FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1964-1965. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDHSAA office. Space was rented in the St. Charles Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1957. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA building at 411 E. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Activities Association," it was necessary to add additional help. Mr. D. W. Evans was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEA building.

REVIEW OF SDHSIAA EVENTS FOR 1964-1965

Following, you will find a very brief mention of the events and the business of the SDHSIAA for the school year of 1964-1965. All state-wide events are summarized on other pages of this "Year Book" and in most cases, pictures of teams, and individuals are reproduced.

The year of 1964-1965 marks the fourth year that the Association has been an "Activities Association" and therefore the events mentioned and summarized are for both athletic and non-athletic events. The summaries are in different, but appropriate sections of the book.

1964-1965 was a good year, with more and more responsibility for all events, both athletic and non-athletic being channelled through the Association Office. There seems to be complete harmony existing in the several organizations, now a part of the "Activities Association". Athletic programs continue to be strong, healthy growth seems apparent in the non-athletic field. Even with more centralized controls, the programs could not be effectively administered without the use of committees both athletic and non-athletic, in the different parts of the state. The Board of Control of the SDHSIAA wishes to thank the many people who have handled the district, region, section and division activities, and the wonderful help received on affairs of a state-wide nature. Your help has made these affairs efficient and interesting. Again a big "Thank You!"

The athletic program of the SDHSIAA seems to improve yearly. With football continuing to grow, several teams advanced from eight-man to eleven-man football and others took the places in eight-man football, for those schools moving up to the eleven-man game, and we believe one conference actually played nine-man football.

Cross Country more than held its own. Two years ago it was necessary to divide the schools into A and B classes and if the growth continues it might become necessary to have region eliminations, to keep the numbers, especially in the "B" Class, to a workable size in the State Cross Country Run.

Basketball at the varsity level cannot expand, since each member school does have a varsity team. However the number participating in inter-school competition has grown by the number of teams representing member schools, in inter-school competition.

Wrestling has shown great growth. Because of the number of schools participating, it has been necessary to have region eliminations. Now some of the Regions are so crowded, it is possible that additional regions may become necessary. The State Tournament has sixteen in each weight class.

Track continues to show more strength, and while the number of contestants in the State Meet remains quite constant, more schools are participating in regular and region meets and the quality continues to improve as shown by the way records are taken care of. Apparently no record is safe.

Golf and tennis Tournaments in 1965 were very good. There has been some growth in golf as shown by the number participating in the Region Golf Tournaments. The number of Tennis players is about the same.

The several non-athletic programs, which are a part of the Activities Association, have seemed to prosper and growth was evident.

The Annual Press Association Meeting in Brookings was well attended and students participating received valuable help and hints in the preparation for work on school papers and year books. There is a better understanding of the affairs of the Press Association and a

meeting of officers and sponsors was held in Pierre during the year, at which time plans for 1965-1966 were formulated.

The All-State Chorus and Orchestra, and the All-State Band, while not projects of the SDHSIAA, were splendid events and the Music Educators and Band Masters are to be congratulated on these wonderful events. The SDHSIAA will be more closely associated with these fine events in the future.

The number of schools participating and the number of individual students taking part in the several divisions of speech work has shown an increase and it is anticipated that there will be additional growth in both the debate and the One Act Play divisions of speech.

Three Area Workshops were held in the state for members of school Student Councils. Two of the workshops were in the east river area, at Watertown and Parkston and the third was at Rapid City.

Two student council representatives attended the National Convention at Lexington, Kentucky in June of 1965.

1964-1965 SDHSIAA EVENTS

ATHLETIC

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

At a Meeting of the Board, late in June, 1964, it was definitely decided to fight House Bill No. 513, which was passed by the 1964 Legislature. Prior to this decision, a poll of the schools was taken and a large majority of the schools authorized the Board to go to court and test the constitutionality of the above named Bill. On other pages of this Year Book a rather complete summary of action, to the time of writing, will be found.

1965 COACHING SCHOOL

HURON, AUG. 17, 18, 19, 1964

The 1964 Coaching School was the largest ever. Over 250 coaches attended the school and they were well repaid for their attendance. We believe the 1964 school was the best ever.

Staff members were: Lloyd Eaton and his Assistant, Paul Roach of the University of Wyoming, for football; George Ireland, Loyola University of Chicago handled basketball; Roger Denker of Central Missouri did the instructing in Wrestling; and Eddie Wojecki of Rice University was the Trainer. To try to pick out the best part of the school would be very difficult as each man did an outstanding job.

In addition to the men mentioned above, Bob Brooks of Mitchell and Jim Cordts of Howard, coaches of our two 1964 Basketball Championship teams were also on the program. Dr. Ted Hohm of Huron gave the coaches much to think about, on conditioning high school athletes and the handling of injured players.

All sessions of the school were held in air-conditioned comfort, at the "Inn". We deeply appreciate the hospitality and the friendly spirit extended to the coaches by the Management of this hotel.

1964 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

Football Rules Meetings for Coaches and Officials were started in 1938 and except for war years a series of such meetings has continued each year. In 1964 meetings were held in Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Dupree, Huron, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Watertown and Winner. Attendance at the 1964 Meetings totaled 1073.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

SIoux FALLS—OCT. 7, 1964

The Board of Control has a regularly scheduled meeting the day prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. At this meeting routine business is taken care of and procedures for the Annual Meeting of the Association are reviewed and the part the Board should play at the Annual Meeting is discussed and assignments made.

At this meeting of the Board, Dr. M. A. Auld of Yankton was declared an official Member of the Board. In 1963 the members of the Association passed an Amendment to the By-Laws to provide that a School Board member from a School Board representing a member school of the Association, become a member of the SDHSIAA Board of Control. His selection was to be made by the Associated School Boards. Dr. Auld was elected by the Associated School Boards in September and welcomed to the SDHSIAA Board of Control at this Oct. 7 Meeting of the Board.

REGULAR ANNUAL SDHSIAA MEETING

SIoux FALLS — OCT. 8, 1964

Seventy-nine (79) member schools were officially represented at the Annual Meeting of the SDHSIAA in Sioux Falls Oct. 8, 1964. Reports were given by the Executive Secretary and the Assistant Executive Secretary and amendments were discussed.

Two amendments had been previously and properly submitted, but in the discussion of the amendments, both were tabled, pending the outcome of the Court Case on the constitutionality of House Bill No. 513, passed by the 1964 session of the State Legislature.

Mr. Mortenson of Belle Fourche was nominated to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Control, and since Mr. Mortenson had been elected for a one-year term, he was eligible for reelection to a regular five (5) year term. There was no other nomination and therefore Mr. Mortenson was declared elected.

1964 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

For the second year the 19th Annual Cross Country Run was divided into "A" and "B" Classes, with 107 runners from 28 "B" schools and 114 runners from 26 "A" schools participating. For the second con-

secutive year, Philip Bearface of Wakpala won the "B" event with Gene Johnson of Yankton the individual winner in the "A" event.

Wakpala High School won the "B" team event with 20 points, while Rapid City was the winner in the "A" team event with a total of 22 points.

Cross Country Coach, Tom Woodall of the S. D. State University organized and managed the 19th running of the SDHSIAA Cross Country Run.

A complete summary of this fine event will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

1964 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Starting October 26 and ending Nov. 9 your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary conducted eighteen (18) Basketball Rules Meetings for Coaches and Officials. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, Winner and Yankton.

At each of the meetings, rule changes were discussed and explained. Old rules were reviewed and the mechanics of officiating were discussed. We believe Coaches and Officials have a better understanding of the rules and that officiating is more uniform because of these meetings. 1129 attended the eighteen meetings.

1964 WRESTLING RULES MEETINGS

Tom Long of the Rapid City High School conducted five Wrestling Rules Meetings for the SDHSIAA at Brookings, Pierre, Redfield, Mitchell and Rapid City and while no attendance figures are available a good number of coaches and officials attended the meetings.

Prior to these meetings, Mr. Long attended an Interpreter's meeting in Denver, to prepare for the five meetings he conducted.

More meetings of this type will be held in 1965.

COURT ACTION

In June of 1964, member schools of the SDHSIAA, authorized the Board of Control to go to Court to test the constitutionality of House Bill No. 513 which was passed by the 1964 State Legislature. The Bill reads as follows:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA:

All high schools approved and accredited by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, pursuant to the provisions of SDC 1960 Title 15 as amended from time to time, shall be eligible for membership in the South Dakota High School Interscholastic Activities Association or any successor thereof. Nothing herein contained shall prevent such Association, or its successor, from adopting uniform rules and regulations governing its affairs, including provision for suspension of schools or their students for violation of such rules and regulations.

Briefly, following is the procedure followed by our Attorneys, Sam Masten of Canton and Geo. F. Johnson of Gregory. When the law became effective on July 1, 1964, applications from non-member schools were rejected and on July 8 action started. The Action was brought under Uniform Declaratory Judgment Law. The defendants answered and made a counter claim, by which it was prayed that Chapter 51 be declared valid and a Writ of Mandamus be issued requiring the Association to admit the non-member accredited high schools to membership.

On Sept. 4 Attorneys for both sides reviewed records, Minutes and other information in the SDHSIAA Office and took a deposition from Executive Secretary R. M. Walseth.

On October 16, in Circuit Court, Judge Nichol made an order requiring the Association to admit non-member accredited schools, but the Court stayed this Order for fifteen days.

On Oct. 27, the Plaintiff, (SDHSIAA) petitioned to the Supreme Court to appeal such order. This appeal was denied on Oct. 30, 1964. The Supreme Court, however, continued the stay which Judge Nichol had granted until the case could be determined on its merits.

Pursuant to stipulation of the parties, the case came on for trial at the Court House in Mitchell, Davison County, South Dakota at the hour of 10:00 a.m. on Nov. 5, 1964 with the Honorable Judge Nichol as presiding Judge. At the conclusion of the case, the Court directed that briefs be submitted.

On Jan. 15, 1965, the Plaintiffs (SDHSIAA) and the Defendants filed briefs with Judge Nichol who would review these briefs and render a decision. On June 2, Judge Nichol ruled in favor of the Defendants and the Attorneys agreed that on or before July 15 an appeal would be made to the Supreme Court or accept to membership these non-member accredited high schools, making application for membership.

An appeal has been made to the Supreme Court and at the time this Year Book is being prepared, no decision has been rendered.

STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

SPEARFISH—FEB. 26, 27, 1965

For the second year, it has been necessary to hold region elimination tournaments in Wrestling, to qualify sixteen (16) wrestlers, in each weight class for the State Tournament. Apparently the region method is quite satisfactory, although some of the four regions are getting pretty large.

The State Wrestling Tournament was an outstanding event. Director Joe Rygg and his able staff ran the event as it should be run. Rapid City won the team Championship with Watertown, Redfield and Spearfish finishing 2nd, 3rd and 4th with only one point separating each of these three schools.

A complete summary with pictures of the twelve (12) winners will be found on other pages of this book.

STATE "B" BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

SIOUX FALLS—MARCH 11, 12, 13, 1965

On other pages of this Year Book you will find a complete report on the 1965 State "B" Basketball Tournament, which was won by a fine Alexandria team by defeating Tripp in the finals.

Attendance at the tournament was as large as could be accommodated. Receipts were up, not because of attendance, but because of a fifty cent advance on all tickets. The Tournament was televised by both Sioux Falls stations.

Tournament Manager, Wallace M. Diehl of Washington High School and his staff are to be commended on the efficient manner in which they managed the tournament.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS

SIOUX FALLS—MARCH 17, 19 & 20

Three meetings of the Board of Control were held in Sioux Falls, prior to and during the State "A" Basketball Tournament. At the first meeting on the 17th, two Board Members were not present, due to severe weather. No actions were taken, pending the arrival of the two Board Members but many topics were discussed. At the meetings on the 19th and 20th decisions were made, which are listed on other pages of this Year Book.

STATE "A" BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

SIOUX FALLS—MARCH 18, 19, 20, 1965

Sioux Falls Washington High School defeated Rapid City High School in the finals to become the 1965 "A" Champions. It was a wonderful tournament ably handled by Mr. Diehl and his staff and was the best "A" Tournament ever, financially. A complete report on this tournament will be found in the basketball section of this Year book.

1965 TRACK CLINIC

MITCHELL—MARCH 27, 1965

The seventh Annual Track & Field Clinic was again held in Mitchell on March 27, 1965. Head Track Coach Frank Sevigne of the University of Nebraska was the instructor and did a marvelous job. 134 Coaches attended the Clinic and they were well rewarded for their attendance.

1965 STATE TRACK MEET

WATERTOWN—MAY 21, 22, 1965

Weather for the State Meet was not good but the track was fast, and a great group of athletes was assembled. Three all-time State Track Meet Records were established.

Rapid City won the "A" Meet and Centerville won the "B" Meet, with Sioux Falls Washington High School the runner-up in the "A" Class and Tyndall winning the runner-up spot in the "B" Meet.

A complete summary of the Meets will be found on other pages of this Year Book. Clar Lilevjen of Watertown did a great job as Meet Manager.

1965 STATE GOLF TOURNAMENT

WATERTOWN—MAY 21, 22, 1965

Thirty-two golfers, qualifiers from the eight region tournaments, took part in the Annual Golf Tournament. Jim Fiala of Aberdeen was the medalist with Wally Marker of Sioux Falls in second place. Joe Claflin of Watertown managed the Golf Tournament and a complete summary of this fine event can be found elsewhere in this Year Book.

1965 STATE TENNIS TOURNAMENT

WATERTOWN—MAY 21, 22, 1965

Twenty singles and 10 doubles teams, the same number as in 1964, participated in the Annual State Tennis Tournament. John Waltman of Rapid City was the singles Champion and Bob Wicks of Watertown the runner-up. In doubles competition, the Sioux Falls team of Sandvig and Peterson defeated the Brookings team of Johnson and Bucholz in the finals.

John Adams of Watertown capably handled the Tennis Tournament and again a complete summary of the event will be found in another section of this Year book.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS

SIUOX FALLS—JUNE 3, 4, 5, 1965

The final meetings of the Board of Control for the school year of 1964-1965 were held in Sioux Falls on June 3, 4, 5. The events of the year were reviewed and plans formulated for 1965-1966. The meetings were lengthy and perhaps the most important of the year. A complete summary of Board actions for 1964-1965 will be found following a short report on the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations annual convention.

NATIONAL FEDERATIONS ANNUAL CONVENTION

The annual convention of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations was held in Williamsburg, Virginia June 27, 28, 29 & 30, 1965. Chairman R. W. Monfore of Springfield, Member L. N. Pier of Mobridge, Executive Secretary R. M. Walseth and Assistant Executive Secretary D. W. Evans of Pierre, represented South Dakota at this convention. Mr. Monfore, a member of the Executive Committee of the National Federation, really represented the Federation.

Mr. Monfore presided at one of the General Sessions of the Convention and acted as coordinator at other meetings.

Mr. Evans, Chairman of the National Non-Athletic Section of the National Federation, Chaired one of the non-athletic group meetings and was responsible for the program.

Forty-seven states, including Hawaii, and three Canadian Provinces were represented at the convention.

BOARD OF CONTROL ACTIONS

1964-1965

There were seven meetings of the Board of Control during the year, however there were but three trips necessary for the Board Members. The first meeting at the SDEA Convention Oct. 7, three meetings at the time of the State "A" Basketball Tournament and three meetings were held in Sioux Falls June 3, 4, 1965.

THE 1965 TOURNAMENTS

Two of the finest state basketball tournaments were played in 1965 and two fine Champions were crowned. Alexandria High School was the "B" Champion and Washington High School of Sioux Falls won the "A" crown.

Alexandria has now won the "B" title a second time and Washington High School, since the division into "A" & "B" Classes, claimed its fifth title. Alexandria won in 1963 and in 1965 and Washington High School has now won the "A" title in 1941, 1953, 1955, 1956 and in 1965.

Our congratulations to Alexandria and Sioux Falls. Both teams deserved to win, but it was not easy. Alexandria won from Agar 50-48, from Brandon-Valley 42-41 and from Tripp 59-54. Sioux Falls took Sisseton 58-51, Aberdeen 48-45 and Rapid City 62-50. Even with the close games, it was apparent that the right teams won and deserved to be the Champions.

Alexandria had a very good team. They had lots of size, lots of ability, were well coached and had good rebounding ability on both boards. Coach Gerald Saylor handled his team well, the team knew what to do and did it. Again we say that Alexandria was a fine team and a credit to the long list of "B" Champions.

Washington High School's team was called a twelve man team, and this name was not far wrong. It seems that Coach Dobratz could run in fresh boys constantly, with little or no effect on the efficiency of the team. The team was good sized, liked to run, shot well, rebounded effectively and were tough defensively. Again, congratulations to Coach Dobratz and his team.

While each game has a winner and each tournament has its champion, we cannot but point to the closeness of the games played in each tournament. A bad pass, a bad bounce, traveling, double dribble or similar misplays could easily have given either tournament a different champion. Caliber of play by the other teams in the two tournaments was excellent.

On other pages of this "Year Book" you will find reports and results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, including financial reports and the pictures of the sixteen teams in the two tournaments. It was a great season!

The local management of the tournaments in Sioux Falls was outstanding. Each year new innovations seem to appear and we must say that both tournaments were very well handled.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1961 "A" Tournaments a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winner of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1963 and 1964 tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 "B" Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.

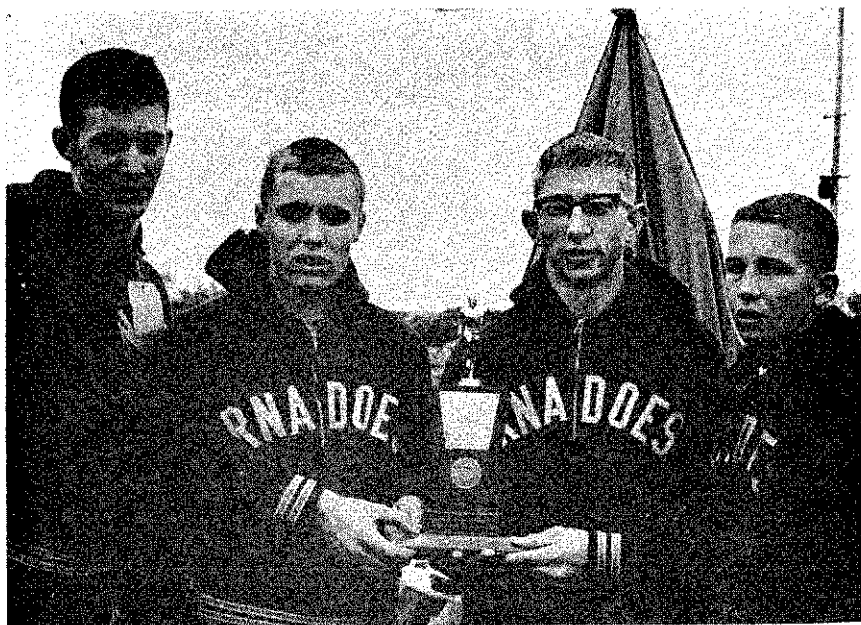

Of the students competing, 45 from 36 schools reached the state contest at Pierre on November 20 and 21. Superior ratings were earned by five contestants in the oratory section, seven in the poetry section, eight in the dramatic section, and five in the humorous section.

Tom G. Johnson, Sioux Falls Washington, was first in oratory; Frederick Schwenk, Rapid City, was first in poetry reading; Dennis Holub, Rapid City, was first in dramatic reading; and Ronald Borstad, Estelline, was first in humorous reading. A summary of the other superior ratings awarded is to be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

Four schools earned plaques at the state contest for having more than one speaker rated superior. They were Avon, Watertown, Huron, and Deadwood. A year ago only three schools achieved this honor.

All-State Chorus and Orchestra

More than 1,000 vocalists from 164 of the Association's 242 member schools gathered in Watertown November 13 and 14 for the All-State Chorus. Twelve of these schools also provided the personnel for the 125-piece All-State Orchestra which performed in conjunction with the chorus in the concert presented Saturday evening in the Civic Arena at the Watertown Senior High School. This autumn musical event has been a project of the South Dakota Music Educators' Association.

Edward Anderson, an instructor in the School of Music at Colorado State University, directed the chorus. Marvin Rabin, an associate professor of music of Boston University, directed the orchestra.

In the spring of 1965 the Board of Control of the SDHSIAA laid plans for the eventual operation of the All-State Chorus and Orchestra directly through the office of the Association. The Music Educators Association will continue to cooperate in the actual operation of this All-State event.

All-State Band

"This is one of the finest all-state high school groups I have ever directed." This was the remark of Paul Yoder who had just completed directing the 1965 All-State Band at Sioux Falls the last Saturday in March.

The group of high school instrumentalists of whom Mr. Yoder was speaking consisted of 168 students from 66 South Dakota high schools. They had been carefully screened through a system of auditions so that they represented the finest musicianship available on the high school level in the state.

Flandreau High School qualified the most performers for the band with 13. Vermillion qualified 10, Huron 9, Sioux Falls 8, Aberdeen 7, Mitchell 7, Beresford 5, Scotland 5, and Brookings, Rapid City, Spearfish, Watertown, Webster, and Yankton 4 each.

Student Council Conferences

At the suggestion of the South Dakota Secondary School Principals' Association three area student council conferences were conducted and the state convention was eliminated for 1964-65. More Schools Participate in Drama Festivals

Participation in the one-act play program again showed considerable growth. Forty-three schools entered the festivals in 1964-65 as compared with 28 the previous year. Only three of the "big school" spots were filled in the state festival because of the last-minute withdrawal of Watertown, but the tenth spot on the state program was filled when it became necessary to conduct two contests in one division because of the large entry list.

At the state festival in Mitchell on January 29 and 30 three schools earned superior ratings with their presentations. They were Aberdeen Central, Estelline, and Mobridge. Other schools competing at Mitchell were Doland, Baltic, Lead, Irene, Gregory, Rapid City, and Sioux Falls Washington.

Estelline presented "The Pot Boiler" under the direction of Mrs. Bette Gerberding; Mobridge presented "Joint Owners in Spain" under

the direction of Maurine Peterson; and Aberdeen Central presented "Our Hearts Were Young and Gay" under the direction of Mrs. Carol Pratt. Actors and actresses receiving superior ratings are listed elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

Regional Music Contests

With an assist from the weather, contests were held in all eight music regions in 1964-65. Region VIII completed the field when a solo and ensemble contest under the sponsorship of the SDHSIAA was held for the Black Hills area schools the first Saturday in February. Douglas High School at Ellsworth Air Force Base was host for the event. This initial Region VIII contest had been planned a year earlier but inclement weather prevented its being held.

Contests in the other seven regions were held in February and April as scheduled. More member schools participated in the solo and ensemble contests than took part in the large group events. Competitors from 208 schools representing 86 per cent of the membership took part in the solo and ensemble contests. On the other hand, only 160 schools were represented in the large group contests in April.

Aberdeen and Doland Debaters Win Titles

Debaters from Aberdeen Central and Doland took top honors in the State High School forensic tournament which wound up the Association's golden anniversary year at Huron in early April. Records show that the State Association sponsored its first state debate tournament in 1915. Sioux Falls Washington was the winner of the first title and came within one decision of repeating the performance in the 1965 event when it finished in the runner-up spot.

Avon was the runner-up in Class "B" in this golden anniversary year as Doland won the debate championship in Class "B" and Aberdeen in Class "A".

Doland won the Class "B" crown without losing a debate in the double elimination system used. Avon, the champion a year ago, lost only to Tyndall and Doland. Doland now has won the state Class "B" championship five times out of the past seven years. Don Mendel coached the Doland debaters and James Carlson directed the Avon speakers.

In Class "A" Aberdeen dropped a decision to Sioux Falls Washington in the second round and went the rest of the way without a defeat, disposing of Washington on a 5 to 0 decision in the finals. Sioux Falls' only other loss was to Lead. Joe Farnham coached the winning Aberdeen debaters and Bob Parlet, the runner-up Sioux Falls team.

An innovation at this year's forensic meet was the taping of the championship Class "A" debate for television. The debate was telecast on the KELO system on the Saturday following the tournament.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournament was Resolved: That nuclear weapons should be controlled by an international organization.

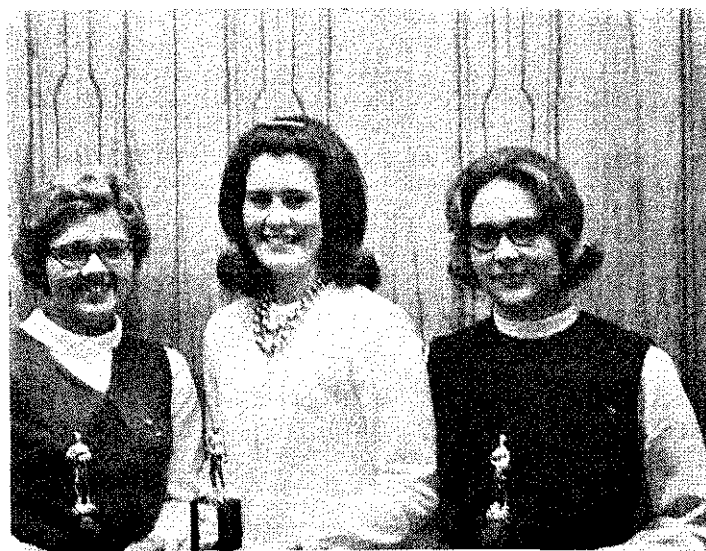

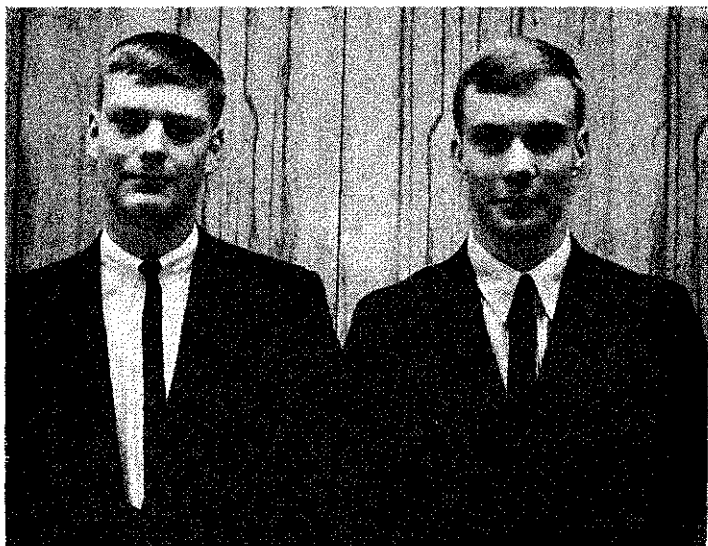


Winners of Superior Ratings in Poetry (L to R): Stan Ulrich, Platte; Fred Schwenk, Rapid City, First Superior.

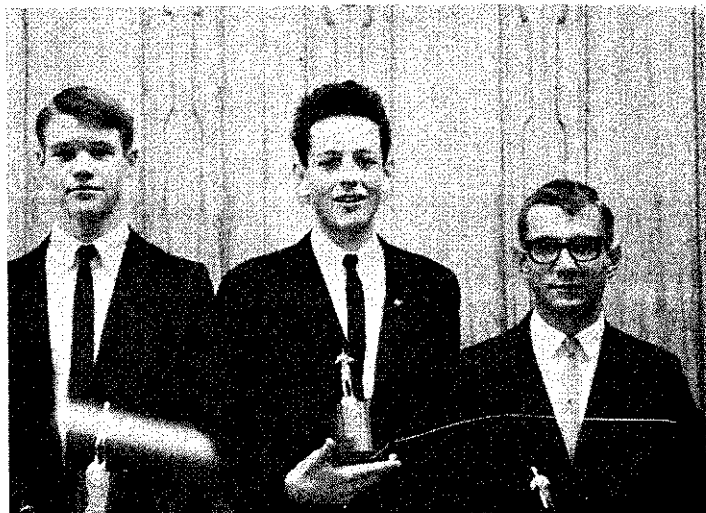

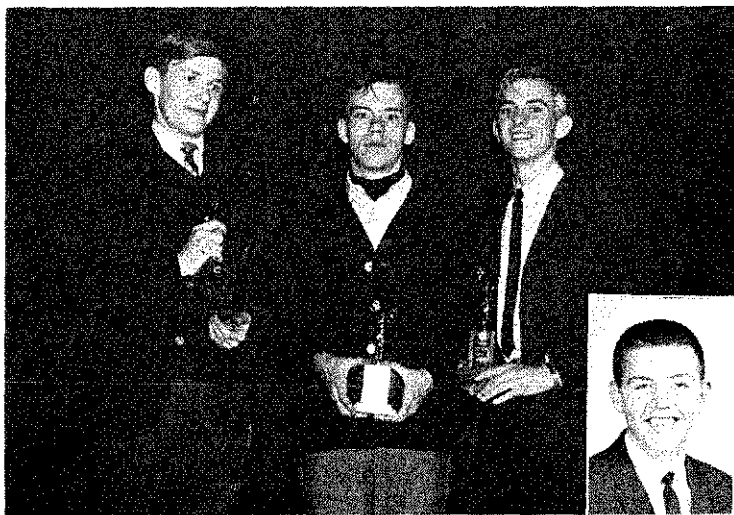
