FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1965-1966. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDHSAA office. Space was rented in the St. Charles Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1957. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA building at 411 E. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Activities Association," it was necessary to add additional help. Mr. D. W. Evans was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEA building.

REVIEW OF SDHSIAA EVENTS FOR 1965-1966

On the following pages you will find a brief mention of the events and the business of the SDHSIAA for the school year of 1965-1966. All state-wide events are summarized on other pages of this "YEAR BOOK" and in most cases pictures of teams and individuals are reproduced.

1965-1966 was the fifth year that the Association has been operated as an "Activities Association" and therefore the events mentioned and summarized are for both athletic and non-athletic events. Summaries of all athletic events follow, and the non-athletic events are shown with pictures and summaries in the last section of this book. We hope the information is complete and we are quite sure that it is.

With the completion of the school year, we can look back and we are led to believe that the year of 1965-1966 was a good year in all phases of our programs. There seems to be quite complete harmony existing in the several organizations now a part of this "Activities Association." Athletic programs continue to be strong and growth has been shown especially in the so-called minor parts of the program. There seems to be steady and healthy growth in the non-athletic portion of the program.

Even with more centralized controls and direction, the programs, both athletic and non-athletic, could not be effectively administered without the use of committees charged with the responsibility of making events run properly in the many different parts of the state. The Board of Control, the Executive Secretary, and the Assistant Executive Secretary wish to thank the many people serving on the committees who have handled the district, region, section and division activities and for the wonderful help received from numerous people on the affairs of a state-wide nature. Your help has made these affairs go. Again, a big "Thank You."

The athletic program seems to improve annually. Football shows quite a gain. Several schools changed from eight-man football to the eleven-man game. As eight-man teams go to eleven-man, more schools seem to take up the slack on the eight-man game.

Cross Country, since split into "A" and "B" classes, has gained tremendously. Now with the two classes, instead of having one crowded class we have two fairly crowded classes. It is possible that some method of qualifying for the state event may become necessary.

Wrestling has gained rapidly. With normal growth, which is indicated, it may be necessary to have more regions. In fact, it has become an almost absolute necessity. The State Tournament, however, will continue with sixteen in each weight class.

Basketball, a sport played by all member schools, cannot increase in the number of varsity teams, but great growth has been shown by the increased number of "B" teams, weight teams, and intra-mural programs.

Track continues its amazing growth. More and more schools are entering contestants in the region meets and in 1966 the greatest number of qualifiers ever competed in the State Meet. There were more dual, triangular, conference meets and big meets than ever before.

More boys are playing golf. Region golf tournaments attracted more entries, and fifty qualified for the State High School Meet. In tennis, more contestants competed in the State Tennis Tournament than for some time.

The several non-athletic programs made healthy gains. The Press Association Meeting in Brookings was very well attended and students participating received valuable help and hints in the preparation of school papers, yearbooks, etc.

The All-State Chorus and Orchestra, because of limitations, cannot get larger, but it did get better. While this group is not completely a program of "Activities Association," it is more closely connected with the Association. The Music Educators did a great job of handling the event.

Last fall, more students participated in Student Council Work Shops than ever before. Three area meetings were held with Earl Reum of Denver conducting all of these work shops. Response to the meetings was gratifying.

The three phases of the Speech Association showed gains. More schools competed in the District Declam Contests. The same is true for the One-Act Play Contests, as well as the Debate Tournaments in the late winter or early spring.

The music programs, limited to only region contests need motivation, although the Region Music Contests are great events.

The All-State Band, a program of the Band Masters, was an outstanding event. The Association is closer to this event than ever before and did finance the affair for the first time in history.

1965-1966 SDHSIAA EVENTS

ATHLETIC

1965 COACHING SCHOOL

Rapid City, August 16, 17, 18, 1965

With the 1965 Annual Coaching School in Rapid City, we feared that attendance would drop off. While not as great as the 1964 school in Huron, still over 200 attended. The 1965 school was outstanding.

Staff members: Ray Nagel, Head Football Coach at the University of Utah handled Football; John Benington of Michigan State was the principal speaker on Basketball; Linn Long of the University of Colorado took good care of the Wrestling; Jim Cordts of Howard and Lloyd Dobratz of Washington High School in Sioux Falls, Coaches of our "B" and "A" Basketball Champions were additional speakers at the School. All did well. We firmly believe the school was "Outstanding."

In addition to the lectures on sports, a new program was added to the Coaching School. One complete session was handled by a panel of doctors from Rapid City and the Black Hills area, and they covered "Medical Aspects in Sports." This section of the program was popular and very valuable.

All sessions were held in Surbeck Center on the campus of the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, and we are deeply indebted to them for the use of their fine air-conditioned facilities.

1965 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

The Football Rules Meetings starting in 1938 were continued in 1965. The 1965 meetings were held in Aberdeen, Custer, Faith, Huron, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Watertown, Winner and Yankton.

The series of meetings was changed because of the illness of Mr. Evans. The Brookings, Lemmon, Dupree, Vermillion and Lake Andes

meetings ordinarily held were cancelled and combined with others. Mr. Walseth handled all the meetings. Total attendance at these meetings was very good. 1115 attended.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Pierre—September 27, 1965

A meeting of the Board of Control was called to be held in Pierre, September 27, 1965. The purpose of the meeting was to elect officers for 1965-1966 and to consider several eligibility problems and incidents between schools. Problems connected with the partial closing of St. Agatha's High School and the transfer of these students to the Howard and DeSmet High Schools were considered.

Also considered at the meeting were incidents following the Tripp-Colome football game and the use of non-certified officials in the Woonsocket-White Lake football game.

Officers elected were Chairman, R. W. Monfore of Springfield and Vice Chairman, L. N. Pier of Mobridge.

Actions taken at the meeting will be found under "Board of Control Actions for 1965-1966" in another section of this publication.

1965 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

For the third year the twentieth Annual Cross Country Run was run as an "A" and "B" event. There were 125 runners from 29 "A" schools in the "A" meet, and 119 runners from 28 "B" schools participating in the "B" event. Larry Goodroad of Clear Lake was the individual winner in "A" and Wayne Jensen of Edgemont won the individual honors in the "B" event.

Flandreau Indian High School was the "A" team champion with Timber Lake winning the "B" title.

Cross Country Coach Glenn Robinson of South Dakota State University organized and ran the 1965 South Dakota High School Interscholastic Activities Association Cross Country Run.

A complete summary of this fine event will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

1965 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Starting on October 25 and running to November 8 your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary conducted eighteen Basketball Rules Meetings for Coaches and Officials at the following cities: Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, Winner and Yankton.

At each of the meetings, rule changes were discussed and explained, and the mechanics of officiating were reviewed. We believe that coaches and officials have a better understanding of the rules and believe that officiating is more uniform because of the meetings. A total of 1357 officials, coaches, players and fans attended the meetings.

1965 WRESTLING RULES MEETINGS

Bert Dent of Mobridge conducted a series of Wrestling Rules Meetings in Brookings, Sioux Falls, Watertown, Miller and Rapid City, and the meetings were well attended, although we do not have accurate attendance figures.

Prior to these meetings, Mr. Dent attended an Interpretors' Meeting in Chicago to get prepared for the meetings held in the state.

More meetings of this type will be held in 1966.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING Pierre—November 12 and 13, 1965

A regular meeting of the SDHSIAA Board of Control is scheduled each year the day prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. At this meeting the Board heard delegations from the Music Educators' Association and representatives of the Women's Physical Education Teachers, and a report on the Court Case. Plans for the Annual Meeting of the Association were made and duties assigned Board Members.

An invitation to hold the 1967 Wrestling Tournament in Huron was accepted. Several recommendations from the high school golf coaches were considered and approved.

Complete actions of the Board will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

SDHSIAA ANNUAL MEETING Pierre—November 13, 1965

Thirty-six (36) member schools were officially represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association on November 13, 1965.

Several amendments were considered at the meeting, and Supt. L. W. Turnwall and Supt. Gene B. Bigelow were nominated for a regular five year term on the Board of Control. This term is to start July 1, 1966 and terminate June 30, 1971. Mr. Bigelow was elected.

Amendments considered at the meeting are briefly as follows: (1) About allowing football practice without pads to open one week earlier. This failed. (2) Basketball practice to start not earlier than Monday of the week in which November 1 falls. This amendment passed. (3) Award rule change from basic cost of one dollar and fifty cents to three dollars (\$3.00). This amendment also passed. (4) To change the By-Laws of the Association to a basic Constitution with By-Laws for each activity. This amendment also passed.

COURT CASE

On January 26, 1966, attorneys for the Association and the defendants filed briefs with the Supreme Court and presented oral arguments, after which the Court took the case for consideration.

On April 8 a verdict was announced and the SDHSIAA was the loser. Therefore, after ninety (90) days it will be necessary to accept new member schools in the Association.

STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

Watertown—February 25 and 26, 1966

The State Wrestling Tournament is developing into a great event. It is very apparent that Wrestling is getting better and no team will dominate the Tournament as some have in the past. In 1966 Watertown won the team title without having a champion. Watertown was followed by: 2nd, Rapid City; 3rd, Spearfish; 4th Brookings. More schools competed in this State Tournament than ever before.

The 1966 Tournament was ably managed by Clar Lilevjen and his staff. It was exceedingly well done and was the first tournament ever where receipts exceeded expenditures.

A complete summary with pictures of the twelve champions will be found on other pages of this book.

STATE "B" BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

Sioux Falls—March 10, 11, 12, 1966

In the Basketball Tournament section of this Year Book you will find a complete report on the "B" Basketball Tournament which was won by a good Parkston team. Hayti was the runner-up and tough all the way.

Attendance was as great as the capacity of the building. Receipts were down slightly, because of the largest number of student tickets ever sold. This eliminated some adult seating, with the natural drop in receipts. Total attendance, however, was up slightly.

Tournament Manager Wallace M. Diehl of Washington High School did his usual fine job in managing the event. The championship round games were televised again.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS

Sioux Falls—March 16 and 19, 1966

Two meetings of the Board were held just prior to the "A" State Tournament and during the tourney. Routine matters were discussed and the two tournaments for 1967 were awarded to Sioux Falls.

STATE "A" BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

Sioux Falls—March 17, 18, 19, 1966

The Webster High School "Bearcats" defeated Aberdeen in the finals of the "A" Tournament. This was one of the finest of all great "A" Tournaments, and again Wally Diehl and his staff did a great job in handling the Tournament. 1966 TRACK CLINIC

Mitchell—March 26, 1966

The eighth annual Track Clinic was held in Mitchell on March 26, 1966. Charley Foster, Head Track Coach at Kearney State in Nebraska was the official instructor and did a marvelous job. Mr. Foster brought his Assistant, Al Zikmund with him and the lectures were split, making the 1966 Clinic the best ever. Attendance was also up. About 150 attended the Clinic.

1966 STATE TRACK MEET

Yankton—May 20 & 21, 1966

The 1966 State Track Meet was a fine event. The competition was even, races close. The condition of the track along with heavy winds on Saturday prevented any record breaking.

Rapid City was the "A" team winner and Tyndall took the team honors in the "B" meet. Watertown was the runner-up in the "A" meet with Centerville winning runner-up honors in the "B".

New qualifying methods used in the Region meets provided more contestants in the State Meet. A complete summary with pictures of the winners may be found on other pages of this book. Rich Greeno of Yankton did a wonderful job as Meet Manager.

1966 STATE GOLF TOURNAMENT

Yankton, May 20-21, 1966

Fifty golfers, qualifiers from the eight regions took part in the 1966 Annual High School Golf Tournament. Jim Ahern of Yankton was the medalist with Doug Helms of Clark in second place. The team championship was won by Yankton's Jim Ahern and Mike Lemon, with Aberdeen's team the runner-up, two strokes behind. Norm West of Yankton managed the event. A complete summary and pictures of the winners may be found elsewhere in this Year Book.

1966 STATE TENNIS TOURNAMENT

Yankton, May 20-21, 1966

Twenty-six singles players and thirteen doubles teams participated in the 1966 Tennis Tournament. This number is larger than for several years. Craig Sandvig of Sioux Falls Lincoln was the singles champion with the Lincoln doubles team of Sandvig and Greg Olson winning the doubles competition. Rapid City was the runner-up doubles team and Dickson Jewett of Sioux Falls Washington was the second place winner in singles.

Jim Holwerda of Yankton College handled the Tennis Tournament.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS

Sioux Falls—June 2, 3, 4, 1966

The last regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Control for the school year of 1965-1966 were held in Sioux Falls on June 2, 3, and 4, 1966. The events of the year were reviewed and plans were made for 1966-67. The meetings were lengthy and very important. A complete summary of Board of Control actions will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

MEETING WITH PRIVATE AND PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS

Pierre—June 21, 1966

All private and parochial schools now eligible for membership in the SDHSAA were invited to a briefing session on rules, regulations and procedures in Pierre on June 21, 1966. Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans explained common eligibility rules and the procedure and methods of handling the athletic and non-athletic activities of the Association.

All schools sent representatives except Rapid City Cathedral and St. Martin's of Rapid City. Many questions were asked and answered and we believe the meeting was very valuable to the new schools and to the Association.

NATIONAL FEDERATION'S ANNUAL CONVENTION

Mr. Evans and Mr. Walseth were South Dakota's representatives at the Annual Convention of the National Federation at French Lick, Indiana on June 26-29 inclusive. Mr. Walseth appeared on the program, reviewing the court actions of the last two years. Mr. Evans was one of the coordinators for the non-athletic activities sessions.

Forty-eight states, including Alaska and Hawaii, were represented at the Convention, as well as several Canadian Provinces.

BOARD OF CONTROL ACTIONS

1965-1966

There were eight meetings of the Board of Control during the school year. However, these meetings necessitated but four trips for the Board Members. The first meeting was in Pierre September 27; the second and third meetings were in Pierre November 12 and 13; the fourth and fifth meetings were at the time of the "A" Basketball Tournament March 16 to 19, and the last meetings were in Sioux Falls June 2, 3 and 4.

Officers for 1965-1966 were R. W. Monfore, Springfield, Chairman; L. N. Pier, Mobridge, Vice Chairman; and R. M. Walseth, Treasurer as provided for by the SDHSIAA By-Laws. Since Chairman Monfore's term was expiring, officers for 1966-1967 were elected as follows: L. N. Pier, Chairman and H. B. Ashbaugh, Vermillion, Vice Chairman. R. M. Walseth continues as Treasurer.

Gene B. Bigelow of Agar was elected to succeed Mr. Monfore, taking office July 1, 1966.

All actions listed below were taken at one of the meetings of the Board of Control. This listing is not necessarily in the order of importance.

(1) Set dates and sites for events as listed on the preceding pages. (2) Declared certain St. Agatha High School students eligible at Howard and De Smet High Schools. (3) Placed Woonsocket and White Lake High Schools on probation for use of non-certified officials. (4) Reviewed several incidents during early part of the football season. (5) Presented a newly rearranged and reorganized "Constitution and By-Laws" to the membership of the Association for their approval. (Note: Approval was overwhelmingly granted.) (6) Heard committees from Music Educators and Women's Physical Education Teachers. A new working agreement was prepared and approved for Music Educators and the All-State Chorus and Orchestra, and set up standards for girls' inter-school athletics as presented by the Women's Physical Education Teachers. (7) Heard and approved many reports by Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary. (8) Assigned Donus Roberts of Watertown to attend NUEA Meeting in New York. (9) Approved a series of Wrestling Rules Meetings and assigned Bert Dent of Moberg to attend a Wrestling Rules Interpretation Meeting in Chicago. (10) Accepted Huron's invitation to host the 1967 State Wrestling Tournament. (11) Accepted Sioux Falls' invitation to host the 1967 "A" and "B" State Basketball Tournaments. (12) Accepted some of the recommendations made by the Golf Coaches for the 1966 Region & State Golf Tournaments. (13) White Lake High School's probationary period was shortened. (14) For the 1967 State "A" & "B" Tournaments adult reserved seat tickets were raised from \$8.00 to \$10.00. (15) Approved insurance programs as presented by Mr. Martz of Sioux Falls for use in member schools. (16) Approved the continuation of the SDHSIAA Wrestling Committee. (17) Decided to accept some of the recommendations presented by the Track Committee and approved the Track Committee's continuation for 1966-1967. (18) Decided not to send delegates to National Student Council Convention for 1966. (19) Decided to secure a Referee for the State Track Meet, instead of a combined "Starter and Referee." (20) Decided to make no changes in Golf for 1967 Region and State Tournaments. (21) Accepted the Sioux Falls invitation to host the 1967 State Track Meet and the Tennis and Golf Tournaments. (22) Made plans for setting up districts with the new private and parochial schools added. (23) Did not change the dates for Region and State Wrestling Tournaments, but did advance the dates for the 1968 Wrestling Tournament. (24) Accepted Watertown's invitation for the 1968 Wrestling Tournament. (25) Set up rather important regulations for membership of the State Training School. (26) Authorized a meeting with representatives of the private and parochial schools. (27) Ruled that because of recruitment and scholarships, the Augustana Academy and the Wessington Springs Academy were not eligible to membership in the Association. (28) Authorized furnishing briefs and Judges' Decisions to the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations. (29) Purchased trophies and medals from Josten's for 1966-1967 school year. (30) Appointed Advisory Committees for Speech activities, Student Councils, Music and Press. (31) Authorized out-of-state travel for a representative to the Wrestling Interpreters' Meeting in Chicago and to the Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary to attend the Annual Football Rules Committee Meeting and State Executive Officers Meeting in January of 1967. (32) Adopted and approved the budget for 1966-1967. (33) Complete copies of the minutes of the several Board of Control meetings will be found in the Annual Meeting Bulletin which will be published in September of 1966.

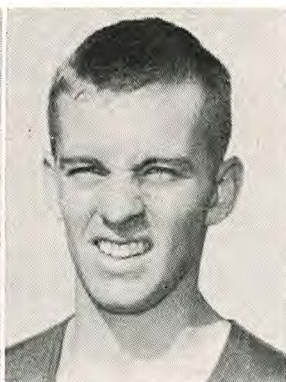

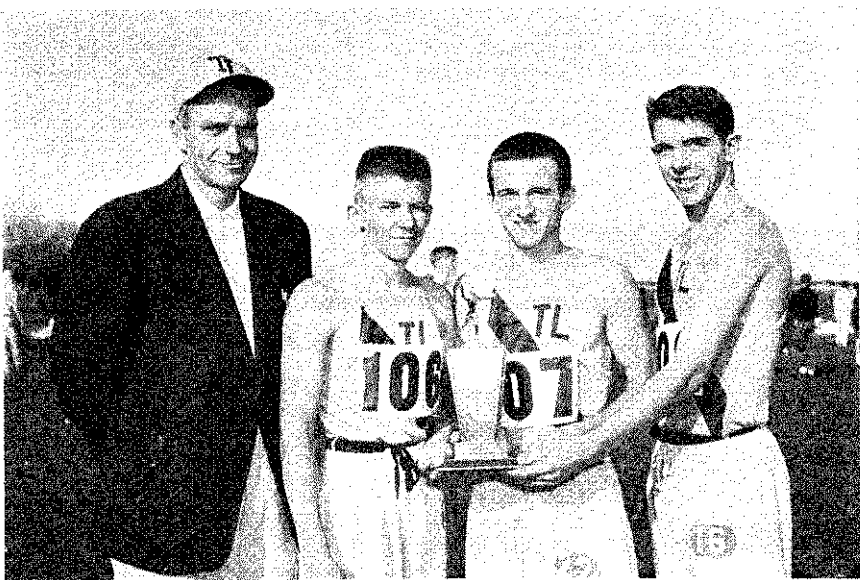

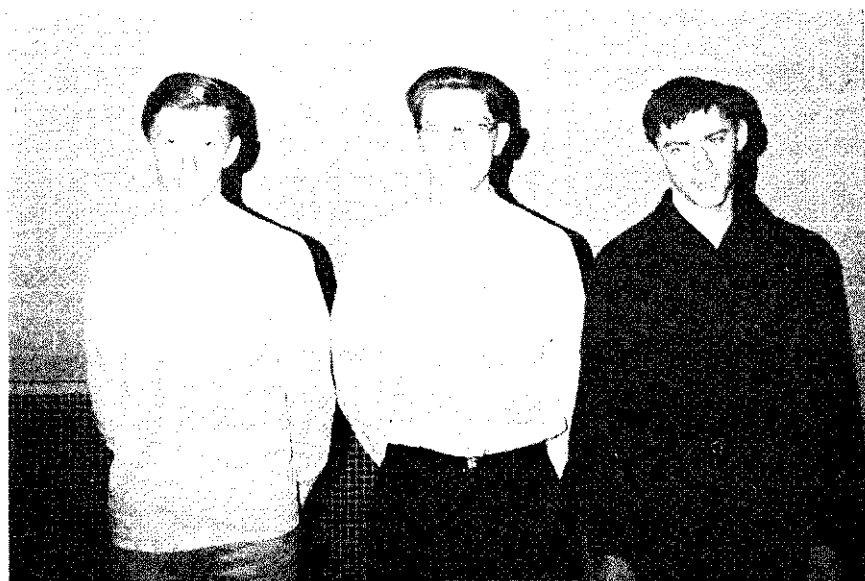


Start of 1965 Cross Country Run

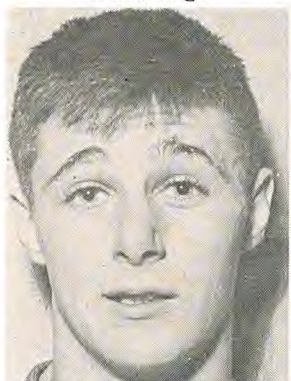

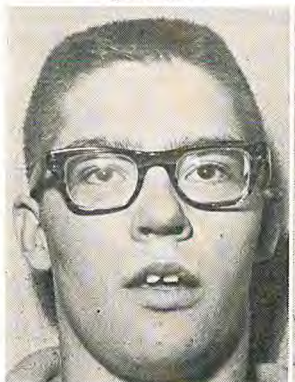

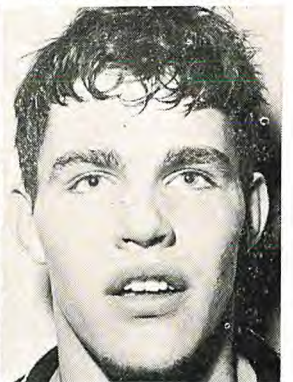

1966 TOURNAMENTS

The 1966 basketball tournaments were excellent tournaments and new champions were crowned. Parkston High School won the "B" Championship for the first time and Webster became the "A" Champion, also for the first time. State championships are not new to Webster, however. They won three consecutive State "B" Championships in 1946, 1947 and in 1948.

Our congratulations are extended to Parkston and Webster. They deserved to win. The going was not easy, however. Parkston won a two-pointer from Frederick in the first round. Webster was pressed all the way but remained in command through the tournament.

Both teams were good teams, each team had a good big man, along with ample help from the others.

Coaches Liveris of Parkston and Swanhorst of Webster had their teams ready for the tournaments and their preparations paid off.

On other pages of this Year book you will find reports and results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, along with pictures and a season's summary for each of the sixteen teams in the two tournaments.

The local management of the state tournaments was outstanding.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1961 "A" Tournaments a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winner of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1963 and 1964 tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 "B" Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.

Music Council

The Music Council convened for its annual session at Pierre early in September. The work of the Council included the following:

- * Examination of the revised music by-laws being proposed by the SDHSIAA Board of Control. This examination resulted in a recommendation that the form of the present Council be retained in regard to size and representation.
- * Authorization granted: (A) For all regions to conduct experiments in the field of piano contests with the authorization to be on a continuing basis; (B) For Region VIII to continue its experimentation with multiple entries from the larger schools in the solo events.
- * Appointed a committee to make a study of a proposal that would change the regulations to permit a school to enter students in solo events on a quota basis for each section such as brass, woodwind, and percussion instead of adherence to the rule allowing only one entry for each type of instrument.
- * Set the calendar for the 1966-67 school year.

Officers re-elected for the 1965-66 school year included S. K. Lot-speich, Madison, president; E. Orville Evenson, Aberdeen, vice president; and D. W. Evans, Pierre, secretary.

1965 Press Convention

As usual interest of the delegates to the annual high school press convention on the campus of South Dakota State University in Brookings at the end of September centered on an announcement of the results of the annual competition in school newspapers and yearbooks.

Winner of the sweepstakes award in the competition was Highmore High School. Highmore was rated All-State on both its newspaper and its yearbook and headed the list of seven schools with double All-State honors by having the highest point total.

Runners-up in the sweepstakes competition were Lead, Washington of Sioux Falls, Rapid City, Vermillion, Watertown, and Augustana Academy of Canton. A complete list of the award winners in the contest will be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

W. Gordon Surette, South Dakota State University instructor, was the keynote speaker for the convention.

Miss Nellie Moe, Strandburg, was awarded the fifth annual Founder's Award. The award is given to an adviser whose service to a school publication and the Press Association has been considered most valuable.

Officers elected at the supervisors' luncheon meeting were Larry Tennyson, Mission, president; Merlin Hiaring, Madison, first vice president; and Vince Penning, Huron, second vice president.

Declamation Contests

Participation in the Association's declam continues at a high level with 201 out of 238 SDHSIAA members taking part. This is 84 per cent of the membership.

A total of 688 students participated in the district contests. At the division level there were 218 participants, including 140 from 88 "B" schools and 78 from 20 "A" schools.

Of those competing, 52 from 39 schools reached the state contest at Pierre. Superior ratings were earned by five contestants in the oratory section, three in the humorous prose section, seven in the dramatic prose section, and five in the poetry section.

Judy Groeneveld, Madison Central, was first in oratory; Pat Landry, Sturgis, was first in humorous reading; Emma French, Yankton, was first in dramatic reading; and Connie Swanson, Lead, was first in poetry reading. A summary of the other superior ratings awarded is to be found elsewhere in this YEARBOOK.

Only three schools earned plaques at the state contest for having more than one speaker rated superior. Aberdeen Central headed the list with three superiors. Spearfish and Sioux Falls Lincoln each had two speakers in the select list.

All-State Chorus and Orchestra

The 1965 chorus had 996 singers and the orchestra had 112 players. These musicians represented 173 schools in 166 South Dakota communities. This was the first year that the chorus and orchestra had performed in Sioux Falls.

The members of the chorus were selected by local competition. Entry was by quartets, with the number of quartets from each school determined by the size of the school.

The orchestra members were selected by auditions which included performance and a written test.

Joseph Levine, conductor of the symphony orchestra in Omaha, Nebraska, directed the orchestra. Dr. Douglas McEwen, choral director at the University of New Mexico, directed the chorus.

The South Dakota Music Educators Association cooperated with the SDHSIAA in planning and operating this All-State event.

All-State Band

After a two-year absence, Lt. Col. William F. Santelman, director of the U. S. Marine Band, retired, returned to direct the sixteenth annual All-State Band. This time he was just as enthusiastic about the quality of the band personnel as he was three years ago at Huron. For the first time the event was held in Pierre.

The band directed by Colonel Santelman numbered 177 from 70 South Dakota high schools. These young musicians represented the best among the instrumentalists in the high school bands of the state and were chosen through a series of intensive tryouts. Tryouts and the All-State event itself were planned and operated through the cooperative efforts of the South Dakota Bandmasters Association and the SDHSIAA.

Huron High School qualified the most performers for the band with 9. Aberdeen and Rapid City each qualified 8; Beresford, Flandreau, and Vermillion 7 each; Mitchell 6; Madison Central, Scotland, Sioux Falls Washington, and Watertown 5 each; and Clark, Miller, Pierre Riggs, and Spearfish 4 each.

Student Council Conferences

Again in 1965 three area student council conferences were planned and held. The conferences were conducted on successive Saturdays in late September and early October. Earl Reum, Coordinator of Student Activities in the Denver Public Schools, served as guest consultant at each of the meetings. Vital statistics concerning the three conferences are as follows:

Melvin Ford, Yankton, was South Dakota's representative at the Student Burgesses in February at Williamsburg, Virginia. No representatives were sent to the National Student Council Conference at Tacoma, Washington.

One-Act Play Contests

Growth of the one-act play contest leveled off during 1966. Forty-four schools entered the contests in 1965-66 as compared with 43 the previous year. In 1963-64 there were 28 schools in the program. A total of 11 schools participated in the state contest at Aberdeen the last weekend in January.

Three schools earned superior ratings with their presentations at the state contest. They were Aberdeen Central, Sioux Falls Lincoln, and Deadwood. Other schools competing at Aberdeen were Sioux Falls Washington, Parkston, Mobridge, Springfield, Clark, Huron, Garretson, and Rapid City.

Aberdeen Central presented "The Glass Menagerie" under the direction of Mrs. Carol Pratt; Sioux Falls Lincoln presented "The Hungers" under the direction of Rosella Blunk; and Deadwood presented "Aria Da Capo" under the direction of Richard Sethney. Actors and actresses receiving superior ratings are listed elsewhere in THE YEAR-BOOK.

Region Music Contests

In South Dakota, high school music contests are held only on a regional level with no advancement to a state contest. Contests were held in all eight regions during 1965-66. In seven of the regions solo and small ensemble contests were completed in February and were followed by large group contests in April. Region IV held all its contests in a two-day event in April. Regions II and V have separate vocal and instrumental contests in February.

Doland and Sioux Falls Washington Debaters Win Titles

Debaters from Doland and Sioux Falls Washington took top honors in the state high school forensic tournament which wound up the Association's speech program at Huron in late March.

Doland won the Class "B" debate title by winning over Avon in the finals. Doland now has won the state championship six of the last eight years. Avon has been the runner-up for the past two years. Harvey Wollman coached the Doland debaters and James Carlson, the Avon debaters.

After finishing second last year, Sioux Falls Washington went all the way in 1966 to win the Class "A" championship. Aberdeen Central, last year's champ, was runner-up this time. Washington's only loss was to Watertown in the fifth round. Bob Parlet coached the winning Sioux Falls debaters and Jerry Andrews, the runner-up Aberdeen debaters.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournament was Resolved: That the federal government should adopt a program of compulsory arbitration in labor-management disputes in basic industries.

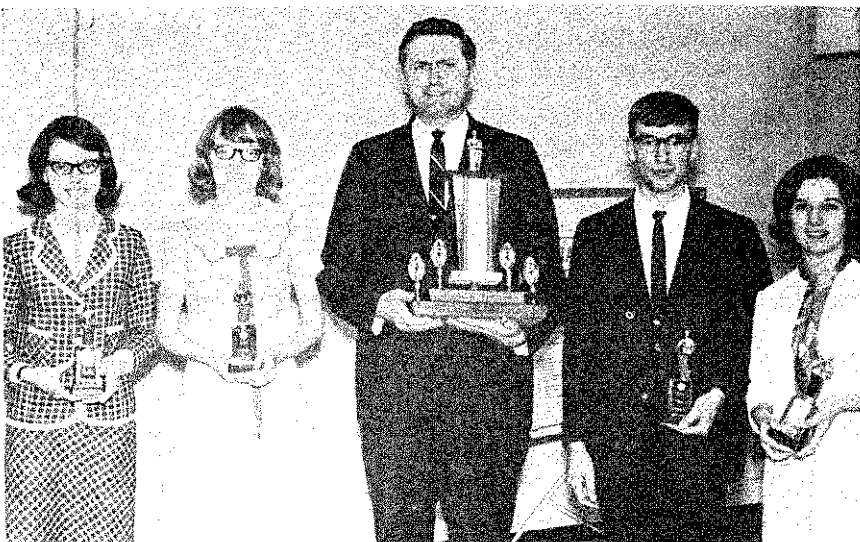

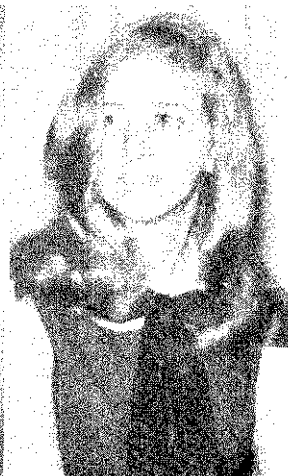
