments, fine teams appeared, each team was soundly coached, each team was physically ready and sportsmanship was at a new high. The personnel on all teams was not equal but those with the better personnel did not have a corner on coaching, sportsmanship, etc. Our Coaches and Administrators are doing excellent jobs.

At the end of each game or tournament there is always a winner, and as all know, the 1957 State "B" and "A" tournaments produced two brand new Champions, Cresbard and Belle Fourche. Neither team had, in the long history of basketball in the state, ever been the Champion and believe me we had two worthy teams to perch atop their Class.

The Cresbard "Comets" the new "B" Champions was a fine team. They had a good big team, they were soundly coached by Frank Filipek and they had the poise necessary for winning the championship. Being behind did not bother them, they just worked a little harder and won. Every team has to have a leader and Cresbard had that boy, although it was the team effort plus bench strength that carried them through to that peak, which is sometimes hard to reach. Our congratulations to Coach Frank Filipek and his "Comets".

As previously stated, when there is a winner there is also a loser and the final victim of Cresbard was a team from Corona, a good rangy team, soundly coached and a team to be reckoned with in the future. Coach Kampen and his "Midgets" were "terrific".

Again our congratulations to the Champion and to each of the other seven teams in the State "B" Tournament.

A new champion was also crowned in the "A" Tournament and that champion was the Belle Fourche "Broncs". If ever a team showed signs of coming to the tournament to win, it was this fine team. The team was adequate in size, very well coached and exhibited a determination and poise seldom seen in tournament play. They really were ready. Too much credit cannot be given this team and their coach, Lou Graslie.

While Belle Fourche is the Champion, they had a worthy opponent in their final game in Washington High School of Sioux Falls.

Again our congratulations to Lou Graslie and his great team and to the seven other teams in the "A" Tournament.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

Since the start in 1936, there has been little change in the "B" set-up, this class continuing with 32 districts and eight regions with the eight region champions qualifying for the State "B" Tournament.

"A" and "B" Tournaments in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956 and in 1957 have proven very satisfactory and will be continued.

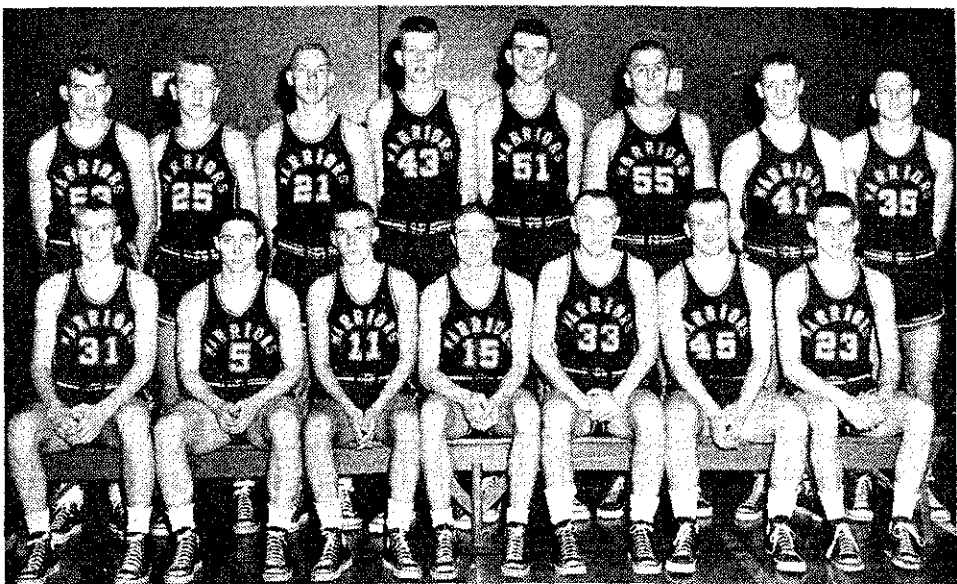
ESTIMATED ATTENDANCE "B"
