

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1962-1963. Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDHSAA office. Space was rented in the St. Charles Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1957. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA building at 411 E. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Activities Association," it was necessary to add additional help. Mr. D. W. Evans was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEA building.

The new SDEA building is pictured on page 3 of this "YEAR BOOK." *Resigned—April 1963.

REVIEW OF SDSHIAA EVENTS 1962-1963

Following, you will find a brief review of the events and affairs of the SDHSIAA for the year of 1962-63. A summary of all state-wide events will be found on other pages of this "YEAR BOOK."

Since the Association is now an "Activities Association", the events mentioned and summarized are for both athletics and non-athletic events. Separate sections will be used.

1962-63 was a good year. There was an apparent gain in non-athletic activities, and the athletic activities continued to grow and become better. Management of affairs at the local level and through district, division, section, region and state levels seemed to become better and to improve. We firmly believe that our programs in South Dakota compare favorably with similar programs in the other states of the nation.

Our interscholastic program of athletics seems to get better, more boys are playing football and there has been constant growth in cross country running. In fact, the growth has been so great that it became almost impossible to handle the State Cross Country. For 1963, the event will be put into two classes.

The Press Association Convention in Brookings was very well attended, and students participating received valuable help in preparation for work on their own papers and year books.

The All-State Chorus and Orchestra was a wonderful event. It has become so large that it has become rather unwieldy, and consequently the Music Educators are working on ways and means of reducing the number taking part.

Speech work has shown some growth. The number participating in the fall declamatory program was gratifying. More schools took part in the one-act play contest, and debate showed additional number of schools competing.

The Student Council had two very worthwhile conventions, and several more activities are planned for the future in this activity.

While there is no state competition in music, the region contests were well attended, and a new music region has been formed for 1963-64. The All-State Band event was again outstanding, and the Band Masters organization is to be congratulated for making this event the fine event that it is.

Wrestling has shown a gain. In fact, it will be necessary to have a series of elimination tournaments to qualify wrestlers to the State Wrestling Tournament.

Basketball, as far as varsity teams are concerned, cannot grow, since each member school does have a varsity team. However, there is a gain in the number playing in intra-mural programs, and an increase in the number of below varsity teams competing in interschool programs.

Track gets better. While the number of qualifiers to the State Meet remains quite constant, there are more smaller meets and greater participation is shown in the Region Meets.

The Annual Summer Coaching School was a real good one and was very well attended. The Spring Track Clinic holds its own from an attendance standpoint.

Football and Basketball Rules Meetings for coaches and officials were continued and attendance at these meetings was definitely up.

Following the regular Annual Meeting of the SDHSIAA last October, no proposed amendments were passed. Two Board of Control members were elected—Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh of Vermillion, who was appointed to succeed Mr. D. W. Evans, was elected to a regular five year term; and Supt. Bruce Crosswait of Hot Springs, who was appointed to succeed Supt. Witter, formerly of Lead, was also elected to a two year term. Mr. Crosswait has since resigned and left the State.

Both the "A" and "B" State Basketball Tournaments were held in the new Sioux Falls Arena and new attendance records were set. The championship rounds of the "B" Tournament were televised.

The State "A" and "B" Track Meets, held in Mitchell, were outstanding events. Several "A" and "B" records were set, as well as two all-time State Meet Records.

The Golf and Tennis Tournaments were well attended, with more good golfers participating this year than ever before. The number competing in Tennis was also greater than in past years.

1962–1963 SDHSIAA EVENTS ATHLETIC

Board of Control Meeting Pierre, July 29, 1962

Since, with one exception, the membership of the Board of Control was completely new, an organizational meeting of the Board was necessary. Supt. R. W. Monfore of Springfield, the only holdover member of the Board, was named Chairman, and Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh of Vermillion was elected Vice Chairman. Other actions of the Board will be found on other pages of this "YEAR BOOK".

1962 Coaching School

Huron, August 13, 14, 15, 1962

A gratifying number of coaches, over 200, took advantage of the Annual Coaching School and were treated to the best the nation could offer.

Ara Parseghian, Head Football Coach at Northwestern University, did a remarkable job of teaching football. He was enthusiastic, a fine speaker, and had that ability to give the coaches what they needed.

Another nationally known Coach, Ed Jucker of Cincinnati, handled the Basketball end of the School. Mr. Jucker's Cincinnati teams have won two consecutive national NCAA championships, and his ability to impart his knowledge of the game to the coaches was very apparent.

Weaver Jordan, Head Trainer at Baylor University, gave the coaches valuable and sensible information on the care of, and the prevention of, injuries.

As usual, the coaches of the SDHSIAA championship "A" and "B" Basketball teams were also featured in the Coaching School pro-

gram. Charles Gustafson, Coach of the "B" Championship team at Pine Ridge, and Dal Eisenbraun, Coach of the "A" Champions, the Brookings "Bob Cats", handled their end of the school very well.

All sessions at the 1962 school were held in air-conditioned comfort in the new "Inn". We deeply appreciate the hospitality and the many courtesies extended by the management of this hotel.

Board of Control Meeting Pierre, August 16, 1962

Since all Board Members were in Pierre for the August Administrators' Meeting, a short meeting of the Board was held. Again, actions of the Board will be enumerated on other pages of this Book.

August Administrators' Meeting

SDHSIAA plans for the school year were presented to the Administrators by Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans, Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary respectively of the SDHSIAA.

1962 Football Rules Meetings

Since 1938, with the exception of three World War 1I years, the Association has sponsored a series of Football Rules Meetings for coaches and officials. In 1962, meetings were held at Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Dupree, Huron, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Watertown, and Winner. An actual count of attendance cards shows that 1101 attended these meetings. No doubt more attended, but did not fill out the attendance cards.

Board of Control Meeting Sioux Falls, October 10, 1962

One of the regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Control is before the regular Annual Meeting of the Association, which was scheduled on October 11, 1962, during the SDEA Convention, as per By-Laws of the Association. Again, important actions of the Board during the year can be found on other pages of this "YEAR." BOOK.

Regular Annual Meeting SDHSIAA Sioux Falls, October 11, 1962

Representatives from 109 member schools of the SDHSIAA attended the Annual Meeting of the Association held in the Washington High-School Auditorium in Sioux Falls. These representatives, and many others, heard reports and discussions for and against the three amendments which had been proposed, and made nominations for two-Board of Control members.

Three amendments to the By-Laws of the SDHSIAA had previously been properly submitted. They were: (1) Admission of all ac-

credited schools to membership in the Association; (2) To increase dues; and (3) To change "A" and "B" classification in Track.

In subsequent mail balloting, none of the above-mentioned amendments received the necessary majority to pass.

For Board of Control members, there were two (2) vacancies. Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh of Vermillion had been appointed to succeed Mr. D. W. Evans, and was nominated to succeed himself. Supt. E. W. Skarda was also nominated, but did not accept the nomination, so Mr. Ashbaugh was elected without opposition. Supt. Bruce Crosswait of Hot Springs, had previously been appointed to succeed Supt. Witter of Lead, and was nominated to succeed himself for the remaining two years of that term. Since there was no opposition, Mr. Crosswait was declared elected.

1962 Cross Country Run

On a rather cool, windy day, 194 runners from 48 schools started and finished the Seventeenth Annual Cross Country Run. The course which was used was the same as for all other runs - the golf course at South Dakota State College. The number competing exceeded all other Cross Country Runs.

Paul Moss of the Flandreau Indian High School was the winner, with a new record time of 11:25.5 minutes, thus breaking the mark established in 1960 by Wayne Triebwasser of Clear Lake. Norman White Shirt of the South Dakota School for Deaf was a close second, also beating the former record. Philip Bear Face of Wakpala was a close third.

The Flandreau Indian High School took team honors with 15 points. Rapid City was second with 26 points, and Washington High School of Sioux Falls was third with 31 points. The Flandreau Indian runners were Paul Moss, Dale Moss, and Altwin Grassrope.

Track and Cross Country Coach Glen Robinson of South Dakota State College again ably managed and organized the seventeenin running of the High School Cross Country Run.

1962 Basketball Rules Meetings

Starting October 22 and ending November 19 your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary conducted twenty Basketball Rules Meetings for coaches and officials. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Gettysburg, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, White River, Winner, and Yankton.

1258 attendance cards were collected at these meetings, a gratifying attendance, although slightly under the 1961 record.

At each meeting rule changes were discussed and explained. Old rules were reviewed, methods and mechanics of officiating were discussed. We believe officials and coaches have a better understanding of the rules and there is more uniformity in officiating.

National Alliance Football Rules Meeting

The regular Annual Meeting of the National Alliance Football Rules Committee was held in Chicago on January 7, 8, and 9, 1963. Minor changes in the rules were made, all of which had the safety of the player as the first consideration.

Copies of all rule changes and clarifications were sent to all foot-

Copies of all rule changes and clarifications were sent to all football coaches, after the meeting, and all will be thoroughly explained and discussed at the Football Rules Meetings in August and September.

Your Executive Secretary is a member of the Alliance Football Rules Committee.

Board of Contmol Committee Meeting Pierre, January 15, 1963

A Committee of the Board of Control met with a Committee from the Associated School Boards in Pierre on January 15, 1963 to work out mutual problems. The meeting was a good one and as a result there will be better understanding between the two groups.

Board of Control Meeting

January 23, 1963

A special meeting of the Board of Control was held on January 23, 1963 in Pierre. The meeting was held because of House Bill #592 which was introduced in the Legislature. A statement opposing the bill was prepared, and individual Board Members had informal meetings with their Senators and Representatives while in Pierre.

Board of Control Meeting Huron, February 2, 1963

A portion of the Board of Control met in Huron on February 2, 1963 to present arguments against House Bill #592 to the School Administrators at their meeting in Huron on February 2, 1963.

1963 State Wrestling Tournament

Financial arrangements to be as for the 1963 Tournaments.

Board of Control Meeting

Pierre, April 22, 1963

Since there was to be a meeting of the 32 "A" Basketball Schools on April 23, it was necessary for the Board of Control to meet in preparation for this meeting.

Other than preparing for the meeting of the $32~{\rm ``A''}$ schools and the Board of Control, routine matters were handled.

Meeting of the 32 "A" Schools

Pierre, April 23, 1963

To be brief, the 32 "A" Basketball Schools for the seasons of 1963-1964 and 1964-1965 met in Pierre to arrange schools in sections for the next two seasons as provided for in the By-Laws of the Association.

Several plans or suggestions were made, but when voting was done, Plan #1 as presented was adopted on the first ballot. Following is the arrangement of schools by Sections for the next two basketball seasons:

1963 State Track Meet

Weather was quite good for the State Track and Field Meet in Mitchell on May 17 and 18. Athough heavy rains on Thursday threatened to make the track heavy, long hours of work by A. A. "Joe" Quintal and his crew got the track in excellent condition before the evening preliminaries on Friday night. Running records were set in the preliminaries showing that the track was in good shape.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls won the "A" Meet, with Rapid City finishing second, closely followed by Aberdeen, the Flandreau Indian High School and Milbank. In the "B" Meet, Hoven edged Gary for Championship honors, with Northville, Emery and White following.

1963 Golf Tournament

Because of an almost new Board of Control, because of increased supervision over all activities, because of the 1963 session of the State Legislature, and because of the rearrangement of "A" Basketball schools in sections for 1963-1964 and 1964-1965, it was necessary to have more Board of Control Meetings than in any recent year. There were nine Board Meetings and one meeting which a Committee of the Board attended.

Board of Control members elected Supt. R. W. Monfore of Springfield Chairman of the Board and Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh of Vermillion as Vice Chairman of the Board. R. M. Walseth, by the By-Laws of the SDHSIAA, is Secretary-Treasurer of the Board.

Other Actions By Board of Control

All actions were taken at one of the meetings of the Board of Control. Actions are not listed in the order of their importance, but chronologically as per meetings.

(1) The Board ruled on quite a large number of eligibility problems; (2) Decided to have Mr. D. C. Reutter continue to assist with speech work in an advisory capacity; (3) Authorized Mr. Reutter and Mr. Evans to attend the NUEA Meeting in Cleveland in December 1962; (4) Asked Dr. John B. Van Why to continue as Executive Secretary of the Association of Student Councils for 1962-1963; (5) Decided to continue the operation of the South Dakota High School Press Association for 1962-1963 as in the past year; (6) Decided to submit two amendments-one to change the "A" and "B" classifications, and the other to raise dues; (7) Decided to try to revise the By-Laws of the SDHSIAA into a more workable Constitution and By-Laws; (8) Accepted Joston's bid for trophies and medals for school year of 1962-1963; (9) Studied plans to improve officiating at the State Track Meet and authorized the use of a finish line camera; (10) Decided to use eight [8] officials in each State Basketball Tournament; (11) Set a schedule of fees for television of the State Tournaments, provided the tournament or tournaments were sold out; (12) Since legislation in the form of House Bill #592 was presented in the House of Representatives, and since such legislation was thought objectionable, the Board contacted all schools, stating their objections to the legislation and asked school men to contact their senators and representatives; (13) Decided to present two amendments in the fall; [1] To admit all accredited schools to membership in the SDHSIAA, and [2] To place a School Board member on the Board of Control; (14) Awarded the 1964 "B" Basketball Tournament to Sioux Falls, and awarded the 1964 "A" Basketball Tournament to Huron; (15) Will try to better inform Boards of Education on the activities of the Association; (16) To again have schools file a membership pledge; (17) Awarded the 1964 State Wrestling Tournament to Watertown; (18) Approved the formation of a new music region in the Black Hills area; (19) Studied Student Insurance plans; (20) Established procedures to be followed by the 32 "A" schools in their meeting to arrange "A" Basketball Sections for 1963-1964 and for 1964-1965; (21) Approved the plan adopted by the 32 "A" schools: (22) Changed Cross Country Run from one class to an "A" and "B" classification, same as for Track; (23) Will allow four [4] runners from a school in the State Cross Country Run; (24) Reappointed the SDHSIAA Wrestling Committee and asked them to work out an elimination plan for wrestling and to report back to the Board of Control for approval; (25) Decided to send someone to Wrestling Interpretation Meeting in Chicago, October 21, 1963 and then have several rule interpretation meetings in the State; (26) Decided to ask coaches at their summer meeting to decide how they wanted the Medley and Mile Relays run in the Region and State Meets; (27) To continue Friday preliminaries in the State Meet in the evening; (28) Awarded the State Track Meet and the State Golf and Tennis Tournaments for 1964 to Huron; (29) Decided to make D. C. Reutter the official representative to NUEA Convention in St. Louis in December of 1963; (30) Authorized Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans to attend the National Football Rules Meeting in January 1964; (31) Named Mr. Monfore, Mr. Evans and Mr. Walseth delegates to National Federation Convention in Lake Placid, New York in June of 1963; (32) Assigned schools dropping from "A" to "B" districts, and of necessity made some other changes in "B" districts; (33) Awarded Josten's a contract for trophies and medals for 1963-1964; (34) Set up a retirement plan for Mr. Evans and Mr. Walseth; (35) Approved and adopted the budget for 1963-1964; (36) Authorized further work on Constitution and By-Laws.







THE 1963 TOURNAMENTS

Two new champions were crowned in the 1963 "B" and "A" Tournaments. Alexandria was the "B" winner with Sisseton the "A" winner. Neither of these teams had ever been the champion before. Alexandria did compete in the 1924 State Tournament, before "A" and "B" classifications and in the "B" Tournaments of 1942 and 1957. Their record is therefore good in the "B" Class, winning a State Championship in their third attempt. Sisseton, not a complete stranger to state tournament play won the "A" in their fourth appearance. They did participate in the "A" Tournaments of 1955, 1956 and in 1962. Sisseton also participated in the 1949 and 1950 "B" Tournaments.

Our congratulations to Alexandria and to Sisseton, there is no doubt in anyones mind that these two fine teams should have been the "Champs" and they are!

Alexandria was a good sound team, which played good basketball, they had good size, with the one good big man, a good pair of guards and two very fine forwards to go with the big man. Coach Marv Rasmussen did an excellent job with this team. They knew what to do, both offensively and defensively and systematically went about doing their work and it was well done. This fine team is a very worthy addition to the fine "B" Champions of the past.

Sisseton, the "A" Champion, was a very versatile team. They were a good sized team but they possessed speed and poise and did well playing a deliberate game, or going at top speed. The team really was "good." They deserved the championship.

Coach Jack Theeler did a great job with his players, they handled the ball well, rebounded beautifully and had that happy faculty of getting the ball to the open man at the correct moment. The team was very sound and made few mistakes.

It would be impossible to give too much credit to the coaches of these two fine championship teams, Marvin Rasmussen of Alexandria and Jack Theeler of Sisseton. They had their teams ready for the tournaments and when they were completed there was little or no doubt in the fans minds but that the best teams won! Both Marv and Jack are credits to the coaching profession and we are happy to be able to say that we know both of these coaches well and it is a privilege to be associated with them.

Before forgetting the tournaments, we must remember that there were seven other teams in each tournament. Each of these teams won its way into the State Tournament and had to eliminate other good teams to get there. The field in each tournament was great.

On other pages of this bulletin you will find results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, including financial reports. Incidentally all tournaments were the best ever!

Both the "A" and "B" State Tournaments were held in the new Sioux Falls Arena, and the "B" Tournament was completely sold out weeks ahead of the dates for the tournament and the capacity of the Arena is over 9,000. The "A" Tournament was the best ever financially. Friday and Saturday night sessions were "sold out."

Tournament management in Sioux Falls was wonderful and we cannot close our discussion on tournaments without a mention of the efficient manner in which Washington High School handled both Tournaments. Special mention must be given Wally Diehl, who was the general manager for both tournaments.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to

determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1961 "A" Tournaments a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winner of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1963 tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 "B" Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.





ACTIVITIES

MUSIC COUNCIL MEETING

Representatives from six of the seven music regions of the state convened for the annual meeting of the Music Council at The Inn in Huron on September 15. Only Region VII was not represented. At this meeting the Council reviewed the regulations for conducting the annual contests, added three instrumental solos and an ensemble event to the contest list, and granted permission to Region IV to experiment with permitting more than one entry from a school in the piano competition. A committee consisting of Paul Hedge, Webster; Willis Fischer, Eureka; and E. O. Evenson, Aberdeen, was named to study a proposal which would make it possible for a school to enter a greater number of each type of instrumentalist in the solo

Officers of the Council re-elected for another year were K. S. Lotspeich, Madison, president, and E. O. Evenson, Aberdeen, vice president. D. w. Evans, Pierre, was named to replace Harold Ashbaugh, Vermillion, as secretary-treasurer. Thirteen people attended the meeting.

1962 Press Convention

South Dakota State College again was host to the convention of the South Dakota High School Press Association which brought more than 1,000 high school journalists and their advisers to the campus on Saturday, October 27. James Webster, South Dakota manager for United Press International, addressed the general session of the convention. Presentation of All-State awards was also made at this general session. These awards are listed elsewhere in this book along with the names of those who were members of the All-State Staff covering the 1962 convention of the South Dakota Education Association. During the noon hour, student delegates were served a barbecue dinner by Block and Bridle, and advisers met for a luncheon and business meeting in the Union Building. Mrs. Bernice Speh, Dell Rapids, presided at the business meeting. In the afternoon, roundtable sessions brought the convention to a close. The program for the convention was ably organized and directed by Mr. Harlan Stensaas, instructor in the School of Journalism at State College and executive secretary of the High School Press Association.

Declamation Contests

During 1962-1963 more students participated in the declamation program than in any other speech program sponsored by the Association. There were 713 students from 189 schools taking part in the district contests. Fifty-six more from the 14 "A" schools entered competition at the divisional level. Although there is no way to determine how many students competed on the local level, it is probably safe to assume that there were several thousand. The foregoing figures show that 203 of the 248 member schols participated.

Of the students competing, 51 from 33 schools reached the State Contest at Pierre on November 16-17. From this group the judges awarded superior ratings to seven in the oratory section, 10 in the dramatic reading section, six in the poetry section, and five in the humorous section. Dan Bucks, Doland, was first in oratory; Marilyn Henry, Huron, was first in dramatic reading; Marilynne Felderman, Doland, and Julie

Wince, Vermillion, tied for first in poetry; and Virginia Carlson, Centerville, was first in humorous reading. A summary of the other ratings are to be found on another page of this yearbook.

Schools earning two superior ratings in the state contest were awarded plaques. They included Doland, Aberdeen Central, Arlington, Huron, Custer, Watertown, Madison Central, Hecla and Vermillion.

All-State Chorus and Orchestra

The All-State Chorus and Orchestra gathered in Huron November 9 and 10 for two days of hard work culminating in a concert Saturday evening before a crowd of nearly 3,000 persons in the huge Huron arena.

Observers marveled at the skill with which Joseph Mussulman, guest conductor, blended and harmonized the more than 1,200 young voices into a musical organization which, with less than two days of practice, performed so creditably. Adding to the pleasure of the listeners was a 120-piece orchestra under the direction of Leo Kucinski of Sioux City, Iowa. Members of the chorus came from 158 schools. Orchestra members represented 11 schools.

Authorized by the SDHSIAA, the All-State Chorus and Orchestra project is sponsored annually by the South Dakota Music Educators Association. The program was ably directed this past year by Mr. Scott Dexter of Huron who served both as president of the Music Educators and general chairman for the All-State event. Next year's All-State Chorus and Orchestra will be in Aberdeen with Mr. Merlyn Aman of Aberdeen as general chairman. Dr. Victor Weidensee, Black Hills Teachers College, is the new president of the Music Educators.

Student Council Conventions

Approximately 300 high school students and advisers participated in the two regional student council conventions last fall. One hundred twenty-seven were reported attending the West River meeting at Rapid City on November 17, and 175 at the East River meeting in Huron on December 1. Twenty-one high schools were represented at Huron.

Association officers elected for next year's state-wide convention year included President David Greschke, Huron High School; Vice President Ralph Farrar, Rapid City High School; Secretary Martha Lothrop, Huron High School; and Treasurer Roberta Clay, Hot Springs High School.

Principal speakers at the East River convention were John Graff, Executive Secretary of the Greater South Dakota Association and Dr. Jack Early, President of Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell. Round table discussions filled out the program at both conventions.

Plans for 1963-64 include two one-day clinics and a state-wide convention. The first clinic will be held at Rapid City on September 21 and the second at Huron on September 23. Mr. Gerald Van Pool, assistant secretary of the National Association of Student Councils, Washington, D. C., will be the featured speaker at the clinics. The state convention is scheduled for December 14, 1963, in Pierre.

Drama Program Growing

Three schools earned superior ratings with their presentations at the State One-Act Play Festival in Mitchell January 25-26, but the big news at the festival was the apparent evidence of growth and

development in the One-Act Play program. For the first time the maximum 10 entries participated in the state event, resulting in its rescheduling for two days. All four "big school" spots on the schedule were filled, and there was competition on the division level for each of the other six spots. Twenty-four schools participated in the program this year.

Gregory, Doland, and Sioux Falls Washington received the superior ratings. Gregory presented "The Wonder Hat" under the direction of William Hohlfeld; Doland staged "Mechanical Jane" directed by Mrs. Lulu Ann Herther; and Washington High presented "A Long Christmas Dinner" with L. R. Kremer directing. Further ratings are summarized elsewhere in this yearbook.

The State Festival for 1964 has been set for January 24:25 and again will be on the Dakota Wesleyan University Campus in Mitchell. The speech committee is hoping that at least 35 schools will enter the festivals next year.

Regional Music Contests

From the point of view of numbers participating, the Regional Music Contests were the largest activities events of the year. It is estimated that more than 10,000 students competed. Also, they probably took the most detailed planning by regional committees of any activity sponsored by the SDHSIAA.

Contests were held in seven regions during the months of February and April. Most regions split their contests into a large group section and a solo-ensemble section and held the two sections on different dates. The exceptions were Regions IV and VII which combined the sections into one contest. Schools in Region IV competed at Aberdeen on April 5 and 6, and schools in Region VII were at Philip on April 5.

Region V is unique in that it held three separate contests. In addition to the large group contest at Mitchell on April 5, there was a vocal solo and ensemble contest at Kimball on February 6 and an instrumental solo and ensemble contest at Wessington Springs on February 13.

Region I schools competed at Vermillion in both contest sections, the solo and ensemble in February and the large group in April. Region II schools were at Madison for both sections, the solo and ensemble in February and the large group in April. Region III schools competed at Watertown in the solo and ensemble section in February and at Brookings in April in the large group section. Region VI schools traveled to Mobridge twice, in February for the solo and ensemble contest and in April for the large group contest.

Next year's contests have also been scheduled for February and April, most of them on corresponding dates. However, one change made necessary by a crowded calendar next year was the scheduling of the large group contests one week later in April. The Board of Control reserved the week end of April 10-11 for them.

Doland and Watertown Debaters Win Titles

Debaters from Watertown and Doland took top honors in the State High School Forensics Tournament which closed the speech season at Huron Saturday afternoon, March 30. Watertown won the championship in Class "A" and Doland in Class "B". This was the

third consecutive title for Doland. Doland added further to this year's triumph by winning individual championships in both boys' and girls' extemporaneous speaking.

Rapid City was runner-up in Class "A" and Tyndall in Class "B". Rapid City speakers won first place in both boys' and girls' extemp in Class "A". A summary of the results of the meet will be found elsewhere in this "YEAR BOOK".

D. C. "Doc" Reutter, Huron, served as meet manager and did his usual excellent job in making the tournament a success. The Association is indebted to Huron College for the use of its facilities in conducting the meet. Next year the tournament will return to Huron College on March 31 and April 1.

All-State Band

Instrumentalists from 52 schools were chosen to play in the All-State Band which worked diligently for two days in Huron, March 22 and 23, preparatory to appearing in a concert that Saturday evening in the Arena under the direction of Lt. Col. William F. Santelmann. This 160-piece organization, put together in such a short time, played so well under the tutelage of the retired commander of the United States Marine Band that it prompted him to remark that they were as close to the performance of a professional band as any group of high school people he had ever worked with.

Membership in the band was determined through auditions conducted at eight different sites during the Saturdays in January. Vermillion High School qualified the most performers for the band with thirteen participating. Huron and Sioux Falls Washington each qualified 9, Flandreau 8, Britton 7, Clear Lake 7, Madison Central 6, Mitchell 6, Aberdeen Central 6, Milbank 6, and Webster, Dell Rapids and Groton 5 each.

General chairman for the project was Stewart Christensen, Director of Instrumental Music at Huron High School. He did a very capable job of making arrangements for the event, the end result being a polished performance by a group of high school musicians. Close to 1,000 people attended the concert Saturday night.

The All-State Band is scheduled for Watertown next year on April 3 and 4.

Membership approves changes proposed by Speech Committee

Seven changes in by-laws and regulations proposed by the executive committee of the Speech Association were approved by the member schools of the Association in a late May referendum and will go into effect with the beginning of the 1963-1964 school year. The proposed changes resulted from meetings of the committee at Sioux Falls on Aprl 19 and at Pierre on May 4. The changes are listed here:

- (1) Eligibility lists no longer need to be sent to the chairman of any speech contests. However, eligibilty rules are unchanged and must still be observed.
- (2) The requirement that humorous readings be taken only from published works has been eliminated from the declam regulations.
- (3) In declam the barred list of readings has been eliminated. A winning reading in the state contest is no longer barred from further use.

- (4) On the divisional level in declam the surplus or deficit resulting from the contest shall be prorated among the participating schools on the basis of the number of contestants each school has competing. In the past the prorating has been done on the basis of the number of schools participating. This change does not apply to district contests.
- (5) In the drama festivals the barred list of plays has been eliminated. Winning plays on the state level have been barred from use for two years in the past but this section of the regulations has now been deleted.
- (6) Actors and actresses rated superior in the state festival are no longer barred from further participation.
- (7) After January 1 each year the debate proposition used on the state level will be the same as the one used nation-wide.

Music Region Organized in Black Hills

A new region of the High School Music Association has been crganized in the Black Hills area. Representatives of 12 schools met at Rapid City on May 11 to discuss the proposed organization and voted 11 to 1 to carry it out. The new organization will be designated as Region VIII and will sponsor a solo and ensemble contest February 22, 1964, at the Douglas School near the Ellsworth Air Force Base. Both the West River Vocal and Instrumental Music Festivals will continue to operate under the same organization they have in the past.

Members of the Region VIII committee named at the Rapid City meeting are Don Varcoe, senior high school principal at Rapid City, chairman; E. C. Coddington, superintendent of schools at Spearfish, secretary-treasurer and contest manager; Earl Boxa, superintendent of schools at Vale; Gail Hilgenberg, band director at Hot Springs; and Charles Thielen, vocal music director at Sturgis.

Region VIII is to include all of the counties of Harding, Butte, Lawrence, Custer, Fall River, the west half of Meade and that part of Pennington west of the Cheyenne River.




